Dear Governor Hogan:

Pursuant to § 3-207(d) of the Correctional Services Article, the Commissioner is required to submit an annual report on each correctional facility to the Secretary and Governor. The statute specifically states:

(a) In general - On or before October 31 of each year, the Commissioner shall submit an annual report to the Secretary and the Governor that states, for each correctional facility in the Division:

(1) its expenses, receipts, disbursements, condition, and progress;

(2) the number of inmates and each inmate's age, sex, race, place of and conviction, crime, and term of confinement;

(3) the number of inmates who escape, are pardoned, or discharged;

and

to

(4) any remarks and suggestions the Commissioner considers necessary advance the interests of the correctional facility.

(b) Accountings.- The Commissioner shall submit with the report required by subsection (a) of this section a statement similar to the statement that is required to be submitted under § 3-206 of this subtitle.

(c) Verification by Commissioner.- The Commissioner shall verify the report and statement required by this section.

(d) Submission to General Assembly.- Subject to § 2-1246 of the State Government Article, the Governor shall submit to the General Assembly the report and statement required under this section and any recommendations that the Governor considers expedient.

Attached is the Department's submission in satisfaction of this reporting requirement.

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Operations Overview

The correctional side of the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services Operations includes all Maryland State prisons.

Dedicated professionals oversee prisons and pre-release centers whose mission is to protect the public by providing care to those who are in our custody. Institutional security is a key priority of the Department for both staff and the inmate population.

The commitment to returning offenders to society with the tools necessary to keep them from their former life of crime is evident in the vast array of job skill opportunities, educational programming, psychological and health sessions, and drug treatment.

Maryland Correctional Enterprises (MCE), the prison industry arm of corrections and one of the largest prison industries in the nation by sales, also offers an employment setting that mirrors the private sector.

Public Safety Works gives inmates the chance to pay society back, while simultaneously learning valuable employment skills and intangible but important traits such as a patience, compassion, and community appreciation.

The Department also provides crucial victim services to those whose lives are impacted by offenders under correctional supervision.

Eastern Correctional Institution



Eastern Correctional Institution(ECI) East/West Westover, Maryland

ECI-East and ECI-West are both medium security compounds managed by the Warden, with an Assistant Warden of Programs and Services and a Security Chief. The East Compound serves as the primary receiving unit for Direct Intakes on the Eastern Shore. Corizon Health medical providers have offices on both compounds. The main Infirmary for all 3 compounds (East, West, and Annex) is located on the East Compound. Three Maryland Correctional Enterprise business units are located on the East and West Compounds.

Accomplishments for FY 2019

- Over 10,054 pounds of vegetables donated to the Somerset County Health Department and the Seton Center Food Bank for needy families. The Green Gardens are providing fresh vegetables to needy families in the community, while offenders are able to reach out and help the community while incarcerated.
- The Library and Education departments of the facility have reported that in 2019 there were over 10,000 books checked out and the library has helped answer over 7600 reference questions. The library had on average 669 patrons visiting the library monthly while also holding many book discussions. Education reports that 29 inmates earned their GEDs between the Annex and West compound. Over 117 students earned Adult certificates and 62 students completed occupational programs.
- The Psychology Department provided non-crisis therapy to over 1300 inmates while crisis therapy services were provided to more than 850 inmates. One Hundred Eighteen male offenders were housed on the mental health tier that was established in 2018. Ninety-Six group therapy sessions were provided.
- ECI's Social Work department has been busy this year. They conducted work groups for Thinking, Deciding, changing (TDC) Thinking for a Change, (T4C) Communications, Re-Entry, Inside Out Dads and Domestic Violence. Inmates earned over 270 certificates for group completion.

The Eastern Correctional Institution – Annex (ECI-A) is a 608 bed minimum/pre-release security facility that has four general population housing units, one support building and an outside recreation area. The three minimum-security housing units have 3 wings, one control center, one day-room and three offices. A fourth housing unit houses 140 Pre-Release inmates in 2 dormitories with programming and educational offices. This Pre-Release housing unit provides a transition to the Pre-Release security level by making use of community resources, work release, community leaves, and family leaves during the final phases of an inmate's incarceration. The mission for the Pre-Release housing unit is to assist the inmate in preparing for a successful re-entry into the community.

Accomplishments for FY 2019

ECI-A's Pre-Release details do many projects to give back to the community.

- Cleaning and painting local little league parks
- Set up and clean up for the Hebron Carnival
- Gleaning fruits and vegetables from farms for the Maryland Food Bank,
- Assisting in the cleanup of the St. John's Church cemetery in Deal Island
- Cleaning out ditches for the City of Crisfield.
- ECI-A's Pre-Release inmates have been involved in a partnership with the City of Salisbury by supplying labor to the City (Salisbury Neighborhood Services) to support the Governor's Grant for "Project Safe Streets."
- The Wicomico Partnership for Families and Children provides parenting classes to the inmates
- Alcohol Anonymous (AA) and Narcotics Anonymous (NA) groups continue to operate at ECI-A

Eastern Correctional Pre-Release



Eastern Pre-Release Unit Churchill, Maryland

Eastern Pre-Release Unit (EPRU) is a Pre-Release security facility within the Maryland Correctional Pre-Release System (MCPRS), located in Church Hill, Maryland, Queen Anne's County. Eastern Pre-Release Unit is situated on 96 rural acres of land.

Offenders housed at Eastern Pre-Release Unit are expected to carry out various job assignments for the facility; it is essentially a working camp. The inmates receive job assignments such as sanitation, dietary and maintenance jobs for at least 30 days in order to progress into a supervised program such as road crew and work release. The Facility also has a garden. The program teaches inmates to produce vegetables, which are harvested and prepared for the inmate population meals. All of the jobs offered at the facility provide skills for inmates to take with them when they re-enter society.

Accomplishments for FY 2019

- Addition of the Adani X-ray system, controls contraband being introduced into the facility.
- The institution offers multiple offender work programs. Some offenders are on non-supervised work programs such as public works projects and are paid by the state.
- Offenders on work-release work on salaried jobs with local companies such as builders, food-processing factories, scrap metal recycling yards, and automotive repair shops.
- Programs Provided: Alcoholics Anonymous, Employment Readiness,

Religious Services, Education - G.E.D. preparation, Special Education, Financial Literacy and Parenting classes are available. Eastern Pre Release had 10 Offenders who earned their GED 2019. Also available-Library_Services, One-Stop Career Center Presentation, Identification, Exit Orientations, and Parole Workshops.

Southern Maryland Pre-Release



Southern Maryland Pre-Release Unit Charlotte Hall, Maryland

The Southern Maryland Pre-Release Unit (SMPRU), opened in 1962 and is situated on 112 rural acres of land in Charles County, Maryland. Its gross square footage is 40,000.

SMPRU houses inmates of pre-release status who are preparing for release. The majority of the inmates participate in outside details, active work release or core institutional assignments such as dietary, sanitation and maintenance. Outside detail assignments are the State Highway Litter Details, Maryland State Highway Patrol Sanitation Crews, Department of Natural Resources Oyster Detail, Farming for Hunger Detail, County Tree Trimming Crew, County Litter Details and the Cheltenham Veterans Cemetery Detail.

Accomplishments for FY 2019

- On January 31, 2019, the Department of General Services conducted Physical Inventory Audit. SMPRU was in compliance.
 February 22, 2019, Headquarters conducted and IT audit that was compliant.
 The PREA audit was conducted March 11-13, 2019, with four
 - deficiencies that were in compliance within thirty days.
 The Department of Natural Resources' Oyster Project runs from April 2019, through September 2019. Inmates participating in this program bag oyster shells for cleaning and injecting with larvae for reintroduction into the Chesapeake Bay tributaries.
 - In 2018, two inmates received certificates as Master Gardeners from the University of Maryland Extension Program, and two more in July 2019. Additionally, there are two currently enrolled in the program.
 - SMPRU inmates participate in the Farming for Hunger Program at Serenity Farms. Eight inmates are assigned to the farm. Inmates plant, harvest, package and distribute fresh produce to the Maryland Food Bank and residents of Southern Maryland. On this detail, inmates learn to operate heavy-duty equipment that will enhance their ability to obtain jobs upon release.



Jessup Correctional Institution



Jessup Correctional Institution Jessup, Maryland

Jessup Correctional Institutuion (JCI), is a medium security facility which opened in 1991. JCI is home to several Maryland Correctional Enterprises offender work programs including a sew shop that makes all inmate uniforms and correctional officer pants throughout the state. All of Maryland's license plates are produced at the facility, which also makes furniture for state offices and Maryland colleges. The site also serves as a transportation hub for offenders going to court and medical appointments in the Baltimore/Jessup region.

Jessup Correctional Institution began its FY 19 with classrooms at full capacity. Adequate instructional educators were also in place

Accomplishments for FY 2019

- Jessup Correctional Institution has ongoing Law classes with the Georgetown University, college classes initiated by Anne Arundel Community College and University of Baltimore through the second chance Pell program. Forty-Two students completed spring 2018 semester of University of Baltimore Pell program with a 3.57 GPA or better, in addition to 5 students completing the Certificate of Business Management and 8 students completing the Certificate of Entrepreneurship as offered by the Anne Arundel Community College.
- Jessup Correctional Institution (JCI) Capital Construction project of modernizing and upgrading the security surveillance cameras and monitors continues with exterior camera placement on the inmate Housing Units completed and initiation of camera placement within the inmate Housing Units ongoing.
- JCI was recognized during the SERMA Conference 2019 for achieving a 36% reduction in employee injuries during calendar year 2018.
- Jessup Correctional Institution (JCI) has increased its class size for Thinking for a Change and Victims Impact, allowing more participants. JCI provides religious services for 20 different groups in addition to special programs.
- Jessup Correctional Institution (JCI) dedicated one inmate housing unit (B building) and one (1) wing in A building B wing to the Maryland Transition Center (MTC) Pre Trial Detention.

Maryland Correctional Institution - Jessup



Maryland Correctional Institution- Jessup Jessup, Maryland

Maryland Correctional Institutuion - Jessup (MCI-J), is a medium security level facility located in Anne Arundel County. MCIJ houses medium, minimum and pre-release security inmates. Originally opened on April 29,1981 as an annex to the Maryland House of Corrections, the facility has 18 buildings, totaling about 284,170 square feet. The facility has two special housing units for deaf and hard of hearing inmates and inmates housed on segregation. The facility also houses preferred inmates in a dormitory style setting.

The facility programs and services buildings include: The Gymnasium building which contains the barbershop, commissary, weight room and some program areas. The Chapel building which contains classrooms, the chaplain's office, the main sanctuary, and choir practice room. The Education/Vocational Shop building which contains eight classrooms, a library, computer graphic arts and an auto mechanics shops. The 35-acre grounds include a large outdoor exercise area, with combined baseball, soccer and football field, two basketball courts, volleyball court and a running track

Maryland Correctional Institution for Women



Maryland Correctional Institution- Women Jessup, Maryland

The Maryland Correctional Institution for Women (MCIW) is the only institution designed to house women committed to the Commissioner of Correction within the State of Maryland. As a result, the facility houses all security levels: Maximum, Medium, Minimum, Pre-release and Work Release. The daily population ranges between 750-800. The facility, which opened in 1936, is situated on approximately 35 acres. MCIW is fortunate to have a large range of unique programming:

MCIW partners with Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation (DLLR) to provide certification programs for the inmate population such as Culinary Arts, Housekeeping, and Grounds Maintenance.

Accomplishments for FY 2019

- Thirty-one inmates achieved their high school diploma in 2019.
- MCIW hosted its third annual Narcotics Anonymous Conference with record-breaking attendance.
- MCIW hosted its second annual Alcoholics Anonymous Conference in October (Sober October).
- MCIW hosted its first ever-Domestic Violence Conference in October.
- Our beekeeping initiative has grown to 13 beehives.
- MCIW was audited by the American Correctional Association in April 2019 and honored with accreditation.
- A partnership with VetDogs of America began this year. The facility currently has six puppies with another three expected later in the year.
- MCIW has collaborated with NAMI. Staff raised \$2000 for the mentally ill in a walk-a-thon.

Dorsey Run Correctional Facility(DRCF) was opened in 2013 and is the state's newest adult correctional facility. The facility was buildt through a partnership with the federal government.

The facility houses minimum and pre-release security inmates preparing for release. The majority of inmates participate in outside details, active work release, education or core institutional assignments such as dietary, maintenance and sanitation. DRCF also offeres Employment Readiness Workshop wich focuses on resume writing and interveiwing skills.

Brockbridge Correctional Facility



Brockbridge Correctional Facility Jessup, Maryland

Brockbridge Correctional Facility (BCF) is a minimum security institution within the Maryland Correctional Pre-Release System built in 1966 and located in Jessup, Maryland.

The Facility has a capacity for over 600 offenders and offers high school equivalency diplomas in reading, writing and math while also providing job readiness classes to those residents about to be released. This includes training in skills such as interviewing, resume writing and introduction to computers.

BCF offers several volunteer facilitated faith based and cognitive programs. The facility houses minimum and pre-release inmates preparing for release. The majority of inmates participate in educational or core institutional assignments such as dietary, sanitation, and maintenance.

Accomplishments for FY 2019

- Began the Inmate Dormitory Bathrooms and Showers officially began at BCF. Completion is estimated for February 2020.
- BCF met all 45 standards for the 2018 Prison Rape Elimination Act audit.
- Two- Hundred Twenty-Three Inmates were transferred to Dorsey Run Correctional Facility with 18 Custody Staff. This left only five of the 11 dormitories housing inmates at BCF.
- In May, an MCCS Audit was conducted at BCF. Staff completed the audit in accordance with standards set by the Commission.

Patuxent Institution



Patuxent Institution Jessup, Maryland

Patuxent Institution is a treatment- oriented maximum-security correctional facility that is located in Jessup, Maryland. It offers diverse services to the most varied male and female offender population in the state.Programming undergoes continuous refinement and development in order to ensure that it is delivered in accordance with best practices. At the same time, a very high priority is placed on the provision of services that make the most efficient use of Departmental resources.

Patuxent provides a statutory Youth and Eligible Person Programs, as well as the clinical services to offenders with serious mental illnesses, those with substance abuse diagnoses, and parole violators.

While Patuxent's programmatic offerings have evolved over the years, it has consistently remained the hub for treatment services for the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS).

In addition to its legislatively-mandated flagship programs, Patuxent now provides clinical services to DOC offenders housed at the Institution as well.

Accomplishments for FY 2019

- During FY 2018, educational services, under the direction of the Department of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation were provided to 932 students. Twenty-one students who achieved their GED/high school diploma.
- Adult Skills Certificate (ASC) 24 students earned ASC-Level 4, 20 students who earned their ASC-Level 3 and 8 students who earned their ASC-Level 2.
- The Correctional Mental Health Center continues to reduce the number of assaults on that unit.

Maryland Reception- Diagnostic & Classification



Maryland Reception- Diagnostic And Classification Center Baltimore, Maryland

The Maryland Reception-Diagnostic and Classification Center (MRDCC) identifies the required degree of security, assesses the offender's physical, educational, vocational and emotional/psychological needs, substance abuse needs and assigns the offender to the most appropriate correctional facility with the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services. With the closure of the Baltimore City Detention Center complex, MRDCC's mission has been expanded to include the regional segregation housing for pretrial detainees charged with notices of infractions within Baltimore's pretrial facilities (BCBIC & MTC). Housing of this population requires the facility to conduct hearings to determine innocence or appropriate sanctions that will be waged.

MRDCC, which was built in 1981, has been sustaining structural damage due to aging, which resulted in bricks falling from the building's structure. Areas used by staff and inmates have been restricted due to these conditions.

Occupational Skills and Training Center (OSTC) provides occupational/vocational training. The programs that offered to members of the inmate population include:

- Heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC)
- Building maintenance (Carpentry)
- Warehousing

Central Maryland Correctional Facility



Central Maryland Correctional Facility Sykesville, Maryland

Central Maryland Correctional Facilty (CMCF) is a minimum/prerelease facility located in Sykesville, Maryland and is part of the Maryland Correctional Pre-Release System (MCPRS). The facility has two housing units, administrative offices, all-purpose building and a laundry plant. Its bed capacity is 516 and consists of 12 dormitories.

The facility serves several functions. The laundry operation provides laundry service for institutions under the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, such as Springfield Hospital Center and Spring Grove Hospital. The facility also provides work details to the State Highway Administration in Carroll County, the Public Safety Education and Training Center located on property adjacent to CMCF, the Veteran's Cemetery, the Humane Society and the Thoroughbred Retirement Foundation Horse Farm detail where inmates learn skills to manage retired racehorses. Most programs emphasize job readiness training and work crews.

Accomplishments for FY 2019

- Alcoholics Anonymous Held by outside volunteers and is open to all inmates.
- Employment Readiness Workshop ERW teaches resume writing, interview preparation and communication skills.
- Religious Services Worship services and bible studies are provided throughout the week to include Christian, Muslim, Native American and Jewish services. All inmates have access to a chaplain.
- Carroll County Community Mediation Services Makes mediation and alternative conflict resolution processes more accessible to inmates.

• V.O.I.C.E - Victim Offender Impact Class and Education Program that exposes offenders to the impact crime has on a victim, family, and community. It utilizes lesson plans, videos, group exercises and victim panels to emphasize the impact of crime. This 12-week program meets two days a week

• Youth Challenge Program - 10-week mentor group that promotes leadership and allows inmates to be role models as they discuss topics and evolution while being incarcerated.

• Exit Orientations - Inmates being released are given information regarding resources that may be needed to obtain housing, counseling and mental health services.



Maryland Correctional Institution Hagerstown Baltimore, Maryland

Maryland Correctional Institution – Hagerstown (MCI-H) was built in the 1930's and houses medium security inmates. The institution recently downsized, significantly transferring both inmate population and staff to other facilities. MCI-H houses male inmates ranging from medium to minimum security with a minimal amount of prerelease security inmates. Minimum-security inmates are used to maintain areas of the institution outside the perimeter fence. The institution houses protective custody inmates in a PC Unit located on the top south side of the facility. MCI-H is also the "Hub" for Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Deportation Hearings and housing.

MCI-H Offers an Education program and two Vocational Shops - Sheet Metal, Office Technology. Other programs include America's Vet Dog Program, Faith Based Groups, including Kairos, Alternatives to Violence, and Alcoholics Anonymous.

Accomplishments for FY 2019

- Increased detection of attempts to introduce contraband into the facility including drugs.
- Closed Antietam Housing Unit, moving inmates inside the main building. Staff were later assigned to MCTC to assuage their staffing crisis.
- Vet Dog Program at MCI-H, graduated four service dogs for disabled veterans. Program currently has 12 dogs.
- Graduated a class in the GED Program.
- Painting interior of Main Building, and many office areas.
- Placed air conditioning units on the infirmary floor, due to loss of funds for air handling unit replacement.

Maryland Correctional Training Center (MCTC) is one of the largest correctional institutions in the State of Maryland, an Administrative Security Level Facility housing adult male offenders consisting of multiple security levels (medium/minimum/pre-release, as well as temporarily housing maximum-security inmates). The main institution was built in 1966 with additional housing units added totaling 8 in all.

MCTC continues to focus on providing inmates with Re-entry initiatives as well as programming and educational opportunities; MCTC team members continue to develop and innovate ways to carry out and accomplish the mission and vision of the institution.

Part of MCTC's mission is to reduce the recidivism rate and to give our inmate population the vital tools needed to be successful citizens once released back into society. A part of that mission is providing addiction treatment through Addiction Therapy Protocol (ATP).

Accomplishments for FY 2019

- Telephones were placed in the Visiting room, this helps the inmates and visitors hear their conversation clearly. This also provides a safer environment for staff by keeping inmates and visitors from breaking boundaries.
- HED/EHU has a new Academic program that has allows inmates to earn a GED. Since the start of the program, (January 2019) 17 inmates have earned their GED.
- MCTC's garden has donated 11,000 pounds of vegetables to the Salvation Army and the Central Kitchen.

Roxbury Correctional Institution



Roxbury Correctional Institution Hagerstown, Maryland

Roxbury Correctional Institution (RCI) is an ACA Accredited Medium Security facility opened in 1983. The facility is comprised of five housing units including an honor wing and a special needs unit. . In addition, RCI is designated as the institution to house medium security sight impaired inmates for the state.

The facility has maintained almost exclusively double celled housing since its inception. The institution is well maintained; the facility is slated for Capital Construction upgrades to the perimeter and a newly constructed gatehouse reception area. Currently, the facility is under consideration for a 32 Bed ADA housing unit. Video surveillance upgrades will occur in the housing units to enhance staff and inmate safety.

Accomplishments for FY 2019

- ACA Re-Accreditation
- Psychology Department performed 108 crisis interventions, 512 non-crisis interventions, and 931 individual therapy sessions with inmates diagnosed with a serious mental illness and 402 individual therapy sessions for those with a mental illness.
- Education department incorporated the use of tablets in the academic program that made a positive impact on the math and language arts test scores with an increase of 50%.
- RCI collaborated with Happy Hounds Prison Dog Program in December 2015. The inmate handlers have been introduced to certified training on site, agility course training, canine good citizen certification training, and general behavioral training to assist the inmates in socializing and preparing the dogs for adoption. Because of the inmates training and caring for the dogs as dog handlers, approximately 45 dogs have been adopted this fiscal year.
- IVOR (Incarcerated Veterans of Roxbury) raised \$436.61 in charitable funds for the Disabled American Veterans Ralph Tagg Chapter 14 via one walk-a-thon and held 3 Veterans'



Western Correctional Institution (WCI) opened in 1996 and manages maximum, medium, minimum and a few pre-release and pre-trial status inmates. WCI provides a variety of programming opportunities in an effort to promote a successful re-entry into society.

The sewing shop continues to repair and refurbish inmate clothing and bed mattresses in order to decrease the growing cost of purchasing either. The sewing shop continues to make colorful pillowcases in support of a national charity providing the pillowcases to children hospitalized with life threatening diseases. The toy project successfully makes wooden toys to donate to local charities and not for profit groups. The Horticulture Program graduates inmates with University of Maryland "Master Gardener" certificates. The Horticulture program has provided hundreds of flowering plants, shrubs, and trees to the local communities. The Horticulture program grows tree seedlings for replanting within Allegany and Garrett Counties and is currently reintroducing the American Chestnut tree seedlings for study by Frostburg State University.

North Branch Correctional Institution



North Branch Correctional Institution Cumberland, Maryland

The North Branch Correctional Institution (NBCI) is a maximum-security prison whose employees are tasked with managing inmates, who are threats to the state's institutions. The institution has proven that it is an instrument in reducing violence throughout all of Maryland's correctional institutions.

NBCI first opened for operation as part of the Western Correctional Institution (WCI) in 2003 and in 2008 began to operate independently as NBCI with full activation in September 2009.

NBCI has been tasked with developing a restrictive housing program based upon best practices in the correctional field. Custody in collaboration with all departments is working on cognitive programming in an attempt to continue to reduce the recidivism rate and prepare inmate's socially for re-entry into society and/or their next institutional placement.

NBCI has made great strides since August 2013 in managing the inmate population in smaller numbers and groups.

- Special Needs Unit (SNU) utilizes Inmate Mentors on the Wing in supportive services for the mentally ill;

- Holding academic classes with HU 3 and 4 inmates;
- Request additional staff for Case Management, Social Work, Psychology and other departments.



Department of Public Safety & Correctional Services Inmate Pay Scale*

The Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services recognizes the importance of providing programming services, educational opportunities, and employment opportunities for incarcerated individuals. Not only do these services assist in preparing offenders for returning to the community, but they also decrease prison idleness leading to safer correctional facilities.

Eligible incarcerated individuals earn wages and diminution credits for participating in work projects, educational classes, and other special programs. In addition to diminution credits, inmates also receive compensation for participating in education programs provided by the Department of Labor.

The Division of Corrections hires inmates for a wide swath of jobs both inside and around the correctional facilities, including skilled, semi-skilled, craftsman and special assignments. Inmates are paid a daily compensation rate that ranges up to \$2.75.
