Report On Children Receiving Benefits Through the Summer SNAP for Children Act

REPORT REQUIREMENT

This report is hereby submitted in response to the following reporting requirement:

The committees request that the Department of Human Services (DHS) provide two reports with the following information:

- *the number of children served by jurisdiction;*
- *the benefit level provided by jurisdiction; and*
- the number of children in participating jurisdictions that are not able to receive benefits due to insufficient funding by jurisdiction.

In addition, the first report should also provide information on the number of jurisdictions that applied for the program funding; how the determination for funding was made by jurisdiction; the total funding available for benefits, including the local match by jurisdiction; and how jurisdictions determined which children would receive the benefit.

The first report should cover the summer portion of the program (June, July, and August 2021), while the second report should cover the winter portion of the program (December 2021).

NUMBER OF CHILDREN SERVED BY THE JURISDICTION

Summer SNAP winter benefits were issued on December 23, 2021 to children identified within the six approved jurisdictions.

A total of six jurisdictions applied to participate in the FY21 Summer SNAP program and all applicants were accepted. The funding allocation was distributed based on the available budget, including the local share of funds.

The following table reflects the number of children who received winter Summer SNAP benefits for the month of December 2021.

Benefits could not be issued to 294 previously identified children because the household was no longer eligible to receive SNAP benefits at the time of issuance. The participating jurisdictions have been requested to identify children to substitute the inactive cases so that remaining benefits may be issued.

BENEFIT LEVEL PROVIDED PER JURISDICTION

Each eligible child will have received \$100 in total Summer SNAP benefit this fiscal year- the amount was split in fall installments including \$30 for the months of June through August, and \$10 for December. The Summer SNAP Program has an annual allocated budget of \$200,000 with the requirement that all participating jurisdictions contribute, at a minimum, matching funds at a rate consistent with the school construction formula. Contributions that exceed the minimum local share increases the ability to serve more children in that particular jurisdiction.

NUMBER OF CHILDREN NOT SERVED DUE TO LACK OF FUNDING

The table below displays the number of SNAP children residing in the jurisdiction, the number of children who received Summer SNAP and the percentage of children served through the program.

Understanding the need to streamline eligibility to a smaller population based on the availability of funds, the participating jurisdictions chose various methods to identify the children selected to participate in Summer SNAP this year.

Montgomery County used the same selection criteria from last year by targeting school age children who receive Temporary Cash Assistance and also included a substantial amount of children residing in SNAP households who receive free and reduced meals at school.

Prince George's County targeted children residing in the highest concentration of poverty in the county.

Howard County collaborated with the Local Children's Board and the Howard County Public School System to identify two communities with the largest SNAP population but have reported to be limited in the engagement of a school summer food service program.

Baltimore County targeted youth who suffer long-term impacts of trauma associated with homelessness.

Baltimore City targeted youth ages 14-17 participating in the Youth Works Job Program.

Queen Anne's County targeted the rural Northern Region of the county – this includes children in SNAP households in zip codes 21620, 21623, 21651, and 21668.
