### **Background**

The Alcohol and Tobacco Commission (ATC) was established through legislative action by the Maryland General Assembly and was enacted on January 1st, 2021. Prior to the creation of the ATC, related regulatory and enforcement duties fell under the purview of the Comptroller of Maryland. Today, the ATC is the regulatory and law enforcement agency. Pursuant to Tax General Article §2-107 E in accordance with § 2-1246 of the State Government Article, the Alcohol and Tobacco Commission respectfully submits this report.

This report includes, as requested:

- the aggregate number of licensed tobacco retailers that committed a violation of §10-107 of the Criminal Law Article during the reporting period.
- the number of prior violations for licensed tobacco retailers and minors that committed a violation (cited under Criminal framework) during the reporting period (Tobacco Sales to underage persons);
- the subsequent action taken by the Alcohol and Tobacco Commission against each violator and, for each action taken, the number of violations committed by the violator.

The ATC does not conduct compliance checks of retailers related to the sale of tobacco products to underage individuals. Rather, local jurisdictions, often working with underage "consumers," conduct unannounced compliance checks and issue citations to those who sell tobacco products to these underage "consumers." The ATC complements the work of local jurisdictions by conducting hearings that target the retail license itself to encourage compliance with the law, limit the availability of tobacco products to underage persons, and evaluate the effort the retailer has taken to prevent sales to underage consumers. The local jurisdictions initiate the hearing process by referring retail stores that have committed violations to the ATC.

#### Data

The local jurisdictions consist of 23 counties and Baltimore City. The Health Departments of these jurisdictions reported the number of violations they discovered during the reporting period to the ATC. Not all jurisdictions had reportable violations. Table 1 depicts the aggregate number of licensed tobacco retailers that committed a violation of §10-107 of the Criminal Law Article during the reporting period of July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2021 – June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2022. No violator's identities are revealed in this report.

Table 3 reports the dispositions of each tobacco license hearing request to the ATC during the reporting period of July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2021 – June 30<sup>th</sup> 2022. Of the twelve (12) referrals received by the ATC, all 12 violators had 2 or more violations.

Table 4 reveals a sustained decline in total referrals since FY 2019. Due to COVID-19, enforcement activities and compliance inspections were greatly reduced, however there has been a noticeable increase in violations reported by the local jurisdictions since the end of FY21.
