
# Prince George's County Public Schools' Enhanced and Expanded Behavioral Health Services Report

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## Introduction

On or before November 1, 2022, Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) shall report to the Accountability and Implementation Board, Governor, and, in accordance with § 2-1257 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly, a plan that includes the following: (1) enhanced and expanded school behavioral health service availability to ensure that all students have some exposure and access to behavioral health programming and services, taking into account the needs assessment in § 9.9-104 of the Education Article; (2) ensure that schools without a school-based health center will organize response plans to connect all students to community-based behavioral health and other services, as needed. In addition, by December 1, 2022, all staff in direct contact with students must complete annual behavioral and trauma training.

PGCPS' current Strategic Framework, which if you type in your browser, can be found at <a href="https://www.pgcps.org/about-pgcps/strategic-plan/strategic-framework">https://www.pgcps.org/about-pgcps/strategic-plan/strategic-framework</a>, conveys the district's desired outcome to increase awareness of mental health and wellness linkages to learning by eliminating stigmas, increasing access to support and decreasing the number of avoidable adverse educational outcomes. In doing so, the Strategic Framework endeavors to brand and promote access to PGCPS' mental health and wellness supports to ensure safe and supportive learning environments for PGCPS students. This report outlines the district's efforts to enhance and expand school behavioral health service availability for PGCPS students.

### PGCPS' Plan for Behavioral Health Services

# 1. How does PGCPS plan to ensure that all students have some exposure and access to behavioral health programming and services?

PGCPS' plan to ensure that all students have some exposure and access to behavioral health programming and services through a layered approach includes:

- Expanding mental health professionals;
- Creating a mental health supports office;
- Providing staff training;
- Launching telehealth services;
- Screening and data monitoring;
- Providing student training;
- Expanding counseling partnerships;
- Listing community resources; and
- Communicating services and programs to parents/guardians and students.

This section of the report will further outline how each component will lend to the exposure of and access to behavioral health programming and services for all students in PGCPS.

#### A. Expanding Mental Health Professionals

PGCPS has maintained a steady course to increase the availability of licensed clinical mental health professionals in schools across the district. This layer of clinician's credentials include Licensed Clinical Professional Counselors (LCPC), Licensed Clinical Professional Graduates (LCPG) and Licensed Clinical Social Workers (LCSW). As PGCPS begins to expand clinical services into its Early Childhood Centers, the district now includes Registered Behavioral Therapists (RBT). PGCPS began this effort of contracting on-site clinical support in the school year 2020-2021 through grant funds provided by the Maryland Center for Safe Schools and the Blueprint for Maryland's Future Concentration of Poverty Grant in 93 schools (Appendix A). This program was named "Youth Care First Program" to reduce the stigma associated with mental health services for some families and cultures.

Since that time, the Youth Care First Program grew to include an allocation of 144 schools (Appendix B) in the school year 2021-2022 and an allocation of 168 schools (Appendix C) in the

school year 2022-2023. The mental health clinician's role in PGCPS schools takes an integrated approach by providing a number of functions: (1) Individual Therapy, (2) Family Therapy, (3) Group Therapy, (4) Consultation for School-Based/Central Office Administrators and Specialists, (5) Professional Development, (6) Crisis Intervention Services, and (7) Collaboration and Consultation with PGCPS' Mental Health Coordinator. This model of service delivery is payable through the Blueprint for Maryland's Future Concentration of Poverty Grant for all clinicians contracted to Community Schools. Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds support clinicians in schools that are not identified as Community Schools.

This approach removes funds as a barrier to access for low income families as services are rendered to all students referred regardless of insurance or medicaid status. All services are covered at no cost to the parent/guardian. By the school year 2023-2024, the district will have licensed clinical staff in all 204 PGCPS schools. PGCPS currently has 204 schools for school year 2022-2023 to include seven Special Education Regional Centers, three nontraditional schools and one Virtual Campus. When all grant funding sources are exhausted, PGCPS will maintain funding for clinical services in all schools through the Blueprint for Maryland's Future and general operating funds. Table 1 (below), Systemic Mental Health Service Expansion, shows the past and present progression toward contracting mental health clinicians in all PGCPS schools.

In the interim, Professional School Counselors and Psychologists in the district schools provide the counseling services needed for students in schools that currently do not have a mental health clinician. These services are delivered to general education students as well as those who have counseling as a related service written into their Individualized Education Plan (IEP). For cases that extend beyond the Professional School Counselors' or Psychologists' area of expertise, referrals are made to community organizations that can render the services needed according to the student's chronic symptoms. PGCPS also maintains three Evening Counseling Centers that operate at Largo High School, Oxon Hill Staff Development Center and Parkdale High School. Each of the three locations operate one day a week from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. weekly (three days total). The Evening Counseling Centers provide in-person counseling to students who have committed alcohol and/or drug-related infractions. The PGCPS Student Rights and Responsibilities Handbook, which is available at the following link <a href="https://www.pgcps.org/offices/pupil-personnel-services/student-rights-and-responsibilities-handbook">www.pgcps.org/offices/pupil-personnel-services/student-rights-and-responsibilities-handbook</a>, requires such students in grades 5-12 to participate in drug treatment.

The Evening Counseling Centers provide a no-cost alternative to parents/guardians who cannot afford external treatment or who wish to take advantage of the district's services. In addition, students in grades 5-12 with general mental health needs beyond a drug and alcohol focus can also participate in evening counseling upon referral.

#### B. Office of Mental Health Supports – Expanding Administrative Human Capital

During the school year 2022-2023, PGCPS has expanded its ability to be responsive to students, parents/guardians and school administrators as it relates to students' issues related to mental health. In doing so, the district has invested in a new Mental Health Supports Office that will staff an additional Mental Health Coordinator to accompany the Mental Health Coordinator funded through the Blueprint for Maryland's Future, a Business Operations Coordinator and an Administrative Assistant. The sole function of this office is to develop and manage mental health programs,

policies, partnerships, materials, communications, consultation, training, and the Youth Care First Program (contracted clinicians) systemwide. Ultimately, this arm of PGCPS' Department of Student Services leads the expansion of mental health services in PGCPS as outlined in this plan in addition to other innovative programs and strategies as research reveals as impactful for students in schools.

The most critical roles of the constituents in the Mental Health Supports Office are as follows:

#### • Mental Health Coordinator

- Establishes procedures and protocols for mental health, telemental health,
   behavioral threat assessment, suicidal ideation and crisis support;
- Consults with schools and administrators regarding student concerns;
- Provides ongoing training to staff to implement procedures and provides presentations to students and families; and
- Coordinates the school-based Mental Health Initiative in collaboration with Community Schools.

#### • Business Operations Coordinator

- Responsible for the overall administration, supervision and coordination of operations in the Office of Mental Health Services within the Department of Student Services;
- Disaggregates data, tracks trends and develops reports relevant to attendance, suspension (especially PreK-2), mental health, bullying, Peer Mediation, and Restorative Approaches data analytics, to assist with data driven decisions in collaboration with assistance of Data Analyst; and
- Manages all fiscal and grant management responsibilities for the department including contracts, partnership agreements, Memorandums of Understandings (MOUs), and oversight of the systemic mental health services to ensure office and district compliance with systemic procedures, including local, state and federal mandates.

#### • Administrative Assistant

 Executes procurement of payments for all mental health providers and grant activities with approval of Business Operations Coordinator/MH Coordinators;

- Maintains all correspondences and communication to MHCs, Business Operations
   Coordinator, and schools related to mental health and school crises; and
- Maintains critical databases that provide accurate documentation of procurement activities and mental health providers, MOUs, administrative procedures, etc.

#### C. Staff Training

The Blueprint for Maryland's future states that by December 1, 2022, all staff in direct contact with students must complete annual behavioral and trauma training. Therefore, PGCPS requires all staff to take the Youth Suicide: Awareness, Prevention and Postvention course through our online SafeSchools module. The course provides staff members with information that will help them reduce the likelihood of suicide among students. This course covers the scope of the problem of youth suicide, common risk factors related to youth suicide, successful strategies for youth suicide prevention, the immediate steps a staff member should take if they encounter a student who is threatening suicide, and best practices for intervention after a suicide ("postvention"). The course also embed resources that staff may provide to students in crisis that consists of:

#### Mental Health Professionals & Centers in the Schools

- Professional School Counselors
- School Psychologists
- School Social Workers (in select schools)
- Licensed Mental Health Clinicians (in select schools)
- Wellness Centers (in select schools)

All PGCPS employees were required to take and pass this course by August 28, 2022. Anyone hired after August 28, 2022, is required to take and pass the course on their first day of employment.

As PGCPS plans for expansion by facilitating staff's continual understanding of behavioral health issues, trauma and violence, the district will include an additional training also available through the PGCPS SafeSchools library on Trauma Awareness. This expansion will begin in the school year 2023-2024. This course presents the definition of trauma, adverse childhood experiences (ACEs), and how these factors may affect student's emotional and cognitive abilities, leaving them feeling overwhelmed and limiting their academic potential. It is also designed to help school staff recognize the signs of trauma so they can help those students suffering from its effects. Additionally, as more students present with behavioral threats of violence, PGCPS will determine if additional training regarding assessing threats is further required.

#### D. <u>Telehealth Services</u>

In collaboration with the Prince George's County Health Department, PGCPS will be partnering with Hazel Health to expand health care services to students in the school year 2022-2023. Hazel Health is a telehealth provider that will allow students to see a medical doctor or a mental health therapist over a virtual visit, at no cost. These services became available in mid-October 2022.

The district will implement two models: **Hazel at Home** and **Hazel at School**. All PGCPS families will have access to **Hazel at Home**. Parents/guardians will be able to use any web-enabled device to reach a Hazel provider from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday through Friday. **Hazel at School** will be available to all PreK-8 academies, middle schools and high schools. PGCPS will work to expand **Hazel at School** in the district's elementary schools (135) over the next two years. Hazel Health will provide each school with an iPad and other equipment, family communications materials and training so that School Nurses and Professional School Counselors are equipped to start a visit directly from the school. PGCPS developed protocols for how students are referred to receive both physical or mental health services while in school. #### E. Screening and Data Management System – Expanding Utilization/Screening/Reporting

In May 2021, PGCPS launched a new web-based platform, BH-Works<sup>TM</sup>, that allows the district to identify, track, and address the mental health and social risk factors of its students. The school-based mental health clinicians will enter data, daily, relative to the direct and indirect services they provide to students. BH-Works<sup>TM</sup> captures parental/guardian consent and anecdotal case notes for case management and treatment plans. PGCPS Community School Coordinators who receive student referrals as a result of their engagement with parents/guardians and students, also enter referrals into the database.

As the district expands its ability to identify students in need, PGCPS will pinpoint screening tools to utilize with its students in order to determine those at risk for suicidality, anxiety, depression, self-harm and violence. There are over 130 forms and assessments available in BH-Works<sup>TM</sup>. The PGCPS' Department of Student Services will identify which screening tools to utilize widely to assess student wellness during the school year 2022-2023 and continue to increase the utilization of different types of assessments in the school year 2023-2024. Lastly, the Youth Care Steering Team (Mental Health Coordinator, Director of Community Schools, Supervisor of Professional School Counselors and Associate Superintendent of Student Services) will create and review data reports visible through BH-Works<sup>TM</sup> that reflect the level of mental health services rendered throughout the district for 168 schools this year, 2022-2023, and for all Prince George's County public schools with licensed clinicians in the school year 2023-2024.

#### F. Student Training

In addition to the provision of counseling services through the variety of mental health professionals available to students in the building and through telemental health therapists, the Department of Student Services will ensure students have access to educational opportunities that build their understanding of mental health competencies that assist students in ultimately being help seeking toward accessing available services. Students in various grades, as detailed per service, will be provided instruction through (1) Everfi, (2) SafeSchools Online Training videos, (3) Psychoeducational Workshops/Classroom and Wellness Wednesdays, and (4) Sources of Strength.

**Everfi** – PGCPS introduced Everfi for 8th graders in the school year 2019-2020. It has since increased its efforts in monitoring the implementation of this course with 8th graders by gathering data to ensure all students have taken the Mental Health Awareness Course. The sessions are webbased videos that host five 10-15 minute series of lessons that assist students in understanding the following content as described by Everfi:

- Introduction to Mental Health Students define mental health, list behaviors and factors that maintain and contribute to positive mental health, define stress and explain how it interacts with mental health.
- Understanding Mental Health Challenges Students identify warning signs of a mental health condition, explain how the functions of the brain affect the emotional, intellectual, and behavioral actions of a person, and explain how trauma impacts mental and physical health.
- Mental Health Coping Strategies Students identify emotional, intellectual, physical and social factors that can support or impact mental health, explain how coping strategies can impact mental health and identify how self-talk can impact mental health.
- Staying Healthy in Times of Uncertainty Students understand the ways that uncertainty and change impact mental health, explain the ways their environment and sudden life changes are connected to mental health, and examine the ways that basic needs are connected to mental health needs and overall health.
- Seeking and Offering Help Students identify observable and non-observable warning signs of mental health challenges, identify how stigma prevents people from seeking support for mental health issues, list ways to combat the stigma of mental health issues, and understand consequences of not seeking help for mental health issues.

**SafeSchools Online Training Videos** – PGCPS ensures that all students in grades 6-12 are exposed to and have access to mental health programs and services, which also includes providing them with information they can utilize to contribute to their overall wellness. The district has secured SafeSchools Online Training videos for students that educate them on the following topics:

Professional School Counselors and Mental Health Clinicians provide classroom lessons and workshops to students in K-12 that enable students to cope with stress, and manage their conflict and anxiety. The American School Counselor Association provides competencies that students are to learn as it relates to their social and emotional well-being, as well as the amount of time it recommends that counselors spend in direct service delivery relative to classroom guidance lessons. Every student, K-12, must receive instruction that supports learning strategies, social skills and self-management skills.

PGCPS' has partnered with the National Center for Youth Issues to launch Wellness Wednesdays for parents/guardians. The first session was held on Wednesday, August 31 from 6:30 p.m. to 7:45 p.m. This session was titled *What Families Need to Know About Bullying Prevention*. PGCPS hosted over 200 participants in a webinar with Mr. Rodger Dinwiddie, National Trainer for the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program and CEO of STARS Nashville. The session concluded with a question and answer (Q&A) session for parents/guardians and was posted on YouTube for parents/guardians to view. Sources of Strength (SOS) – SOS began implementation in 10 of the district's middle/high schools in the school year 2020-2021. SOS is an evidence-based approach utilizing PGCPS Peer Leaders and Adult Advisors to reduce suicidal ideation and increase school connectedness and adult relationships to facilitate protective factors. Peer leaders are a diverse group of individuals who leverage their personal and collective leadership qualities as well as their social influence in leading the charge in norming and culture change campaigns using strength-based messages to impact multiple issues including suicide. Adult Advisors are made up of a diverse group of connected, caring and positive PGCPS adults whose goal is to support, mentor and assist peer leaders in spreading hope, help and strength-based messages across their friendship networks.

PGCPS now has five district trainers who are training Adult Advisors and Peer leaders to implement the program. SOS is funded through a \$1 million (five-year) grant from the U.S. Department of Education to also place interns in PGCPS to support the provision of counseling to students and increase the pipeline of counselors employed in PGCPS. The Build, Recruit, Increase Capacity and Knowledge (BRICK) Grant will fund a Youth and Family Mental Health Symposium – to be held annually. The symposium will focus on providing opportunities for middle and high school students and families to learn mental health topics, symptoms, resources and strategies for wellness. PGCPS endeavors to expand this program to its next cohort of schools in school year 2023-2024 through additional grant funding opportunities. #### **G.** Expanding Counseling Partnerships

PGCPS works to continually increase partnerships to ensure its expansion of services for students to meet the specific demands of the student population. This past school year 2021-2022, PGCPS added two new partnerships:

Mindoula – The Adolescent and Young Adult Suicide Prevention Program (SPP) is
designed to reduce suicide attempts among adolescents and young adults who are residents
of Prince George's County, aged 12 to 21, and are at high and critical risk of suicide. The
SPP addresses the entire family system by providing virtual support to the parent/guardian

of the adolescent or young adult who is at risk of suicide, as well as 24/7 virtual and inperson support to the adolescent or young adult at risk of suicide.

• Boris Lawrence Henson Foundation – Founded by Taraji P. Henson, this mental health service will offer five free counseling sessions to all middle and high school students, aged 12-18, who choose to participate beginning October 2022 until the end of the calendar year (December 2023). Sessions include youth support groups, cultural competence training and after school hangout. #### I. Enhancing Communication and Messaging

PGCPS will intensify its efforts according to the district's Strategic Framework's Outcome Goal 4. This goal commits to ensure PGCPS increases awareness of mental health and wellness linkages to learning by eliminating stigmas, increasing access to supports, and decreasing the number of avoidable adverse educational outcomes. Additionally, to ensure safe and supportive environments, PGCPS also commits to brand and promote access to PGCPS mental health and wellness supports. Therefore, ensuring students and parents/guardians are aware of the services provided will increase the visibility of the resources available. The district will be strategic about promoting this work through the following platforms and communications:

# Alignment With Community Schools Needs Assessment

#### 2. How does the needs assessment in § 9.9-104 of the Education Article support this plan?

Each fall, every Community School completes a needs assessment to determine the needs of the students, families, school leaders, and communities and then the school administrators, Community School coordinators, mental health providers, Professional School Counselors, and members of the respective parent teacher association (PTA) develop a plan to address the needs effectively. The 2021-2022 needs assessment (Appendix D) revealed that only 49.3% of families believed that they could receive information regarding their student's mental health. The table, Available Supports and Access to Information (Appendix E), further revealed that only 33% of all participants believed they could always receive extra help with behavioral problems if needed. Families (24.2%) seemed to be aware that students could get extra help with managing their feelings or worries if needed, though slightly more students (33.6%) were aware, and 25.9% of families responded "I don't know." These results show a dearth in knowledge around the resources that are available in PGCPS to support student's mental health, behavioral problems, feelings and worries.

Secondly, the needs assessment reported staff's knowledge around tools and processes available at their school to identify when a student is struggling with academics, attendance, behavior and mental health. Staff responded affirmatively for academics (86.6%), attendance (86.6%) and behavior (83.1%), but fewer were aware of the process to identify students for mental health (62.8%) as referenced in Appendix F. Notably, a higher number of school staff believed that there were no programs to address student's mental health issues (20.6%) than those who believed there were no programs for academics (6.3%), behavior (9.7%), or attendance (10.7%) issues. Further, the table that displays support for struggling students (Appendix G) revealed that more staff believed mental health support to students existed (60.9%) as a level of intervention than for the whole class/whole grade (15.4%) or small group (24.6%).

These results also support the premise that the provision of mental health services is equally as important as creating avenues for advertising and communicating the process for identification, services available and interventions for mental health in order to yield a greater level of access to services for students.

# Identification, Referral and Monitoring of All Students Without a School-Based Health/Wellness Center (SBHC)

3. How will PGCPS ensure that schools without a SBHC will organize response plans to connect all students to community-based behavioral health and other services, as needed?

There are currently four functioning SBHCs located at PGCPS high schools (see chart below) that are approved by the Maryland Department of Health (MDH). The district currently maintains a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Mary's Center for Maternal & Child Care, Inc. to provide behavioral health services in High Point High School through cognitive behavioral therapy, trauma-informed cognitive behavioral therapy, dialectical behavioral therapy,

mindfulness, and meditation and acceptance commitment therapy to identified students at no cost to the district. In addition, the MOU approved medical and behavioral health services in Cool Spring Elementary for students at least 7 years old will be the fifth SBHC in PGCPS once approved by MDH this school year 2022-2023. This approval also allows reasonable configurations to the physical space to allow for adequate service delivery at Cool Spring Elementary School, which is due to be operational in school year 2023-2024. To serve schools without a SBHC, PGCPS has brought community-based behavioral health services into schools as referenced above. This year, those community-based services will be in 168 schools and due to expand to all 204 schools in the school year 2023-2024. However, when caseloads or student symptoms overflow the capacity of clinical staff within the school building, referrals will be made to community organizations such as Prince George's Behavioral Health Outpatient Services and various Youth Services Bureaus, that provide intensive behavioral services. Students referred to receive services, are identified based on data that exemplify student impediments to learning such as frequent out of school suspensions, suicidal ideation, PreK through second grade students who display behavior that classify as an imminent threat to themselves or their classmates, truancy, academic failure, grief or loss, and those with high behavioral referrals to administrator's office. PGCPS utilizes a Student Intervention Team (SIT) and Student Supplemental Team (SST) to create support plans for students according to PGCPS Administrative Procedure (AP) 5124, which employs the Response to Intervention (RtI) Process. For more information on AP 5124, go to https://www.pgcps.org/offices/general-counsel/administrative-procedures/students--5000. The SITs and SSTs vary and may include the school administration, School Psychologist, Professional School Counselor, Pupil Personnel Worker, other mental health professionals and classroom teacher(s). Currently, every student who returns from an out-of-school suspension must receive a check-in with their Professional School Counselor or Mental Health Clinician to determine the student's need for additional services. Students are then referred to receive behavioral and academic support as appropriate.

#### Conclusion

PGCPS has made great strides since the school year 2019-2020 to ensure that it is meeting the needs of students' mental and behavioral health challenges. The district recognizes that its schools need trauma-informed environments in order to appropriately respond to student's adverse behaviors. PGCPS understands that according to research, these behaviors are often an outgrowth of the social isolation experienced during COVID-19, existing family systems, grief and loss, community violence, race-based stress, academic failure, bullying, food insecurities, incarceration, and other factors that contribute to the level of health and wellness PGCPS' students are able to maintain. The district has expanded since school year 2019-2020 from 65 schools having clinicians to allocate licensed therapists in 168 schools this 2022-2023 school year, with a projection of all 204 schools having community-based resources within PGCPS in the upcoming school year 2023-2024.

In addition to professionals who provide direct support to students and families, the district has invested in a central office structure that provides governance over this program, consultation, and training to school administrators and educators across the district. This office is to ensure that PGCPS is growing in its efforts to build upon partnerships, like telehealth, that will ultimately serve every need students will manifest as having according to the district's diverse student population. PGCPS fully intends to monitor these services to be fiscally responsible in its understanding of how students are different as a result of this additional layer of support, and assess for students who need help who may have gone unnoticed in the past through BH-Works<sup>TM</sup>. PGCPS has also made student training platforms available that provide students in grades 6-12 with knowledge about mental health symptoms, strategies for coping and methods to seek help when needed. As the data has shown, the district must be adamant about telling its story to parents/guardians and students so that those who benefit the most from the strategies will expand over the next few years, maximize the resources available, and inform PGCPS of what program improvements are needed next.
