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INTRODUCTION

Please accept the following report in accordance with the below State statute:

§3–207.

(a) On or before October 31 of each year, the Commissioner shall submit an annual report to the Secretary and the Governor that states, for each correctional facility in the Division:

- (1) its expenses, receipts, disbursements, condition, and progress;
- (2) the number of incarcerated individuals and each incarcerated individual's age, sex, race, place of conviction, crime, and term of confinement;
- (3) the number of incarcerated individuals who escape, are pardoned, or discharged;
- (4) the job classifications for incarcerated individual labor in each department and facility under the authority of the Division;
- (5) the daily wage scale at each prison for each job classification under the authority of the Division;
- (6) the total number of incarcerated individuals currently employed at facilities under the authority of the Division, disaggregated by facility;
- (7) the annual cost of living for incarcerated individuals, including the average cost of:
 - (i) telephone calls, including calls to medical providers;
 - (ii) video calls; and
 - (iii) items available for purchase at a commissary, including:
 1. feminine hygiene products;
 2. toiletries; and
 3. medications; and
- (8) any remarks and suggestions the Commissioner considers necessary to advance the interests of the correctional facility.

(b) The Commissioner shall submit with the report required by subsection (a) of this section a statement similar to the statement that is required to be submitted under § 3–206 of this subtitle.

(c) The Commissioner shall verify the report and statement required by this section.

(d) Subject to § 2–1257 of the State Government Article, the Governor shall submit to the General Assembly the report and statement required under this section and any recommendations that the Governor considers expedient.

INCARCERATED INDIVIDUAL EMPLOYMENT AND WAGES

Employment and Wage Scale

The Department remains dedicated to offering incarcerated individuals opportunities that strengthen their preparedness for successful reentry into their communities. To advance this mission, individuals are given primary assignments, which encompass a variety of educational, therapeutic, vocational, and work-based programs.

These assignments are structured to build practical skills while fostering positive behavior and personal growth. Through participation, individuals may earn good conduct credits and/or financial compensation, reinforcing both accountability and self-improvement.

The table below represents the existing wage scale for all DOC facilities. Furthermore, each facility's current II hiring numbers are included in each facility's portion of the report.

COST OF LIVING

Communication Services

Each incarcerated individual (II) is eligible to receive one complimentary 30-minute video visit per week, offered in addition to standard in-person visitation. This initiative enables individuals to maintain meaningful connections with family members and loved ones who may encounter difficulties traveling to the facility. Sustaining these relationships plays a vital role in supporting emotional well-being and successful reintegration upon release.

All incarcerated individuals also have access to medical consultations at no cost, ensuring continuity of care and access to essential health services.

Beyond video visitation, individuals may place telephone calls at a rate of \$0.032 per minute. To further promote consistent communication, ViaPath tablets provide up to two hours of free outbound messaging per day. Inbound messages are available at a rate of \$0.20 per message, which is charged to the sender rather than the incarcerated individual. This communication structure offers multiple, secure, and accessible avenues for maintaining contact with family and friends, particularly when phone calls are not practical.

Educational and Entertainment Resources

The ViaPath tablets serve a wide range of purposes beyond communication. Incarcerated individuals have access to numerous educational and self-improvement programs, as well as the LexisNexis legal library, which provides essential legal research resources. In addition, the tablets feature a selection of entertainment applications that support positive engagement and contribute to overall mental health and well-being.

Individuals may also choose to purchase optional subscription packages that expand access to entertainment content, including an enhanced variety of video and television streaming services, games, and music. Subscription options are offered at three pricing tiers:

1. **Unlimited Package:** \$22 every 30 days, providing unrestricted access to all available entertainment services.
2. **Prepaid Package:** \$10 every 30 days for 400 minutes of entertainment access, allowing users to manage costs while enjoying select content.
3. **Pay-As-You-Go Option:** \$0.04 per minute, offering a flexible alternative for individual use.

At this time, the Division does not offer the option to purchase additional video call services.

Personal Hygiene and Self-Care Items

With respect to personal care, feminine hygiene products are provided at no cost to all individuals assigned female at birth, underscoring the Division's commitment to dignity, health, and equitable care. Basic toiletries are also supplied free of charge to ensure that all incarcerated individuals can maintain appropriate standards of personal hygiene while in custody.

In addition, individuals have the option to purchase a range of self-care products through the commissary system. This opportunity allows for personal choice in meeting individual needs and preferences, thereby enhancing comfort and overall well-being during incarceration.

Facility Overview

MARYLAND CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION FOR WOMEN



Located in Jessup, Maryland, the Maryland Correctional Institution for Women (MCIW) is the only state-operated facility dedicated exclusively to female incarcerated individuals. As such, MCIW houses individuals of all security levels—from pre-release to maximum—providing supervision and support throughout nearly the entire span of their incarceration. This unique role allows MCIW to offer a wide range of programs and services tailored specifically to the needs of women, with a mission to empower them both during confinement and as they prepare for reentry into the community.

To meet these diverse needs, MCIW employs a multidisciplinary team consisting of 240 custody staff and 36 civilian staff, who work alongside numerous community volunteers. Together, they deliver a rich variety of opportunities, including 18 religious programs, 14 educational programs, and 58 volunteer-led initiatives that cover areas such as health and wellness, family mediation, and relationship building.

In alignment with MCIW's holistic approach to rehabilitation, individuals also have access to mental health, behavioral health, and social skills development programs, offered through both individual counseling and group sessions.

Educational opportunities at MCIW span from basic literacy and high school equivalency courses to college-level classes provided through a longstanding partnership with Goucher College. This collaboration enables participants to begin or continue their pursuit of a Bachelor's degree. Recently, two new trailers have been received to facilitate full-time enrollment this fall. Currently, 64 individuals are enrolled in Goucher programs at MCIW, and in FY 2025, the facility proudly celebrated two graduates who earned their degrees in the presence of family, friends, and peers. Additionally, MCIW also recognized 9 IIs for the receipt of their GED this year.

A cornerstone of MCIW's reentry efforts is Project F.R.E.S.H.—*Fulfilling Re-Entry Services before Going Home*. This initiative provides targeted support and resources to individuals within 180 days of release, particularly those in pre-release status. Through partnerships with departmental staff and community organizations, participants receive a range of services including cognitive behavioral

therapy facilitated by social workers, reentry workshops led by *No Struggle, No Success*, job readiness training, faith-based trauma support groups, and preparatory resources offered through *P.R.E.P.A.R.E.*

Beyond structured programming, MCIW promotes morale and community through activities such as movie and snack nights and communal brunches. Case management staff conduct biweekly tier visits to address individual concerns, while monthly Town Hall Meetings—held more frequently as needed—provide opportunities for open communication, updates, and announcements. Additionally, biweekly information sessions welcome new participants, and individualized assessments help identify personal needs and connect residents with appropriate services.

MCIW remains committed to expanding its reentry initiatives, strengthening community partnerships, and ensuring each individual is equipped with the tools and support necessary for a successful transition home—ultimately contributing to reduced recidivism and stronger communities.

EASTERN CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION AND ANNEX



The Eastern Correctional Institution (ECI) and its Annex (ECI-A) have been strategically designed to support incarcerated individuals (IIs) through every stage of their incarceration journey, from initial intake to preparation for release. Established in 1987, ECI provides housing for individuals classified up to medium security and is dedicated to fostering personal growth, skill development, and successful reintegration into society.

Recognizing the importance of rehabilitation, ECI offers a broad selection of educational, vocational, and therapeutic programming. These opportunities not only promote academic achievement and job readiness but also encourage personal development and emotional stability—key components for a productive return to the community.

Educational programming at ECI allows incarcerated individuals to pursue their General Educational Development (GED) certificate or earn college credits, thereby improving their future employment prospects. Complementing these academic opportunities are a range of vocational training programs that provide industry-recognized certifications and hands-on experience to prepare participants for the workforce. To address emotional and psychological well-being, ECI and ECI-A also offer comprehensive counseling and therapeutic services. These include both group and individual sessions aimed at strengthening coping skills and supporting positive behavioral change.

As one of Maryland's largest correctional facilities, ECI employs a total staff of 598, encompassing both custody and non-custody personnel. Together with numerous dedicated volunteers, these professionals facilitate a wide variety of programming across the institution. This includes three case management-led programs, four addictions treatment programs, fifteen religious service options, four educational programs, eight social work-led groups, thirteen recreation-based programs, and eleven volunteer-led initiatives, all designed to promote rehabilitation, personal growth, and community connection.

Among ECI's many successful initiatives, the Garden Project stands out as a model of sustainability and community partnership. Established in 2014 through a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Somerset County, the program engages incarcerated individuals in cultivating fresh produce for residents across Maryland's Eastern Shore. Participants manage every aspect of production—from planting and tending crops to harvesting and preparing weekly distributions—providing valuable agricultural experience while contributing directly to community food assistance efforts.

This initiative not only equips participants with marketable horticultural skills but also fosters a strong sense of purpose, responsibility, and community connection. The Garden Project exemplifies ECI's broader mission of rehabilitation and service, creating a meaningful bridge between the institution and the surrounding community.

In addition to its ongoing programming, ECI continues to make significant infrastructure and operational advancements. A capital construction project, which includes the replacement of security fencing, upgrades to exterior lighting, and improvements to the High Temperature Hot Water (HTHW) system, is currently underway and scheduled for completion in 2026. Looking ahead, ECI also plans to implement digital scanning of incarcerated individual mail beginning in 2026, further enhancing safety and operational efficiency.

ECI has also taken a proactive role in advancing institutional security technology, having successfully participated in the pilot program for body-worn cameras—a major initiative aimed at increasing transparency, accountability, and safety for both staff and incarcerated individuals.

Overall, the Eastern Correctional Institution and its Annex remain committed to creating a structured, rehabilitative environment that prioritizes safety, education, and reintegration. Through its comprehensive programming, dedicated staff, and community partnerships, ECI continues to support positive transformation and contribute to the overall well-being and security of Maryland's correctional system.

MARYLAND CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION- JESSUP



The Maryland Correctional Institution – Jessup (MCIJ) is a medium-security facility that has served the state of Maryland since its establishment in 1981. Over the years, MCIJ has evolved to focus not only on secure containment but also on rehabilitation, personal growth, and preparing incarcerated individuals for successful reentry into society.

MCIJ is supported by a dedicated team of 226 custody staff and 73 civilian employees. These staff members play a critical role in maintaining facility security while also supporting the institution’s mission of rehabilitation and reentry. The facility further benefits from the involvement of community volunteers who contribute valuable expertise and resources to enhance programming and support services.

The institution offers a diverse range of programs designed to foster personal growth and positive change. Educational opportunities include formal academic courses as well as workforce development programs in Graphic Arts and Automotive Mechanics, which collectively produced 428 occupational and national certifications during FY2025. Additionally, MCIJ awarded 25 Maryland State High School Diplomas through the GED program, celebrating graduates at a ceremony held in August 2025 to honor the Class of 2025.

Volunteer-led initiatives complement these offerings, providing targeted support in areas such as personal skill-building, emotional development, and mental health. In FY2025, MCIJ facilitated eight volunteer-led programs, alongside three religious programs catering to the spiritual needs of participants. These programs collectively reflect the institution’s holistic approach to rehabilitation, equipping individuals with the skills, knowledge, and personal insight needed to reintegrate successfully into society.

Effective October 28, 2025, MCIJ launched the Medication Assisted Therapy (MAT) Program as part of the broader Opioid Response Program (ORP). Throughout FY2025, the MAT program has maintained a steady roster of participants requiring Suboxone treatment, while the ORP initiative has

provided individuals with Narcan and Fentanyl testing strips upon release, enhancing both personal safety and community health outcomes.

MCIJ also maintains a longstanding partnership with Goucher College, providing incarcerated individuals the opportunity to pursue higher education and earn bachelor's degrees. This program not only delivers academic credentials but also fosters a collaborative learning environment where participants build strong peer relationships, supporting both personal growth and long-term success. Graduates of the Goucher College program have consistently demonstrated lower recidivism rates, highlighting the transformative impact of education in breaking the cycle of incarceration and improving post-release outcomes.

Through its comprehensive combination of educational programming, workforce development, volunteer-led initiatives, religious services, and health-focused interventions, MCIJ continues to uphold its commitment to rehabilitation and preparing individuals for a productive, successful future in their communities.

MARYLAND CORRECTIONAL TRAINING CENTER



The Maryland Correctional Training Center (MCTC), located in Hagerstown, Maryland, is classified as an administrative-level facility. It primarily houses individuals classified from pre-release to medium security, though it occasionally accommodates maximum-security individuals on a temporary basis. As a “maintaining” facility, MCTC supports incarcerated individuals (IIs) at all stages of incarceration, from intake through reentry preparation. This broad focus underscores MCTC’s mission to equip individuals with the tools, education, and support necessary for successful reintegration into society.

In Fiscal Year 2025, MCTC successfully completed and passed both its Maryland Commission on Correctional Standards (MCCS) and American Correctional Association (ACA) audits for recertification—demonstrating the facility’s continued commitment to operational excellence and compliance with national correctional standards. Additionally, MCTC launched its first Commercial Driver’s License (CDL) training program in collaboration with Hagerstown Community College (HCC) at the HED/EHU complex. The program’s success has led to the initiation of a second round of CDL classes, expanding valuable workforce training opportunities for participants.

MCTC employs a dedicated staff of 334 custody and 88 civilian employees, all working collaboratively to ensure safety, structure, and a rehabilitative environment. The facility offers a wide array of programming designed to address educational, vocational, social, and emotional development needs. Current offerings include 14 religious services, 5 substance use treatment groups, 4 reentry preparation programs, 3 chapel groups, 8 educational and vocational programs, 4 social work–led groups, 3 cognitive behavioral groups, and 20 recreation programs. These programs—coordinated by staff and supported by volunteers—provide continuous opportunities for incarcerated individuals to grow, develop new skills, and prepare for successful reentry as contributing members of their communities.

MCTC is also deeply committed to supporting its veteran population through specialized programming and dedicated housing. The Veterans Housing Unit offers eligible participants a supportive environment that fosters camaraderie and shared understanding among those who have served. Weekly

veteran meetings provide a structured space for participants to discuss challenges, exchange support, and build resilience. To better serve this community, MCTC staff regularly engage with external organizations such as the Maryland Veterans Commission and the “Boots in Suits” program—bringing in guest speakers, resources, and additional support services to strengthen the veteran network within the facility.

A cornerstone of MCTC’s rehabilitative and service-oriented efforts is its partnership with America’s VetDogs, an initiative that trains incarcerated individuals to raise and prepare service dogs for military veterans. The program currently supports up to ten dogs at a time, each entering the facility at approximately eight weeks old and remaining under the care of two assigned trainers for 12 to 14 months. Through this process, participants not only learn valuable skills and responsibility but also experience the profound personal fulfillment that comes from giving back to others. Many handlers report that while they help change a veteran’s life, the experience equally transforms their own.

Through its comprehensive programming, professional development initiatives, and focus on restorative purpose, MCTC continues to uphold its mission of promoting accountability, rehabilitation, and successful reentry for every individual in its care.

NORTH BRANCH CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION



The North Branch Correctional Institution (NBCI) stands as Maryland’s highest-security correctional facility, classified as Maximum II. This designation reflects its critical role in securely housing and managing some of the state’s most complex incarcerated individuals (IIs). While maintaining stringent security operations, NBCI remains deeply committed to rehabilitation—providing structured opportunities for growth, learning, and positive change that support an individual’s progress toward lower security levels and eventual reintegration.

Originally opened in 2003 as part of the Western Correctional Institution (WCI), NBCI became an independent facility in September 2009. Since that time, the institution has continued to strengthen its operational framework and programming capacity. NBCI currently employs 318 custody staff and 83 civilian employees who work collaboratively to maintain safety, structure, and a rehabilitative environment.

Through the coordinated efforts of staff and volunteers, NBCI provides a broad spectrum of programming that addresses educational, psychological, social, and spiritual needs. The Religious Services Department facilitates nine weekly group offerings, providing essential opportunities for faith-based reflection, guidance, and support. The Psychology Department conducts three structured groups through the Special Needs Unit (SNU) program, focusing on therapeutic interventions and behavioral health. Social Work programming remains one of the most robust areas within the facility—offering 17 in-person groups, 3 in-cell groups, and 30 peer-facilitated groups, each designed to promote self-awareness, accountability, and healthy social connections among participants.

During Fiscal Year 2025, NBCI achieved several significant accomplishments across its departments. The Education Department celebrated meaningful academic milestones, with two students earning ASC I certificates, eleven earning ASC II certificates, seven earning ASC III certificates, and six individuals successfully completing their high school diplomas. A formal graduation ceremony recognized these achievements, underscoring NBCI’s commitment to educational advancement as a cornerstone of rehabilitation.

The Social Work Department also marked a notable success this year, with eleven incarcerated individuals completing the required hours for their Certified Peer Recovery Specialist (CPRS) credentials and submitting their applications to sit for the state certification exam. These accomplishments not only reflect the dedication of participants but also highlight the facility's emphasis on peer-led recovery and empowerment initiatives.

The Psychology Department continued to enhance therapeutic engagement by expanding the variety of interactive journal topics available for in-cell treatment, thereby broadening access to individualized and self-paced rehabilitation tools.

In addition to these departmental accomplishments, NBCI proudly completed the Veterans Memorial Wall project—a meaningful tribute to honor the service and sacrifice of the facility's incarcerated veterans. The wall stands as a permanent reminder of respect and gratitude, symbolizing the institution's ongoing commitment to recognizing and supporting its veteran population.

Overall, NBCI's comprehensive approach—balancing high-level security with robust rehabilitative programming—reflects its core mission: to maintain public safety while fostering meaningful personal development and successful reentry outcomes. The dedication of NBCI's staff and the achievements of its incarcerated population continue to demonstrate that rehabilitation and accountability can thrive even within the highest levels of security.

ROXBURY CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION



Roxbury Correctional Institution (RCI), established in 1983, operates as a medium-security facility dedicated to both safety and rehabilitation. The institution employs 214 custody officers and 78 civilian staff members who work collaboratively to maintain a secure environment while supporting the mission of rehabilitation and successful reentry for incarcerated individuals (IIs).

RCI serves a diverse population, including individuals with specialized needs. The facility's Special Needs Unit (SNU) provides targeted support for sight-impaired participants and those diagnosed with serious mental illnesses (SMI), offering individualized care and resources to ensure their unique needs are met.

Rehabilitation at RCI is supported through a wide range of programs and services. Religious programming spans eight denominations, including weekly services and special events, such as a weekend retreat hosted in partnership with Kairos. Educational opportunities remain a cornerstone of rehabilitation, with six formal academic courses available and the recent pilot of a tablet program for both educational and occupational instruction.

Vocational training is also a critical focus, helping participants acquire skills that improve post-release employability. Case management programs provide individualized guidance, while five reentry programs—including the “Into Work” graduation—support career readiness, community integration, and life skills development. Two life skills courses further strengthen participants’ interpersonal and decision-making abilities. To address behavioral health and recovery needs, the facility provides two psychology programs and, for the first time since COVID-19, an outpatient Addictions Treatment Protocol group, expanding treatment options for IIs.

Volunteer-supported initiatives through the Volunteer Activities Council (VAC) offer additional avenues for engagement, mentorship, and personal development. Programs include Alternatives to Violence, Family Day, Mediation, NA/AA meetings, the Storybook Project, and veteran-focused activities coordinated by the Incarcerated Veterans of Roxbury (IVOR), such as a walk-a-thon and a Memorial Day ceremony. In FY2025, the IVOR walk-a-thon raised over \$1,000, which was donated to

the Funkstown Legion, demonstrating the program’s positive impact on both participants and the community.

Other accomplishments in FY2025 include hosting Leadership Maryland, continuing to expand rehabilitative and treatment offerings, and successfully piloting educational tablets for both academic and occupational programming. These initiatives reflect RCI’s ongoing commitment to providing diverse, meaningful opportunities that promote growth, accountability, and successful reentry for all participants.

RCI also continues its focus on literacy and independence for sight-impaired participants through its Life Skills and Technology program, in partnership with Blind Industries and Services of Maryland (BISM). This program teaches Braille literacy and essential life skills, incorporating assistive technologies such as the DaVinci Pro, Ruby Reader, Optilec, and Braille writers, while using interactive games to reinforce practical skills. Since its inception, the program has trained approximately 40 incarcerated participants and over 250 staff members statewide, underscoring RCI’s commitment to inclusive, empowering rehabilitation initiatives.

Through this combination of specialized care, educational and vocational programming, volunteer engagement, and community-focused initiatives, RCI remains dedicated to equipping individuals with the skills, knowledge, and personal support needed to successfully reintegrate into society.

MARYLAND CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION- HAGERSTOWN



Maryland Correctional Institution – Hagerstown (MCI-H) has been operating continuously since 1942 as a medium-security facility. The institution plays a key role within the Maryland Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services, providing secure housing, safety, and rehabilitative services for incarcerated individuals (IIs). As a maintaining facility, MCI-H emphasizes long-term vocational training and workforce readiness, preparing participants with marketable skills to support a successful reentry into society.

Vocational programming at MCI-H is primarily delivered through Maryland Correctional Enterprises (MCE), which operates multiple shops and industrial programs on-site. These include two metal fabrication shops, a meat processing plant, an upholstery shop, a laundry facility, and the Prison Industry Enhancement (PIE) Program. Participants gain hands-on experience in trades such as metalworking, food processing, textiles, and industrial laundry operations. Certifications and skills earned through these programs are designed to improve employability post-release, supporting stable, productive lives and reducing recidivism. In 2025, MCI-H expanded its vocational offerings by introducing an on-site welding simulator and a heavy equipment simulator, providing participants with training in high-demand trades.

The facility employs 183 custody officers and 95 civilian staff members, who work collaboratively to maintain safety while implementing rehabilitative programs. In addition to vocational training, MCI-H provides a comprehensive range of services supporting personal growth and reentry preparation. The facility offers sixteen case management-led programs that provide individualized guidance and support, eleven educational programs to enhance literacy and job readiness, and nine religious services that address the diverse spiritual needs of the population. In 2025, MCI-H participated in a library and independent study pilot program, introducing five new courses to expand educational opportunities for incarcerated individuals.

MCI-H is also home to the America's VetDogs program, established in 2012 as the first of its kind in Maryland. Over the past twelve years, the facility has successfully trained sixty-three service dogs, which have been placed with veterans and first responders, providing critical support and enhancing independence. The program offers incarcerated individuals meaningful experiences that foster responsibility, skill development, and empathy. Currently, MCI-H houses eight dogs in training, allowing both staff and participants to experience fulfillment through contributions to the well-being of veterans and first responders.

In 2025, MCI-H partnered with the Williamsport American Legion and the Marine Corps League – Antietam Division to sponsor two additional service dogs, with a total sponsor donation of twelve thousand dollars, highlighting the facility's commitment to community engagement and rehabilitation through service.

Overall, MCI-H's combination of vocational training, educational programs, case management support, and community-focused initiatives demonstrates its dedication to preparing incarcerated individuals for successful reintegration. Through these programs, participants are equipped with the skills, knowledge, and experience necessary to lead productive, independent, and accountable lives after release.

WESTERN CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION



Western Correctional Institution (WCI) is a maximum-security adult facility that has been in operation since 1996. While primarily a high-security institution, WCI also accommodates minimum-security incarcerated individuals who are assigned to work outside the secure perimeter under the supervision of correctional staff. This structure allows the facility to operate efficiently while giving certain participants the opportunity to gain valuable hands-on experience.

The mission of WCI is to support the rehabilitation of incarcerated individuals and prepare them for successful reintegration into their communities. The facility achieves this through educational programs, vocational training, treatment services, and individualized case management. WCI offers a variety of institutional job assignments that allow participants to develop practical skills essential for personal and professional growth. The facility also hosts the Certified Peer Recovery Specialist (CPRS) Program, providing participants with the training and tools to support others in their recovery from addiction and mental health challenges.

WCI employs 248 custody staff and 107 support staff, who work collaboratively to maintain security while fostering a positive, rehabilitative environment. The facility offers fourteen religious groups and thirty-seven mental health and psychoeducational groups to support spiritual growth, emotional resilience, and personal development. In addition, four case management-led programs provide individualized support and reentry planning, while seven educational courses enhance academic skills. Five vocational shop programs offer hands-on training in trades such as Facilities Maintenance, Welding, Plumbing, Residential Carpentry, and Graphics Arts & Design, building job readiness and employability.

In FY 2025, WCI achieved several notable accomplishments. The facility installed medical rooms within the housing units to provide more timely and efficient healthcare services for incarcerated individuals. A dedicated Mental Health tier was established, allowing several individuals to be successfully removed from restrictive housing. The Medication Assisted Treatment program was expanded and operated successfully throughout the year, while the Peer Recovery Specialist program continued to provide critical support to those struggling with addiction, anger, or other mental health issues.

Educational and vocational achievements were also significant in FY 25. Fourteen incarcerated individuals earned a high school diploma, thirty-three earned a vocational certificate in their respective shop, thirty earned a certificate in Employment Readiness or Introduction to Computers, and a total of 150 National Certificates were awarded, reflecting the facility's ongoing commitment to preparing participants for success post-release.

WCI continues to partner with America's VetDogs, training service dogs for wounded and disabled American service members. This program provides incarcerated veterans and other participants with meaningful opportunities to give back while developing responsibility, purpose, and a connection to the community. By working with the dogs, participants gain valuable skills and personal growth opportunities, further reinforcing the facility's commitment to rehabilitation and service.

Overall, WCI's combination of vocational, educational, therapeutic, and community-focused programs demonstrates its dedication to equipping incarcerated individuals with the tools, skills, and support necessary for successful reintegration and productive lives after release.

JESSUP CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION



Jessup Correctional Institution (JCI), located in Jessup, Maryland, functions as both an intake and maintaining facility. The institution is staffed by over 500 employees, including 459 uniformed officers and 46 civilian staff members. JCI serves as a receiving facility for incarcerated individuals (IIs) coming from local facilities who have been sentenced, as well as for those returning to custody from community supervision. The institution also maintains long-term housing for individuals serving court-ordered sentences, with security classifications ranging from pre-release to maximum security. Incarcerated individuals have access to a wide variety of programming, treatment options, and job training opportunities.

JCI is home to several Maryland Correctional Enterprises (MCE) business units, which provide vocational and occupational training. These include the flagship furniture manufacturing unit, a license plate production facility that also creates picnic tables, grills, and other items for state agencies, and a textiles unit producing apparel for correctional and other state departments. Together, these shops employ nearly 250 incarcerated individuals, offering hands-on experience and marketable skills to support successful reentry.

In 2025, JCI welcomed a new Warden, Assistant Warden, and Chief of Security, with the administration emphasizing programming and reentry services. The institution currently operates a diverse array of programs, including partnerships with Bowie State University and the University of Baltimore, which enroll 40 and 67 students, respectively. School supplies for these students are provided through the Inmate Welfare Fund. With the assistance of 56 outside volunteers, JCI also offers 21 faith-based groups, creating opportunities for personal growth and spiritual development.

A cornerstone of the facility's rehabilitative efforts is the Peer Specialist program. Twenty incarcerated individuals have earned certification as Peer Specialists, with eighteen assigned institutional roles. These specialists facilitate programs including Smart Recovery, Five Stages of Incarceration, trauma-informed workshops, CAPP (Creating a Healthier Community), Smart Finance, GED preparation, and one-on-one substance use counseling. Peer Specialists also assist in de-escalating conflicts between incarcerated individuals, providing guidance rooted in lived experience and fostering a sense of community and support.

The education department at JCI continues to advance reentry and skill-building initiatives. In 2025, twenty incarcerated individuals earned their General Educational Diplomas (GEDs), surpassing the institutional goal. In partnership with the dietary department and Aramark, JCI introduced the IN2WORK program, designed for individuals with less than 18 months remaining on their sentences

who are interested in careers in food service. Participants complete training in the education department, earn SERVSAFE certification, and receive assistance with post-release job placement.

The facility also encourages positive behavior and community engagement through various events and recognition programs. Incarcerated individuals have the opportunity to showcase their talents at art expos and music banquets attended by loved ones. Additionally, the administration has established incentive banquets to reward good behavior, recognizing individuals who have maintained long-term infraction-free records. This system, which honors years of exemplary conduct, provides motivation and acknowledgment for those demonstrating sustained personal responsibility and commitment to positive change.

DORSEY RUN CORRECTIONAL FACILITY



Dorsey Run Correctional Facility (DRCF) is a minimum-security institution dedicated to supporting the rehabilitation and reintegration of incarcerated individuals (IIs) who are within seven years of their release. The facility serves both pre-release and transition-ready individuals, providing a structured environment focused on preparing participants for successful reentry into their communities. DRCF emphasizes equipping IIs with the skills, experience, and opportunities necessary to support long-term success upon release, while fostering personal responsibility, accountability, and work readiness.

The facility offers a variety of programs designed to provide practical work experience and support personal growth. Work release and outside details form a central part of DRCF's programming, allowing IIs to engage in meaningful employment under supervision. These opportunities help individuals develop critical job skills, cultivate professional habits, and gain experience that will assist them in reintegrating into the community. Educational programming is also a key component of the facility's mission, with three courses offered to enhance literacy, vocational capabilities, and overall employability.

Complementing these efforts, DRCF hosts ten volunteer-led programs that bring in community members and organizations to provide mentorship, guidance, and enrichment activities. Spiritual well-being is addressed through twelve religious programs, catering to the diverse faith backgrounds of the incarcerated population. Mental health and cognitive development are incorporated through one case management-led cognitive group, two mental health groups, and five cognitive behavioral therapy sessions, all designed to support positive behavior change and personal growth.

DRCF is supported by a dedicated staff of 250 employees, including 211 custody officers and 39 non-custody personnel, who ensure the safety, security, and effective operation of the facility. Their commitment is essential to creating a structured, supportive environment in which IIs can thrive and prepare for reentry.

One of DRCF's hallmark initiatives is its work release program, which partners with local employers to provide community-based employment opportunities. These partnerships include notable organizations such as Giant Foods, Jiffy Lube, Atlas Container, Rok Brothers Recycling, Dunkin', Denny's, and Maryland Correctional Enterprises. In fiscal year 2024, 116 participants engaged in the program, gaining valuable work experience, supporting their families, and saving funds to aid in their transition to the community. Through this program, DRCF provides a critical bridge between incarceration and community reintegration, helping reduce recidivism while fostering responsibility and independence.

In addition to employment programs, DRCF maintains robust landscaping and community service partnerships with the Maryland State Highway Administration, the Department of Veterans Affairs, and the Jessup Community Association. Incarcerated individuals contribute to the upkeep of cemeteries, roadways, churches, community centers, and public spaces, providing essential services while developing practical skills and civic pride. These initiatives demonstrate DRCF's commitment to rehabilitation, community engagement, and equipping IIs with the tools needed for successful reintegration into society.

CENTRAL MARYLAND CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION



Central Maryland Correctional Facility (CMCF) serves as both a minimum-security and pre-release institution, providing housing and programming for incarcerated individuals (IIs) who have less than seven years remaining on their sentences. The facility is dedicated to preparing these individuals for successful reintegration into society by offering a structured environment that emphasizes rehabilitation, personal development, and the acquisition of practical skills. With a focus on equipping IIs with the tools necessary for life after incarceration, CMCF provides a wide range of programs encompassing vocational training, educational opportunities, landscaping, and reentry services, all designed to foster employability, teamwork, communication, and time management skills. The facility also emphasizes the cultivation of core values such as empathy, responsibility, and community engagement, encouraging participants to develop the character traits necessary to thrive in society.

Established in 1960, CMCF initially operated to address the laundry needs of state correctional facilities and the Maryland Department of Health. Over time, its mission has evolved to prioritize rehabilitation and reentry, recognizing the critical role these efforts play in reducing recidivism and supporting long-term public safety. Today, the facility is staffed by 84 custody officers and 20 non-custody personnel who work collaboratively to maintain a secure and supportive environment, allowing for individualized attention and meaningful engagement between staff and incarcerated individuals.

CMCF offers a variety of programs to promote personal growth and community engagement. The institution hosts eight religious services to meet the spiritual needs of its population and provides three volunteer-led programs focused on enhancing self-awareness, social skills, and positive peer interaction. These initiatives, combined with vocational and educational opportunities, are designed to help IIs build the knowledge, skills, and personal values necessary for successful reintegration into society.

Vocational training is a cornerstone of CMCF's approach. The II-operated laundry plant provides incarcerated individuals with hands-on experience in a structured work environment, helping them develop essential job skills and workplace discipline. The facility also operates the Second Chances

Horse Farm in partnership with The Thoroughbred Retirement Foundation, allowing participants to care for retired racehorses while earning certifications in equine management. This program develops responsibility, compassion, teamwork, and technical skills that are directly applicable to employment in the growing field of animal care. In addition, CMCF has reintroduced the Flagger Force program, training participants in traffic control and safety protocols, further enhancing their employability while contributing to community safety.

Beyond vocational opportunities, CMCF fosters achievement and recognition through incentive programs, including banquets that celebrate participants' accomplishments in education, work assignments, and program engagement. These events highlight the progress and positive behavior of IIs, reinforcing the facility's commitment to rehabilitation and personal growth. Through its comprehensive programming, CMCF continues to prepare incarcerated individuals for productive and responsible lives upon release, supporting both individual transformation and the well-being of the communities they will rejoin.

BALTIMORE CITY CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTION



The Baltimore City Correctional Center (BCCC) is a minimum and pre-release facility that plays a vital role in preparing incarcerated individuals (IIs) for successful reintegration into the community. Since opening in 1984, BCCC has focused on providing programs designed to equip IIs with the educational, vocational, and occupational skills necessary to secure stable employment and reintegrate successfully upon release. These initiatives are aimed at reducing recidivism by giving participants practical tools and experience that can be directly applied in the workforce.

A key component of BCCC's programming is its collaboration with the Occupational Skills Training Center (OSTC). Through this partnership, incarcerated individuals receive hands-on vocational training and earn professional certifications in high-demand fields, helping to prepare them for meaningful employment after release. In addition to OSTC's programs, BCCC offers a variety of in-house educational courses, including employment readiness workshops, which focus on preparing participants for the challenges of securing and maintaining work in the community.

BCCC also provides IIs with work experiences through partnerships with agencies such as the State Highway Administration and the Baltimore City Department of Parks and Recreation. Participants engage in landscaping, beautification, and maintenance projects throughout the city, gaining practical skills while contributing positively to their communities. For eligible individuals, the facility offers work release opportunities, allowing them to gain real-world job experience under supervision. These programs support reentry by helping IIs develop professional skills, earn income, and begin rebuilding connections with their families and communities prior to release.

The facility is staffed by 90 custody officers and 10 civilian employees, who oversee the delivery of BCCC's comprehensive programming. The institution offers three educational courses, seven vocational programs, ten volunteer-led initiatives, and four religious services, all designed to support personal growth, rehabilitation, and successful reentry. BCCC's vocational programs, in particular, provide training in areas such as automotive technology, barbering, plumbing, HVAC, commercial roofing, and warehouse operations. Participants earn certifications recognized by both the Maryland Department of Labor and national trade organizations, enhancing workforce readiness and opening

pathways to sustainable careers. Flagging certification and OSHA 10 training are also available to further prepare IIs for employment upon release.

BCCC additionally hosts incentive and recognition events, including banquets celebrating achievements in programming and occupational training. These events provide incarcerated individuals with opportunities to showcase their skills and accomplishments, reinforcing positive behavior and highlighting the progress made through their participation in educational and vocational programs. Through these comprehensive services, BCCC continues to serve as a critical resource for incarcerated individuals, equipping them with the knowledge, skills, and experience necessary for successful reentry and contributing to the overall safety and well-being of the broader community.
