I. Introduction

Environment Article, Title 4, Subtitle 1, requires the Maryland Department of the Environment (Department or MDE) to implement an erosion and sediment control program to control sedimentladen runoff from land disturbing activities. The law allows for the delegation of enforcement authority to local jurisdictions found capable of enforcing compliance with the provisions of this subtitle and that have the capability comparable to that of the Department in terms of laws and procedures, manpower, equipment, and overall effectiveness. Obligations for delegation include reporting the number of permits issued and violations that occurred within the jurisdiction.

In 2019, the Governor approved Chapters 517 and 518, of the Acts of 2019 (House Bill 703/Senate Bill505). This legislation requires that delegated jurisdictions provide additional reporting to the Department on environmental violations in the Critical Area and Sensitive Areas of the state. In addition, the legislation requires the Department to publish the data submitted by the jurisdictions and submit the data to the Governor and General Assembly on or before March 1 of each year. To meet these requirements, the Department revised its data collection and submission process for the delegation of enforcement authority to reflect the recently enacted law. These changes included developing an internet-based data collection form that was shared with the delegated jurisdictions. This form included two new sections on inspection and enforcement in the Critical Area and Sensitive Areas.

This *Annual Report on Environmental Violations*, 2019, published July 2020 (Annual Report), fulfills the requirement of §4-801, Environment Article, Subtitle 8 of the *Annotated Code of Maryland*. The following summarizes the data collected by the Department from the delegated jurisdictions.

III. Summary of Environmental Violations in Maryland

Data collected from the delegated jurisdictions are presented in Tables 2 through 8. The summary presented below covers data submitted by all 22 jurisdictions for fiscal year 2019 (i.e., July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019) or "FY19."

Permit Information

- A total of 3,819 major permits were issued. Major permits typically include grading, building, and sediment control associated with an engineered erosion and sediment control plan.
- The total disturbed acreage for the major permits was 13,317 acres.
- A total of 4,101 other permits were issued. Other permits typically include permits associated with a standard erosion and sediment control plan for minor earth disturbances or single-lot residential agreements in lieu of requiring custom designed or engineered plans.
- The total disturbed acreage for these other issued permits was 3,746 acres.

*NOTE: In the following tables the use of "-" indicates that data were not reported by the local jurisdiction.

Inspections and Enforcement in the Critical Area

- 12 jurisdictions indicated that they have Critical Area within their boundary.
- A total of 1,428 sediment control inspections were performed in the Critical Area.
- A total of 101 sediment control violation notices were issued.
- A total of 72 building and grading violation notices were issued.
- A total of 46 stop work orders were issued.
- The sum of \$19,553 was collected in fines or securities.
- 274 complaints were received.
- The jurisdictions provided assistance to correct violations in 41 instances.

II. Appendices

Appendix A: Environment Article §4-802 Environmental Violations - Reporting Requirements

§4–802.

- (a) (1) On or before January 1 each year, each jurisdiction that has delegated authority under Subtitle 1 of this title to enforce sediment and erosion control laws and regulations shall report to the Department on:
 - (i) The total number of cases alleging violations of:
 - 1. Sediment and erosion control laws and regulations; and
 - 2. Building and grading permits; and
 - (ii) The total number of cases alleging violations in the Critical Area of:
 - 3. Sediment and erosion control laws and regulations; and
 - 4. Building and grading permits.

(2) The information reported to the Department under paragraph (1) of this subsection shall include:

- (i) The number and nature of:
 - 1. Formal complaints issued by the jurisdiction and whether the complaint is in the Critical Area;
 - 2. Stop work orders issued by the jurisdiction; and
 - 3. Alleged violations reported by citizens to the jurisdiction;
- (ii) The number of court proceedings involving an alleged violation, including the final disposition of each court proceeding;
- (iii) The dollar amount of fines levied and collected by the jurisdiction as a result of a violation;
- (iv) The dollar amount of civil and criminal penalties imposed and collected as a result of a violation;
- (v) 1. Whether the jurisdiction provided compliance assistance to correct a violation and the nature of that assistance; and

2. Whether the compliance assistance provided by the jurisdiction led to compliance; and

- (vi) The number of inspectors and other staff of the jurisdiction assigned to inspection and enforcement of:
 - 1. Title 8, Subtitle 18 of the Natural Resources Article;
 - 2. Sensitive areas ordinances;
 - 3. 100-year floodplain ordinances;
 - 4. Sediment and erosion control laws and regulations; and
 - 5. Building and grading permits.
