LEAD POISONING PREVENTION COMMISSION OVERVIEW

The Lead Poisoning Prevention Commission, established under Environment Article 6, Subtitle 8, advises the Department of the Environment, the Legislature, and the Governor regarding lead poisoning prevention in Maryland.

COMMISSION MEMBERSHIP

The Commission consists of 19 members. Of the 19 members:

- (i) One shall be a member of the Senate of Maryland, appointed by the President of the Senate;
- (ii) One shall be a member of the Maryland House of Delegates, appointed by the Speaker of the House; and
- (iii) 17 shall be appointed by the Governor as follows:
- 1. The Secretary or the Secretary's designee;
- 2. The Secretary of Health and Mental Hygiene or the Secretary's designee;
- 3. The Secretary of Housing and Community Development or the Secretary's designee;
- 4. The Maryland Insurance Commissioner or the Commissioner's designee;
- 5. The Director of the Early Childhood Development Division, State Department of Education, or the Director's designee;
- 6. A representative of local government;
- 7. A representative from an insurer that offers premises liability coverage in the State;
- 8. A representative of a financial institution that makes loans secured by a rental property;
- 9. A representative of owners of rental property located in Baltimore City built before 1950;
- 10. A representative of owners of rental property located outside Baltimore City built before 1950;
- 11. A representative of owners of rental property built after 1949;
- 12. A representative of child health or youth advocacy group;
- 13. A health care provider;
- 14. A child advocate;



- Assist MDE and HCD to study and report on methods for pooling insurance risks, with recommendations for legislation as appropriate by January 1, 1995;
- Develop recommendations in consultation with the Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) by January 1, 1996, for a financial incentive or assistance program for window replacement in affected properties;
- Provide an annual review of the implementation and operation of the Lead Poisoning Prevention Program under HB 760, beginning January 1, 1996.

COMMISSION MEETINGS

Frequency, times and places. - The Commission shall meet at least quarterly at the times and places it determines.

Chairman. – From among the members, the Governor shall appoint the Chairman of the Commission.

Quorum. – A majority of the members then serving on the Commission constitutes a quorum.

The Commission may act upon a majority vote of the quorum.

Compensation; expenses. A member of the Commission:

- (1) May not receive compensation; but
- (2) Is entitled to reimbursement from the Fund for reasonable travel expenses related to attending meetings and other Commission events in accordance with the Standard State Travel Regulations. (1994, ch. 114, § 1.)

Introductions – The meeting began at 9:50 AM.

Old Business - Minutes from the January 6, 2011 meeting were approved as written.

Future Meeting Dates

First Thursday of every month. All meetings are scheduled for 9:30 AM – 11:30 AM at the Maryland Department of the Environment, 1800 Washington Boulevard, Baltimore, MD 21230. The next Lead Commission meeting is scheduled for Thursday, March 3, 2011.

Update from 2010 Task force thoughts: March meeting is still to be determined. Pat McLaine is continuing to write comments and an outline. Have evaluative info – should be able to make good recommendations.

Legislation:

Alvin – Lead safe improvements tax credit (HB527) – introduced several times over the years. Eric stated the maximum available is \$1M cap for the year. If you do lead reduction approved by DHCD, you can ask for \$5,000 credit per unit, maximum of \$50,000 credit for each individual.

Pat Connor – asked about pre 1978 housing. Applies to rental and owner occupied as well. DHCD has to approve.

Kory Lemmort updated the Commission on HB1033 – lead paint dust testing – there are some inconsistencies to be cleared up. First hearing is March 9th at 1pm before Environmental Matters. Delegate Oaks and McIntosh are sponsors. This Bill does away with visual inspection and there are minor revisions from last year's Bill. Ed Landon stated in 2009, no action was taken on this Bill. In2010 it was unfavorable. Under Full Risk Reduction (FRR) it still requires re-hanging doors, smooth and cleanable surfaces. Modified Risk Reduction (MRR) – these removed in lieu of a general comment to comply with all state and local laws. Alvin asked - MRR eliminates tenant's option to sign off. Visual not required but if you're doing cleaning, encapsulating, etc. wouldn't there be some requirement for a visual inspection to verify that these were done? Patrick Connor – still getting supervisor's statement because inspector can not attest to HEPA vacuuming and washing being done.

Agency Updates:

MDE – Alvin introduced Joe Wright, new Section Head of the Lead Rental Registry at MDE. Alvin received notice of CDC grant cut 30%. Must go through a re-application process of a new 3-year grant competing with others. Maximum of 600,000/yr. Will be making drastic cuts in activities. Across the board with other states, the grant application is due to CDC March 16th. CDC wants healthy homes added as a unit. We should know by June if we are awarded. Big case still to be decided. We have very little general funds. We're adding healthy home questions to environmental investigations and giving out information. We do not want to lose sight of lead issues.

Pat McLaine stated that the Baltimore Healthy Homes program is a national leader and has developed good ways of adding Healthy Homes approach to lead visits. We can be more effective by taking the holistic look. We do not want to lose site of lead issues. Blood lead levels of 5ug/dL are associated with problems with kindergarten reading readiness.

<u>CECLP</u> - Molly Call – Cooperation of NGOs. Let us know if they can help. Alvin – CDC wants a broad mix of support for this approach. Perfect for the lead commissioners to discuss as it is a diverse group. MDE will need letters of support. Pushing to get it to our fiscal people. Had to send letter of intent – haven't had to do that before. The Commission voted to send a letter of support for the CDC grant to broaden the program's scope. Alvin will draft a letter and send out to the Commissioners for review.

DHMH – Representative not in attendance.

DHCD - Ed Landon – reviewing bills on "Green".

BCHD – Eric Lomboy reported that Maryland did not receive funding from HUD and thus the City will not receive any further federal funding. The BCHD lead program will cease to exist as of March 31st. Services will most likely be overseen by Ken Strong, Department of Housing. Baltimore City will maintain attorneys for enforcement, but

grant money will not be available to abate houses. As a result, Eric Lomboy announced he is resigning as a member of the Commission. Pat McLaine asked how people will continue to receive these services. Eric indicated that he was not sure. DHCD may do it, but has constraints that would impact the program. For instance DHCD currently has no ability to move tenants out of properties while work is being done. It is up to the tenants to work it out with the landlords. Pat McLaine suggested that the Commission write a letter of concern about services being maintained by the City. Ed Landon indicated that the Commission needed specifics to what is being eliminated and how those items will be addressed.

Members voted to support sending a letter to BCHD regarding the Commission's concerns about maintaining lead abatement services in Baltimore City. Pat McLaine and Ed Landon will draft the letter and send it to Alvin Bowles who will send the letter for review via email.

Office of Childcare – Cheryl Hall - Follow up questions about information from Patricia Vauls (presented at February's meeting). Patricia is continuing conversations with people. In the midst of clarifying violations none of these programs in question were operating illegally. Going thru reorganization – need new regional manager. Spoke to inspectors for Belair Road and Loch Raven.. Harford Road locale was licensed. Payson St. program review in process – trying to determine status. Office of Child Care will get together with Kory Lemmort to see how Coalition can help with lead abatement projects.

MIA – Nothing to report at this time.

Coalition – Some limited resources in LEAP program.

Patrick Conner – Vacants to Value programs – who is handling lead issues? Super Lien certificate would be a good idea for \$10. Eric is only familiar with the City getting properties for land bank. Two different lien certificate levels in City. We should just charge one price. Does Commission want to do something about it? Recommend sending letter asking for clarification – voted in favor. Patrick Connor to write a letter.

Introductions – The meeting began at 9:40 am. Alvin Bowles will be facilitating this meeting and future meetings until the Governor appoints a new Chairperson.

Old Business – Approval of the minutes from the February 17, 2011 were postponed. Several changes were submitted to Tracy Smith. The Commission will review these minutes, with changes, at the April meeting.

Future Meeting Dates

First Thursday of every month. All meetings are scheduled for 9:30 am -11:30 am at the Maryland Department of the Environment, 1800 Washington Boulevard, Baltimore, MD 21230. The next Lead Commission meeting is scheduled for Thursday, April 7, 2011, in the AERIS conference room.

Legislation:

HB 1254 – Alvin stated that we would like to stagger returns for registration so the work is spread out. There are 30,000 returns. People are calling in at the same time we are trying to get things out. There will be no change in fees. Not sure if Bill is out of rules committee.

HB 527 & 1033 – Lead safe improvements tax credit and lead paint dust testing.

Pat Connor – Asked if the Department will have time to review the Bill to see if language about statement of work is being struck. Wants to make sure this doesn't happen because inspectors can't stipulate to HEPA vacuum use.

Alvin – The Department can always review the Bill and make comments. All lead-related bills are reviewed.

Pat McLaine – want discussion on section A2 in Bill 1033. Pat Connor – says it's included in A1,2

Wes Stewart – House Bill 1033 on the House side, different bill on the Senate side. The Governor is in support of Bill. Very confident with Maggie McIntosh sponsoring. Dust testing language is supposed to mirror Comar. Baltimore - A lot of progress collectively, but not a leader anymore. HUD funded study in Columbia to see if visual inspection was sufficient. 73% passed visual but failed dust. Need to have safer standard. 73% of owners are already using dust testing.

Pat McLaine – Information is very clear in regard to children. We have supported it before, but her concern is what is being removed from this Bill (taking out structural defects, etc.). We need to understand what's being taken out.

Wes – Opposition in past was to cost. Many of these things are already part of the housing code. Require that they meet housing code and that solves the problem. If everyone complied with the housing code, we would be a long way to ending poisoning.

Ed Landon – Adopted livability code as of last year. Each jurisdiction can follow different code if they want but most have adopted it and some have made amendments to it. 57 jurisdictions can now modify to their liking. Question as to who enforces this. It gives everybody guidance.

Cheryl Hall – Does the Department of Housing make recommendations? Ed Landon stated "No, not really".

Patrick Connor – Pg 3, 18-22. Will the Coalition look at reference? Things are not there anymore that were before. Wes stated "Yes, it will be corrected.

Patrick Connor – Can we have IPC in reference?

Wes – When you get that specific, you lose people. It is better to be broad if you want the Bill to pass.

Ed Landon – Read livability code definition. This is what is on the web page. It says enforcement is local. If a jurisdiction has a different maintenance code, that's okay. Patrick Connor – Can the Coalition look at striking statement of work? Can we look at putting that back in? It will leave inspectors in a quandary.

Wes Stewart– Part of the dust testing is verifying that stuff was done.

Pat McLaine – Is there any reason it doesn't say rules and regulations? Statement of work was created for visual inspectors to verify work was done that inspector can stipulate to.

Wes Stewart—Regarding sills and wells, if lead free, will not have to be done again. Alvin Bowles—We need to poll members thru e-mails to see if we'll support this Bill since we do not have enough members in attendance at today's meeting.

Pat McLaine – It would be a good idea to ask for votes on all 3 of these Bills.

Alvin – When you vote, copy everyone. The e-mail needs to go out today or tomorrow because next Wednesday is the hearing date.

Wes Stewart– Tax Credit Bill hearing is today. \$1 Million limit.

Alvin Bowles– By noon Tuesday we'll be ready to do letter or not.

Pat McLaine – Loss of federal funds to City. Ed Landon and Pat McLaine worked on the letter of concern, but the decision was already made to move responsibilities into the City Department of Housing. It is still important to send a letter reflecting that it is important the abatement services be picked up and the difficulty involved in getting things up and running. Maintain strong infrastructure within the program. The letter will ultimately go to the Mayor.

Ed Landon – In short, what are they going to do about what they're losing?

Agency Updates:

MDE – Currently working on the FY-2012 CDC Grant application for submission. Alvin Bowles announced that Wicomico County is back in grant.

DHMH – Not represented

DHCD – Nothing to report at this time.

BCHD – Making sure we continue as much as possible.

MIA – Nothing to report at this time.

OCA – Cheryl Hall – nothing to report at this time

Donna Webster (WCHC) via phone – reminded the Commission of the May meeting to be held at the Fire Department in Salisbury. Donna would like an attendance count submitted prior to the meeting.

Ed Landon suggested changing the meeting time to 11 am - 1 pm due to the distance in traveling.

Patrick Connor asked Donna if the Commission could see the City Sweep area in Wicomico when the meeting is held there. Donna Webster said she will have a power point on "City Sweep".

Coalition - Wes Stewart – Appreciates the support of the Income Tax Funding Bills. EPA Renovation Rule went into full effect on 12/31/10. Our concern is workers will go down to lower level. Maryland has a stricter standard than EPA.

Alvin Bowles – There is no Renovation Rule at MDE. They are not involved this year. MDE hasn't been given any authority in regard to the EPA rule.

Legislation:

Tax credit – failed in committee

Ruth Ann Norton – 1033 passed the House. HB 1033 is now in the Senate. It most likely will pass. Increase access to civil penalties by MDE. Requires dust testing on Modified Risk Reductions and Notice of Defect on homes with kids under six. Summer study

committee looking at 50-78 properties – will they be brought into law? Will make recommendations about dust test being required at time of sale. Supported by Chair of Environmental Matters Committee, Governor, and others. Owners see it sets one standard. MDE very instrumental. Commission wrote a letter about work being done on 2010 plan.

Ruth Ann Norton – Delegate committed to idea of what plan is for lead poisoning moving forward.

Alvin – 1254 – staggering of due dates for registration passed the House and is in the Senate. The Lead Rental Registry, at MDE, just started a contract to put registrations and payments online. This process is anticipated take at least a year before it is up and running. The Lead Rental Registry will have the ability to get better information. The old system will be migrated into the new system. This will allow for better ability to contact those who haven't paid. This is the first group in the Department to go this way.

Ed Landon – The "Green Code" will most likely pass. IGCC – International Green Construction Code.

Agency Updates: MDE – Online registration

DHMH - None

DHCD - International code council – adopting 2012 code a year early. Will start process next month. Required to meet energy standards. Local code officials asking for training. Will be info on webstite. ADA recently made changes we have to adopt. Attend a course if you need to understand these. MD accessibility code is in addition to ADA. Information is on the web page.

Patrick Connor – He asked if code training staggered across state? Answer is Yes. Try to find places that are free to do training. Have grant for next three years. Web has demonstration for blower door test. International property code also to be adopted. Updated by FCC. The livability code must be followed at minimum.

BCHD – Lead abatement now officially under Housing. Ruth Ann Norton has received calls asking about what's going on. Ruth Ann suggested to the Commission that we have someone make clear on both previous websites.

Patrick Connor – Nothing technically has changed, but local jurisdictions have changed some things. Local jurisdictions have weakened some of the code, i.e. under performance standards. We're not in a position to go after them at this point. The question is "can they lessen the code?"

Office of Childcare – Nothing

Insurance Commission – Nothing

Coalition

A hearing is scheduled for April 12, 2011 on the loss of HUD funding and the Housing Authority issue. Suggestion made to the Commission to look at the Housing Authority issue. Using defense that it is HUD funding is an interesting argument. City does have to look at dealing with damages on both back and front end. Strong argument about what is fair and just. This is a difficult position for city employees. The Mayor should get a committee together.

June 20-23, 2011 – National Conference of HUD, CDC, and EPA. In June there will be a road block in Maryland. Airways will be saturated with lead poisoning prevention. Look at www.leadfreekids.org.

Federal shutdown – CDC recommended 50% cut to budget. It's not looking good. In 2012, the budget is the issue. HUD hazard control budget doing okay so far. Just did two reports on Green and Healthy Homes and Green and Healthy Homes national dialogue/best practices. Our new websites will have dialogue on this.

Alvin – CDC budget – last year ~\$800,000. This year \$600,000 maximum. Add on restriction that state agencies can only get one third of that. Alvin will keep the Commission posted on the status. It is across the board on all states that received CDC grants.

Ruth Ann – Anticipate 49 awards. Cities had to serve 1 million citizens or more or team up to get that number. The chance of Maryland getting full amount is high.

Pat McLaine – Issue of national budget – most of CDC budget is intact. This cut is fairly unprecedented.

Ruth Ann – A GAO report of CDC's handling of lead in water. Head of CDC talked about his frustration. Have been talking to House and Senate. It's a huge thing to overcome when Congress asks for reduction.

Ed Landon – Maryland launched an Emergency Mortgage Assistance (EMA) for people 3-12 months in arrears on a mortgage. Your income is recalculated if you've lost a job for instance. It is a \$40 M program for the next 6 months only. Patrick Connor said he referred two people and the program was able to assist. Ed Landon stated that 250,000 people have been helped. They have received 12,000 phone calls. This is still a problem.

Old Business – Motion to approve minutes from last meeting: Ed Landon stated that "Emergency Management Program" should be "Emergency Mortgage Program". Minutes approved with change.

Future Meeting Dates

The Commission meetings are scheduled for the first Thursday of every month. All meetings are scheduled from 9:30 am – 11:30 am at the Maryland Department of the Environment, 1800 Washington Boulevard, Baltimore, MD 21230. The next Lead Commission meeting is scheduled for Thursday, June 9, 2011.

Pat McLaine reported on Task Force: stated that the outline has been divided up into sections and given to members. The next Task Force meeting is scheduled for Friday, June 3, 2011 at 10 am (MDE), in the Stat Room. The group hopes to have something for next the next Lead Commission meeting.

Lead Study Group – House Bill 1033 passed with amendments. Legislation will be signed on the 19th probably. There are 4 sections to this Bill. Section 1 deals with risk reduction standards and allows for dust tests only now. Visual inspection deleted. For Modified Risk Reductions – dust tests and 9 treatments now are required, which is the distinct difference between that and a Full Risk Reduction.

In occupied units, the tenant can be temporarily relocated or get the modified risk reduction (MRR) certificate. The tenant sign off is gone. In regards to enforcement – we can now seek civil injunctive relief. This will help in cases where people aren't complying. Dust test lab results issue requires new regulations. The lab must send failing results directly to MDE. The Lead Study Group will be reporting by December 31st. MDE must present report on status of poisoning in the State, funding needs, legislation needed, etc. The Bill has a listing of all actors they want to be a part of the study group which includes some commission types and some additional folks. Alvin read the list. Bill becomes law at two different times. The Risk Reduction portion on 1/1/2012. Other parts begin 7/1/11.

Cheryl Hall asked if the lab reporting will mirror EBL notices.

Alvin answered "Yes". It won't require a lot of changes in wording of regulations.

Cheryl asked if the types of facilities that are failing can be looked at.

Alvin – Yes, over time.

Mary Snyder-Vogel asked if the study group will have separate meetings.

Alvin said he is not sure. He will try to match up with commission meeting times.

Ed stated that we are basically going to be developing the next 10-year plan in this study group.

Alvin said we may do video conferencing. IT will have to set up.

Sara Reese-Carter asked about meeting in July and August.

Alvin stated that the Commission takes off in August; however, will probably have to meet this August because of the study group. Not sure who the Chair will be. Pat asked if there will be support staff.

Alvin said no that it would pretty much be only him.

Linda Roberts commented on P.G. County seminar last year. It was very worthwhile. This year the seminar is on June 2nd, which is why the Commission is meeting is scheduled for June 9th instead. Tracy will send out a mass e-mail. You must register for the seminar ahead of time.

Delegate Oaks arrived and was updated on conversation

Agency Updates:

MDE – looking at whole of legislation. Will begin writing regulations. There will be a couple of deletions and changes. More regulations later on for lab results issue. Still waiting on "Big Case" (second anniversary today).

Sara Reese-Carter – asked for summary of argument.

Alvin updated the qualified offer issue and the registration and timing of payment. Is the law constitutional? No severability in law.

CDC grant was cut 50%. This year we get \$800,000. Next year the max we can get is \$600,000 and only 1/3 can go to the state agency. We can expect additional cuts the

following year. We have submitted the best proposal for grant we could. There are 40-50 agencies applying for this. CDC combined lead and healthy homes programs together and then cut them. Expecting more work for less money and want to see a sustainability plan for elimination of federal funding. It is much harder to meet requirements this year.

Pat McLaine asked about the 2010 blood level report.

Alvin indicated Dr. Keyvan is working on it and will have draft in June.

Pat asked if we could we get something ASAP?

Alvin said MDE is working with DHMH to get new data system up and going. DHMH is providing servers. We will put our information in there. This will centralize where blood level data is kept. Other agencies will have access to it. It is not available to the public. MDE will have control of data. DHMH controls the hardware. Met with Deputy Secretary of Health on this.

Online registration and payment is moving along. Hopefully there will be something up and running by January 2012. MDE will still process by mail this Fall. Our database is being cleaned in preparation for this. It is more complicated than originally thought.

We're working with MVA on this as they have a similar system.

Cheryl Hall – not linked to other databases?

Alvin – No. We won't know nature of how buildings are used. Not everybody has a computer, so there will still be some kind of mail out each year.

Donna Webster – can municipalities look up things on the system?

Alvin answered no, but if there's a computer available, the property owner will be able to pull up account and pay.

Donna Webster asked if schools will be able to access the EBL database.

Alvin responded, no, only the health departments. Primary providers won't be able to access database either.

Cheryl asked if the system would be linked to the immunization registry.

Alvin answered, not on a level where you can identify a child. Only in general ways. Pat said that it could be done. It's done in other states (RI). You can get better rates of immunization this way.

Cheryl said it is easier to deal with. We should discuss this in Task Force.

Alvin –3 or 4 databases have to be moved along with the City's information. There are over a million entries. We will keep our system up and running for awhile. HHLPSS is a requirement of this grant. Stellar may crash at some point.

DHMH – Nothing to report at this time.

DHCD - Bill passed (see last meetings notes). The International Green Code will be included into State Building code next cycle. HB630 – standards for residential, HB972 for Commercial. The State has one year to adopt the new codes and the local authorities 6 months after the state adopts they can amend or adopt. The Green code will not be

published until March of 2012. DHCD's Emergency Mortgage Program (EMA) helps people who have lost jobs, etc. It is a federally funded non-payback assistance program. There are specific criteria to qualify. This is only for a limited time, see Duct's website www.mdhousing.org.

BCHD – Trying to put everything in a one-stop-shop.

Office of Childcare – Nothing to report at this time.

Insurance Commission – Nothing to report at this time.

Coalition – Kory Lemmert reported HUD released NOFA. Lead hazard control – States and Cities only. The City will apply for funding that was just lost, but it's an uphill battle. Previous experience is considered. This application is questionable. Big change is you can't use leveraged funds. They now require hard money. Healthy Homes production grant – Coalition to apply for this along with outlying counties. The deadline is June 9th.

The City Council scheduled hearing on not paying lead judgments.

Delegate Oaks asked what is the City doing to restore the funding? He is very upset about the City not paying lawsuit judgments. After laboring to get legislation passed, it is very frustrating to have to deal with the City not paying.

BCHD, Geraldine Woodson informed the Commission that Genevieve Birkby will be stepping in as the Healthy Homes representative.

Only 22 have gotten vouchers out of 140 this year. Landlords are handling the lead problems but it can take them longer to correct the situation. The voucher gets the family to safe housing faster.

Pat McLaine summarized that a family gets a voucher if you have both high level of lead and can't work out something with the landlord. This is part of the public health safety system. Things are getting better. Connor 12 step system only took about 2 weeks to get kid into safer housing.

Ed Landon stated it takes less than 90 days to get into safe housing now.

FUTURE MEETING DATES

The next Lead Commission meeting is scheduled for August 11 in the AERIS conference room at MDE... The Commission will meet from 9:30 am til 10:30 am and then the Summer Study will meet from 10:30 am-12:00 pm.

Jan Goslee – council for BCH was present to discuss the situation with the Housing Authority: 1996 is when the program started with the risk reduction act. The Housing Authority is currently compliant with the law. All judgments predate 1996. Latest case was from 1992.

Other concerns from the Commission:

Ed Landon – 185 cases were mentioned in testimony. Where are these cases coming from? Can we get a list of areas where these originated from? We don't want to look like we're ignoring something that's still there. Is there some kind of legislation we should be pushing in Annapolis to help the City?

Jan Goslee – Not sure how helpful knowing the addresses would be since we've been in compliance since 1996. Why is this unique? Contacted other housing authorities. New York self insures. It has settled 57 cases with an average payout of \$119,000/claim. Boston also self insures and had only 10 claims over the last 10 years. Philadelphia has had a couple of settled cases. Five claimants in one case settled for \$450,000. One claimant had a level of 58. A number of factors contribute to this problem. Legislature passed a bill in 2001 to cover the Housing Authority even if they do not have an employee being sued. Cannot be retroactive. The Local Government Tort Claims Act covers other housing authorities. We didn't have this cap, so this is one reason why we have these large claims. The cases highlighted in the

Sun, one of the properties had XRF readings, the other had passable dust wipes. Since the Housing Authority was the only defendant, it got hit with a huge judgment. It is on appeal.

Pat McLaine – Before 1996 there were federal laws and requirements for Section 8 that are different. Was the Housing Authority not in compliance with federal laws? The first dust laws started in 1980s.

Jan Goslee – in the 90's the government provided funding for activities. They are not saying people weren't hurt by lead, but the two cases in the papers involved people living in houses without lead. They had insurance, but it was cancelled. The insurance we had had limits that even if we had it today it wouldn't have helped. It was a claims based policy. We would have exhausted it quickly because of what MD tort law allows.

Kory Lemmert – It's actually federally controlled funds. Cases were judgments.

Ed Landon – lead levels were low. If these are what Housing is getting sued for, that's scary.

Jan Goslee – these were under CDC's level of concern at the time.

Kory Lemmert – Statute of limitations expires in 2017. Age 18 plus 3

Pat McLaine – What is estimate of number of claims?

Jan Goslee – It is not know what the estimate number of claims are. In Baltimore, there is a lot of advertisement being done. One of the problems we experience is that there are other properties where people go wherein that property owner has no insurance. Attorneys go where the money is.

Mary Snyder-Vogel – how are things since 1996?

Jan Goslee - Well

UPDATES ON THE 2010 PLAN TASKFORCE

Pat McLaine updated the Commission on the Task Force: The Taskforce has met several times by conference call. The group is trying to get needed information.

AGENCY UPDATES

MDE – Alvin Bowles - Getting Summer Study together. There is one organizational change to report. The Lead Rental Registry at MDE is now in the financial section of the Land Management Administration (LMA). Registration will no longer be part of the Lead Program. The Department is pursuing people with more intensity than ever before. Registration and payment are not necessarily done together. People get an owner number to get a certificate and then do not register and pay. Patrick Connor asked what was being done about those who mail in paperwork without their payment. Joe Wright, Section Head of the Lead Rental Registry said they will be matching paperwork to payments. Patrick Connor asked what the recovery record was. Joe Wright responded that it was beyond his scope. Alvin Bowles stated the they cannot go after them as fees. They ask for a penalty because you can't retroactively be in compliance. With the online system, they will be able to query and develop reports of different kinds. Mary Snyder-Vogel doesn't understand the back work. Alvin Bowles said the law is

written that way. Mary Snyder-Vogel opinion is that this seems illogical. Alvin Bowles said they are working on where you can't register without paying.

There is a concern about MDE's compliance level with lead. Alvin said all financial activities will be in one place. Pat McLaine – because it's online, I assume it's much less data entry. Are those forms scanable? Alvin Bowles– It will take awhile. It takes six months to go thru all the boxes that come in. The Lead Rental Registry is a pilot for the whole department. He's been pushing this for years. Staggered registration is under consideration.

Patrick Connor asked if there were provisions where the PO can upload properties? Joe Wright responded that all of the data is merged with the new system. Pat McLaine asked when will the system go live. Alvin Bowles answered November 2011 is the goal.

Attention paid to how do we fund and manage.

- The distinction is clear between modified and full risk reduction.
- Still have a Supervisor Statement of Work but no tenant sign-off.
- Window sill treatment change in law.

- Clarification of a fire code change to (the) law.
- Will have some impact, but nothing major economically.

Lesa Hoover – question about disseminating (information) to members. MDE to provide law changes (including on the web.)

Patrick Connor – question about confirming if there will be inspector/contractor meetings.

Alvin Bowles – MDE will have inspector/contractor meetings.

Patrick Connor – HB 1033 to affect 23% of inspections. (Visual inspections) will no longer be available after January 1, 2012. Will look @ (in the future.) Concerns about notifying smaller property owners.

Alvin Bowles – Both emergency (which will be in effect for 6 months) and the public comment method for regulation approval will be proposed.

Alvin Bowles – Discussed regulation changes, including the definition of lead hazard risk reduction treatments (full risk vs. modified) that were strictly based on (the) law changes. Shall to may, may to shall may have changed a couple of times in the proposed regulation changes.

Alvin Bowles – Discussed the definition of chipping, flaking paint, modified (risk reduction consists of) treatments plus a dust test, and that modified (risk reduction) meets a full (risk reduction). Still have Supervisor Statements of Work but not tenants' sign-offs. Still need an inspector to sign-off.

Patrick Connor – Question about a dust test for a modified (risk reduction). Specifically if exteriors and common areas requires intact paint since not a lot of inspectors do modified (risk reductions.)

INTRODUCTIONS

Meeting began at about 9:44am – Alvin Bowles presiding. October 6 minutes: motion to adopt by Ed Landon and seconded by Cheryl Hall. Alvin Bowles commented that no opposition was duly noted and asked if there was any further discussion or change.

FUTURE MEETING DATES

The next scheduled meeting is December 1st at MDE in the AERIS conference room. The Commission will meet from 9:30am - 10:30am. The Summer Study will meet from 10:30am-12:00pm.

Alvin Bowles discussed the Court of Appeals decision from October 24, 2011. The Qualified Offer portion of the Lead Law is unconstitutional. Specifically, the Code of Maryland Regulations ("COMAR") 26.16.03 that the Qualified Offer can't be enforced. The Court severed constitutional. The Qualified Offer was not included in the purpose cause (i.e. reducing lead poisoning while maintaining an affordable stock of housing).

Alvin Bowles discussed that in-house forms need to be (and almost are) changed.

Alvin Bowles discussed that emergency regulations (with an effective date of January 1, 2012) are in the process of being sent to AELR. Emergency regulations can be in effect for up to six (6) months. Regulations will also be going through the public process afterwards. There is no confirmation from AELR. Information will be published in the Maryland Register. Alvin Bowles referred to MDE's statement on the web.

Alvin Bowles – Owners can still continue to opt-in. Due care. Counsel on proceeding. Took almost 2.5 years for the Court of Appeals' decision.

Alvin Bowles – Annual property owner registration packets will be mailed out in two (2) weeks. Registration on-line is scheduled to be on by November 14th. Staff is currently practicing.

Alvin Bowles – Changes and law exclusions covered by MDE.

Patrick Connor – Is the Department (MDE) considering sponsoring a bill to add qualified offers?

Alvin Bowles – No. Qualified offer has been determined to be unconstitutional, totally inadequate, and miniscule. Senator Colburn letter of advice.

Ed Landon – Is insurance coverage available privately? Do landlords have hazard coverage now?

Kathy Howard – Typically excluded. Not offered.

Ed Landon – Millions were spent by HABC to meet compliance.

Delegate Doyle Niemann – Current law bars access to courts. Finding unconstitutional. Looking at procedural issues. This promises to reopen old issues.

Wes Stewart – Nothing to add at this point.

Kathy Howard – Everyone thinking what next proposal will be?

Pat McLaine – No updates.

Alvin – Around the table.

Ed Landon – Energy code adopted January 1, 2012. Next year property maintenance and Green codes will be adopted. Training is available. 1,200 signed up day 1. Hagerstown and Harford Community College training are up and running. Take course, you are eligible to take the ICC exam. ICC voucher from DHCD (approximately 50 people) to take the exam for Plans review, ICC certified inspector.

Baltimore City Hlth. Dept. - Geraldine Woodson – Nothing to report.

Cliff Mitchell – New lead data (through Dr. Keyvan). County level. Invitations for health officers.

Alvin Bowles – Maryland is expecting to have a new database system using the HHLPSS childhood program. Stellar is currently being used, but it is rickety and breaks down. No state has a running HHLPSS program now. MDE is moving along to secure new system.

Cliff Mitchell – Fully integrating Baltimore City's data. Internal discussion with CDC funding for lead program. Framework, summer study. Revisiting targeting plan from the summer study. Lead is relevant and is a priority area. Childhood lead reduction (poisoning) is down. State to state being proposed in Governor's offices.

Cliff Mitchell - MDE's findings for 500 cases. Looking at the right population? Renewed DHMH attention. Looking at the right parts?

Cheryl Hall – Nothing new to report.

Alvin Bowles – Statewide meetings?

Alvin Bowles – Letters were sent by MDE to contractors to discuss what is going on (new forms, law and regulation changes). MDE's meetings are not mandatory.

Mary Jean Brown (from CDC on conference call) - Advisory work group since 2005 for proposing lowering the level of concern. Lowering levels is strongly recommended. Primary prevention (public health). Interventions apply to levels between 5 and 10 (missed opportunities). Public meeting on January 4th from 1 -3. Public can call in. Meeting is published in the Federal Register. If committee members approve, have three (3) days to go to the CDC chair and thirty (30) days for the Secretary of Health and Human Services to decide. CDC has opportunity to decide on what to adopt and authorize recommendations.

2012 proposed Federal budget for CDC may be cut by 50 %.

Lab implications - some labs can't detect levels at 5. Looking at detection levels.

Alvin Bowles - Dr. Keyvan has confirmed that detection level of 5ug/dL is not a problem.

Patrick Connor - who regulates labs?
