RE: Fully Online Distance Education Program Registration – #10646

## Dear President Miller and Speaker Jones:

Education Article §11-202.2(g) of the Annotated Code of Maryland requires the Maryland Higher Education Commission (MHEC) to submit to the Governor, and in accordance with §2-1246 of the State Government Article, the General Assembly, an annual fully online distance education program registration report. This report shall include:

- I. The number of institutions of higher education that apply for registration under this section;
- II. The type and size of the institutions that apply;
- III. The number of institutions approved for registration;
- IV. The number of institutions denied registration;
- V. The number of Maryland students enrolled in institutions required to register under this section;
- VI. The results of the requirements of §11-202.3 of this subtitle;
- VII. The number of institutions found to be in violation of the requirement to register under this section;
- VIII. Any fines imposed, and in what amounts, on institutions that violate this section; and
- IX. Any fine revenues collected from institutions for violation of this section.

Effective January 1, 2016, the State of Maryland became a full participant in the State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA). As such, an institutional participant in SARA is exempt from the requirements for the Registration of Online Programs in Maryland (COMAR13B.05.01). Additionally, effective January 1, 2016, Maryland's definition of operate in Maryland (COMAR 13B.02.01.03B(12)(c)) was amended to allow an out-of-state institution to place no more than 10 students in a single program, physically present at a single site in the State in a supervised internship, practicum, or field experience as a required part of a degree or certificate program. If more than 10 students from a single program are placed at a single site in the State in a supervised internship, practicum, or field placement, then the institution must submit an application for a certificate of approval to operate in Maryland. Membership in SARA has completely altered the online education landscape in the United States and in Maryland.

Presently, there are 49 SARA member states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and U.S. Virgin Islands with approximately 1,993 participating institutions, an increase of almost 93 institutions over 2018-2019. Only California is not a SARA member state. All SARA member institutions may register online Maryland students with no Maryland registration. With the majority of institutions participating in SARA, the number of out-of-state registration applications for Maryland has dropped precipitously for the current year and four years in a row.

During the reporting period from November 1, 2018, through October 31, 2019, MHEC received a total of 41 registration applications, including 10 initial applications and 31 renewal applications. Below are details specific to the reporting requirement outlined in Education Article §11-202.2(g).

- IV. Number of institutions denied registration: 1
- V. Number of Maryland students enrolled at institutions required to register: 5,400
- VI. Results of the requirements of §11-202.3 of this subtitle:

At least twice a year, the Commission shall peruse federal databases and other information sources to determine whether there are Maryland students who are enrolled in a fully online distance education program offered by an institution of higher education that is required to register with the Commission under § 11–202.2 of this subtitle, but that has failed to register with the Commission.

In the instance that we determine that an institution is noncompliant or nonresponsive with registration requirements, MHEC staff will notify the school that registration is required. MHEC staff will also investigate the institution's website to determine if it has revised and published its policies on enrolling Maryland students. We continue to identify which institutions are located in a SARA state and are a SARA approved institution, to determine whether an institution should be identified for further enforcement action.

With continued and increasing participation in SARA by out-of-state institutions, the number of out-of-state institutions offering online distance education to students required to register has decreased. To date California is the only state that does not participate in SARA.

VII. Number of institutions found to be in violation of the requirement to register: 1

In the past, a number of institutions were found to be in violation of the requirement to register as a result of MHEC's investigatory efforts summarized in Section VI. They were deemed in violation since it was determined that these non-registered institutions

were already enrolling Maryland residents in fully online programs. However, as of this report, only one institution has been found to be in violation of these requirements. No fines have been imposed on the institution as they responded to and complied with MHEC's Cease and Desist warning.

Since 2015, MHEC has seen continued decreases in the number of applications submitted through the out-of-state online registration process as a result of Maryland's participation in SARA. However, students enrolling in online courses and/or programs have significantly increased with the implementation of and participation in SARA. To date, 49 states, the District of Columbia, U.S. Virgin Islands, and Puerto Rico have joined SARA. There are approximately 1,993 individual colleges and universities that participate in SARA.

Maryland's SARA application was initially approved in 2015 and renewed in 2019. MHEC began implementing the agreement on January 1, 2016. In 2018-2019, 29 Maryland institutions participate in SARA enrolling a total of 71,937 students (55,897 Maryland residents and 16,040 out-of-state residents).

MHEC continues to manage the corresponding decrease in revenues for both online registration and out-of-state certificates of approval. MHEC has offset a portion of these losses by charging in-state institutions an annual participation fee for SARA. A contractual Online Education Analyst position coordinates both the online registration process and SARA portal agency responsibilities at MHEC.
