Dear President Ferguson and Speaker Jones:

In accordance with Sections 18-301, 18-603, 18-604, 18-708, and 18-2901 of the Education Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, the Maryland Higher Education Commission is required to provide an annual report on each scholarship/grant fund that includes an accounting of all financial receipts and expenditures. This report combines all of the required scholarship/grant reports into one single document and provides annual expenditures and number of recipients' data for the following programs:

1. *Workforce Shortage Student Assistance Grant (#10051)*
2. *Veterans of the Afghanistan and Iraq Conflicts Scholarship (#9665),*
3. *Charles W. Riley Firefighter and Ambulance and Rescue Squad Member Scholarship (#11979),*
4. *Maryland First Scholarship (#9473), and*
5. *Howard P. Rawlings Educational Excellence Awards Program (#9425).*

In FY 2022, the expenditures and total number of recipients for each scholarship/grant program is as follows:

Overview of Scholarship/Grant Programs:

The Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) is an office within the Maryland Higher Education Commission (MHEC) responsible for the administration of state-funded financial assistance programs. These programs are designed to improve access to higher education for students in need; encourage students to major in areas of great economic need to the State, such as teaching and nursing; provide loan repayment assistance to Maryland residents working in select fields; and to encourage Maryland's brightest students to attend college in the State. Maryland students use the assistance from these programs at community colleges, independent colleges and universities, private career schools, and the State's public four-year institutions of higher education.

1. Workforce Shortage Assistance Grant

The purpose of the Workforce Shortage Student Assistance Grant Program is to assist in meeting the State's need for well-trained and highly skilled workers in shortage areas. Students who perform well academically and agree to use their training in eligible programs as members of Maryland's workforce may qualify for scholarship assistance.

2. Veterans of the Afghanistan and Iraq Conflicts Scholarship

The Veterans of Afghanistan and Iraq Conflict (VAIC) Scholarship is a state-funded program that provides financial assistance to United States armed forces personnel who served in the Afghanistan or Iraq Conflicts, and their sons, daughters, or spouses who are currently high school seniors and enroll in an eligible accredited Maryland postsecondary institution.

3. Charles W. Riley Firefighter and Ambulance and Rescue Squad Member Scholarship

The Charles W. Riley Firefighter and Ambulance and Rescue Squad Member Scholarship Program encourages members of the fire-fighting, ambulance, and rescue organizations serving Maryland communities to pursue accredited courses that lead to a degree in fire service technology, emergency medical technology, fire service management, or public safety administration with a minor or concentration in fire service technology or fire service management.

4. Maryland First Scholarship

The Maryland First Scholarship provides financial assistance to select Maryland residents attending accredited Maryland postsecondary institutions. This scholarship is awarded to first-generation students whose parents have not earned a degree from an institution of higher education. In fiscal year (FY) 2022, the scholarship was unfunded and no awards were granted.

5. Howard P. Rawlings Educational Excellence Awards Program

The purpose of the Delegate Howard P. Rawlings Program of Educational Excellence Awards program is to provide need-based scholarship assistance. The State's students in utmost need will be guaranteed access to postsecondary education in Maryland through Delegate Howard P. Rawlings Guaranteed Access (GA) Grants. Low and middle-income students will be awarded financial assistance through Delegate Howard P. Rawlings Educational Assistance (EA) Grants. Students who miss the March 1 deadline but still have demonstrated need are awarded financial assistance through the Delegate Howard P. Rawlings Campus Based Educational Assistance Grant Award.
