Dear Governor Hogan, President Miller and Speaker Busch:

In 2016, the Maryland General Assembly enacted the Public School Opportunities Enhancement Act (Title 7, Subtitle 17 of the Education Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland). The statute requires the Maryland State Department of Education to report on the implementation of the program, including an annual evaluation of the effectiveness of the programs and services, by December 31 of each year.

The annual implementation report provides a description of the grantees, types of programs developed, technical assistance provided, and the evaluation of the first year of operation. The grant program is underway as a result of an appropriation for the program in the Governor's Fiscal Year 2018 Budget.

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Introduction

The Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) completed the first year of implementation of the Maryland Public School Opportunities Enhancement Program (PSOEP) grant. Pursuant to Title 7, Subtitle 17 of the Education Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland, the PSOEP grant authorized the MSDE to award grants to local school systems, community schools and non-profit organizations. These grantees are used to expand or create extended day and summer enhancement programs. The initial award for the 2017-2018 school year was \$2,500,000. The MSDE made awards on a competitive basis to eligible entities that proposed to serve the following:

- a) Local school systems and the SEED School with at least 50 percent of public school students that qualify for free lunch under the National School Lunch Program; and
- b) Extended day and summer enhancement programs for students between the ages of four and 19 that take place:
 - Before and after the school day;
 - On weekends and holidays; and
 - During vacations and summer breaks.

A PSOEP orientation webinar was conducted on November 11, 2017 to discuss:

- Program Requirements and Forms;
- Health and Safety Guidelines;
- Professional Development; and
- Program Site Visits

Implementation

The initial award for the 2017-2018 school year was \$2,500,000. Funding will expand or create extended day and summer enhancement programs that provide access to enrichment opportunities that improve work habits, reduce academic achievement gaps, and improve academic skills. Fifteen grants were awarded to organizations and local school systems to expand or create extended day and summer enhancement programs for Maryland students. The PSOEP was offered in six local school systems: Allegany, Caroline, Prince George's, Somerset, Wicomico, and Baltimore City. The grantees are: the Board of Education Allegany County (Allegany); Parks and People Foundation, Medical Education Resources Initiative for Teens (MERIT); YMCA of Central Maryland, Inc., Humanim, and The Family League of Baltimore (Baltimore City); Caroline Human Services Council, Inc. (Caroline County); Central American Solidarity Association (CASA) de Maryland, Inc.; GapBuster, Inc.; Futuristic LLC/ Healthy Solutions, LLC.; The ERHKY Foundation.; Community Youth Advance; Young Audiences of

MD, Inc.; (Prince George's County); Somerset County Local Management Board (Somerset County); and Ward Foundation, Inc.(Wicomico County).



Technical Assistance

The MSDE completed the first year of the PSOEP grant in August 2018. Technical Assistance was provided for grantees to begin their grant year on October 1, 2017. The legislation mandates that grantees follow the Maryland Out-of-School Time (MOST) Quality Framework. The MOST Network provided two in-person trainings and four live webinars during Year 1. Prior to the trainings, the MOST Network created pre-training surveys to gain a better understanding of grantees training needs. Training participants were able to access all training materials after completion of each workshop. The in-person trainings took place on the following days, times, and locations:

Evaluation and Effectiveness

The comprehensive plan continues to serve as a guide for the implementation of the PSOEP grant. The comprehensive plan will be reviewed following the completion of each year of the grant to ensure outcomes and deliverables are met. In Year One, grantees implemented their grant proposals as outlined. Grantees submitted end-of-year reports in August 2018. The MSDE grant managers have reviewed end-of-year reports to determine the effectiveness of the program and the risk level for continuation for Fiscal Year 2019. The MSDE extended learning specialists will continue to conduct monitoring visits throughout Year Two to ensure effective and continuous implementation of programs and activities, and to identify technical assistance needs. Grantees are responsible for hiring an external evaluator as outlined in the Response for Proposals.

Summary

In 2016, the Maryland General Assembly enacted the PSOEP grant under Title 7, Subtitle 17 of the Education Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland). The statute requires the MSDE to submit a report on the effectiveness and an evaluation of programs funded annually. The first PSOEP report was submitted to the General Assembly on December 11, 2017. The MSDE will continue to assist grantees during implementation of extended day and summer enhancement programs for Maryland students. It is essential to offer quality extended day and summer

programs to assist students with academic and social skills year round to avoid regression in learning.

The following recommendations from the MOST Network Technical Assistance Partners at the end of Year One were to:

- 1. Provide a full year of training beginning in the fall, planning and scheduling in-person trainings to complement and work in conjunction with 21st Century Community Learning Center network meetings.
- 2. Expand use of an online learning community where program staff can access training materials after workshops are complete to provide ongoing resources.
- 3. Provide a forum for grantee feedback on experiences as grantees with grant requirements and procedures, as well as training and technical assistance.

In addition to the out-of-school time programs, the Fiscal Year 2019 Budget Bill specifies that \$500,000 of the funding authorized for the PSOEP shall be used to provide a grant to a nonprofit organization to support existing educational programming during the school day, including recruitment, training, and ongoing professional learning of new teachers. This competition is open only to Nonprofit [501(c)(3)] organizations that will target local school systems with at least 50 percent of public school students that qualify for free lunch under the National School Lunch Program.

The Request for Proposals for the Public School Opportunity Enhancement Professional Learning Program (PSOEPLP) was disseminated on October 1, 2018. A pre-proposal technical assistance webinar was conducted on October 5, 2018, to provide additional information on the grant and submission requirements. The deadline for submission of the PSOEPLP applications is November, 2018. The award notification date for the PSOEPLP grants is December 10, 2018. The MSDE shall give priority to applications that illustrate the ability to leverage private and existing funding sources. All funding for this grant is contingent on State allocations.



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
