



# Policies and Regulation to Address Gangs, Gang Activity, and Similar Destructive or Illegal Group Behavior

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## Introduction

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**The Safe Schools Act of 2010 (Section 7-424.2 of the Education Article, Annotated Code of Maryland) required the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) to submit a report on or before January 1, 2011, and each year thereafter, to the Maryland General Assembly regarding the implementation of State and local education agency (LEA) policies and regulations to address gangs, gang activity, and similar destructive or illegal group behavior. This report provides the requested information for Maryland's 24 LEAs for the 2024-2025 school year (MSAR # 8476).**

Each LEA was required by law to: 1) publicize its policies and regulations in student handbooks, on school system websites, and at any other locations or venues LEAs determined were necessary or appropriate; and 2) develop educational programs to address gangs and gang-like activity in schools. Educational programs must include an educational gang awareness program for students, staff, volunteers, and parents. Educational programs must also include a teacher and administrator development program that trains teachers and administrators to implement the policy.

This report to the Maryland General Assembly addresses the requirements outlined in the Safe Schools Act of 2010 and is designed around three core areas: 1) where local education agency gang policies and regulations are publicized; 2) what educational gang awareness program(s) are being provided for students, staff, volunteers, and parents; and 3) how administrators and teachers are trained to implement the gang policy/regulations. In addition to these core areas, MSDE has developed a questionnaire for the purpose of identifying other areas that need to be addressed to optimize technical support. The questionnaire is constructed to appraise the implementation of State and local policies and regulations to address gangs, gang activity, and similar destructive or illegal group behaviors by all LEAs.

Local gang policies were initially developed by LEAs in accordance with the Safe Schools Act and periodically updated as appropriate. MSDE annually surveys all LEAs to collect updated information pertaining to their local gang policies.

### **LOCAL GANG AWARENESS PROGRAMS AND IMPLEMENTATION**

An analysis of the questionnaires submitted by LEAs for this report shows 22 of the 24 LEAs have not updated their gang policy as the threat of gangs has remained the same or decreased. There are two LEAs, Charles County Public Schools, and Dorchester County Public Schools, that indicated changes to their gang policies. All LEAs reported that the gang policy is reviewed annually. This report shows that all 24 LEAs provide training for staff as it relates to their gang policy. Six LEAs have reported that they now require staff to complete "Safe Schools" training modules or training through Vector. The modules include the gang policy they must read and a course they must pass. Other training includes partnering with law enforcement agencies that provide educational and informative presentations to staff and administrators. Information in such presentations includes "gangs 101" details and local activities that include gang-related behaviors, social skills, prevention strategies. For example, Washington County Public Schools reports that their Safety & Security team meets with members of the Mid Atlantic Regional Gang Investigators Network (MARGIN), school administrators, pupil personnel

workers, and school counselors that form a county Gang and Safety Committee to discuss gang prevention and other activities.

In addition to the LEAs partnering with their local law enforcement agencies, two LEAs have also established partnerships and a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with their local State's Attorney's Offices. In Carroll County, the State's Attorney's office provides staff training annually. In Montgomery County, the State Attorney's Office supports Montgomery County Public Schools around gang awareness, prevention, and intervention by providing outreach and support to schools, administrators, students, staff, and parents. Both LEAs use this as a metric to measure the effectiveness of their gang policy. It is reported that consistent communication between the State's Attorney's Office and schools has prevented problems in schools and the community.

All LEAs have a mechanism through which communities can report alleged gang activity and receive information regarding how investigation procedures will be conducted by appropriate staff members. St. Mary's County has three options available for community members to report gang-related activity, one of which is the LEA confidential tip line to report information. Information regarding the tip line is posted on the LEAs website. In Washington County, each secondary school has an administrator tasked to serve as the School Safety Security Coordinator. The coordinator and school resource officer will initiate an investigation upon receiving a written or verbal concern. All LEAs utilize the MSDE Bullying, Harassment, or Intimidation Reporting Form, which includes "gang-related" and "gang recruitment" as categories of bullying, harassment, or intimidation. The form may also be used to report gang-related concerns.

Lastly, 15 of the 24 LEAs have reported that gang activity has decreased or remained the same. However, nine LEAs have seen increases over the years. For example, Montgomery County Public Schools reported that gang activity has increased due to student reassignments and unresolved community conflicts. Also in Montgomery County, there has been an increase in the number of younger students who are becoming involved in gang-related activities. Somerset County Public Schools have also reported an increase in gang-related activities in elementary schools with the reason being unknown other than gang growth in some of their impoverished neighborhoods.

MSDE and the Maryland Center for School Safety (MCSS) meet regularly with Directors of Student Services, School Safety Supervisors, and Behavioral Health Coordinators to provide technical assistance on gang policies, awareness, prevention, and a host of other school safety related topics. MSDE and MCSS have invited guest speakers and local and national experts to lend their expertise and provide additional assistance to the LEAs.

The following responses to the MSDE questionnaire provide further information regarding how school systems are addressing the three core areas (promotion of local policies, available programs, and training provided) and identified focus areas.

## Allegany County Public Schools

Staff attend the Maryland Center for School Safety conferences; host quarterly briefings with the Department of Juvenile Services and participate in the Mid-Atlantic Regional Gang Investigators network training.

According to school administrators, local law enforcement agencies, and the Department of Juvenile Services, there are no identified gangs in the Allegany area.

All administrators are trained in are trained by law enforcement and school resource officers.

**7. Is there a mechanism in place for community members to report gang activity involving school age youth to local schools? If so, please describe the procedure (data collection).**

Yes, we use the forms and methods provided by MSDE.

**8. Do you feel that gang related issues and similar destructive or illegal behavior have increased, decreased, or remained the same as the previous school year?**

To date, there are no gang-related activities in Allegany County.

**4. What educational gang awareness programs are your school system providing for students, staff, and volunteers?**

Gang-related lessons for students implemented during advisory periods in each school. Professional Development for faculty, staff, and volunteers at the beginning of each school year. Outside support through the district's partnership with local law enforcement is provided to the district.

**5. In what ways do you feel your gang awareness programs were effective?**

The most effective approach is one that involves communication between representatives of the groups involved. Students have been encouraged to seek assistance with staff members or programs, which may be available at schools MTSS Restorative Practices (RP) circles, mentors, school nurses, teachers, school counselors, principals, school psychologists, pupil personnel workers, school resource officers, school social workers, and school administrators.

**6. How were/are administrators and teachers trained to implement your gang policy/regulations?**

AACPS provides:

Annual training for all school staff regarding gang prevention and intervention resources.

Mandatory training is practicable for new employees.

Security meetings for middle and high schools to ensure coordination of gang prevention, intervention, and suppression efforts in accordance with the Maryland Safe Schools Act of 2010.

Schools with gang awareness packets. From the Office of School Security.

Professional development for faculty and staff is provided at the beginning of each school year.

Gang-related lessons for students are implemented during advisory periods in each school annually.

Administrative review of gang-related activity, identification of pattern of criminal gang activity, underlying crime, anti-social behavior, gang-like activities, and signs of gang membership are conducted.

This handbook is distributed to all students at the beginning of each school year, reviewed, and taken home by students to be shared with their parents.

**4. What educational gang awareness programs does your school system provide to students, staff, and volunteers?**

Baltimore County Public Schools provides training annually for staff and administrators in partnership with local agencies. School resource officers provide education to students at the secondary level as a part of their teaching responsibilities. Several schools utilize the Gang Resistance Education and Training (G.R.E.A.T) program for middle school students. Health education teachers provide gang related education at the secondary level. Community presentations are made available through PTAs, advisory groups, and other community associations.

BCPS provides additional awareness through information posted on the school systems website at [bcps.org](http://bcps.org): Gang Awareness; Gang Incident Reporting Form and Safe Schools Initiative.

**5. In what ways do you feel your gang awareness programs were effective?**

BCPS uses a variety of strategies to provide gang prevention education and makes resources available on its Web site along with the form for reporting concerns. The partnership between BCPS and the Baltimore County Police Department (BCoPD) facilitates training and communication of concerns. When an issue arose involving English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) students, the BCoPD sent Spanish speaking officers to the school to develop a rapport with students and hired a Spanish speaking officer as a permanent member of its SRO team.

**6. How were/are administrators and teachers trained to implement your gang policy/regulations?**

Administrators receive training in the gang policy/rules through the annual Safe Schools Conference and during professional learning opportunities offered after school hours.

**7. Is there a mechanism in place for community members to report gang activity involving school age youth to local schools? If so, please describe the procedure (data collection).**

Community members can access the Gang-Related Incident Reporting Form on the BCPS Web site at Gang-Related Incident Reporting Form. The form is submitted to a school who enters the data and addresses the issue.

**8. Do you feel that gang related issues and similar destructive or illegal behavior have increased, decreased, or remained the same as the previous school year?**

Anecdotal reports show no significant change in gang activity in Baltimore County.

The partnership with the BCoPD has enhanced the district's awareness of gangs and gang activities as well as prevention and intervention strategies. The BCoPD has recently added a Spanish speaking SRO to the team of SROs at one of our schools to increase communication with students in the regional ESOL program.

According to policy, these people meet monthly with the appropriate school staff to share information about gang related activity in general and discuss the educational plan for and progress of each student who has been arrested or adjudicated delinquent for gang-related activity..."

Our local police were helpful in addition to training on the "Gang Related Incident Investigation Reporting Form." CCPS also provides annual safe schools training.

**4. What educational gang awareness programs does your school system provide to students, staff, and volunteers?**

Lessons are provided through the health curriculum and school counselor lessons. In conjunction with our SRO's and Office of School Security parent presentations are made available as requested which may include additional experts in the area of gang involvement. CCPS developed a safe school's module for all staff to be completed annually.

Providing annual training for CCPS staff reminds everyone of the presence and potential of gang involvement. The training has made staff aware that gangs are not just found in large cities. It has also provided staff with gang indicators and current trends to look for in Carroll County Public Schools. Carroll County Public Schools takes a proactive approach and because of our informational ongoing training, we try to be very alert for the potential of gangs forming at all times.

**6. How were/are administrators and teachers trained to implement your gang policy/regulations?**

The Office of School Security in collaboration with our SRO's are available for consultation with administrators whenever needed. CCPS developed a safe school's module for all staff to be completed annually.

**7. Is there a mechanism in place for community members to report gang activity involving school age youth to local schools? If so, please describe the procedure (data collection).**

We have a good partnership and communication with our local law enforcement agencies therefore, if any gang activity involving school age students occurs, they will alert Carroll County Public Schools. Information collected typically goes through the normal referral process for school infractions; however, the new Safe Schools Maryland anonymous tip line can also be used to report gang activity.

Gang related activity has remained the same as in previous years.

**4. What educational gang awareness programs does your school system provide to students, staff, and volunteers?**

Cecil County provides training on policy, regulation, and reporting for staff and volunteers. At the school level, grade level meetings with school administrators and school counselors for students.

**5. In what ways do you feel your gang awareness programs were effective?**

The information shared with various stakeholders is critical to keeping knowledge about gangs and gang activity in the forefront of key individuals. While Cecil County has not seen growth in gang activity, keeping information flowing is critical to being proactive in limiting the spread of this activity.

CCPS also disseminates surveys to key stakeholders, examines data by monitoring discipline incidents, and examines data regarding incidents reported by SROs.

**6. How were/are administrators and teachers trained to implement your gang policy/regulations?**

CCPS trains Principals and Assistant Principal at annual meetings.

**7. Is there a mechanism in place for community members to report gang activity involving school age youth to local schools? If so, please describe the procedure (data collection).**

Cecil County has a Gang Incident Reporting Form that is available online for any interested stakeholders to complete and return to the appropriate school. Cecil County has an open-door

policy for community members who should and would feel comfortable coming forward to report on gang activity.

**8. Do you feel that gang related issues and similar destructive or illegal behavior have increased, decreased, or remained the same as the previous school year?**

The number of gang-related incidents in Cecil County is very low. We know that there are small groups of students and youth that call themselves gangs and that this gets reported (not either incidents or activities), but there are no documented incidents of destructive activities or behaviors. So, the answer here is that gang-related issues have remained the same.

During the 2018/19 school year CCPS began hosting a quarterly gang intervention and prevention meeting where an administrator from each middle and high school, along with gang detectives meet to share information and intelligence on local gangs operating within Charles County. The meetings have resulted in the identification of no less than 3 criminal street gangs and closed a number of felony arrests. The aforementioned meetings have been discontinued for the 2020-2021, 2021-22 school years due to COVID-19 protocol. Scheduled Gang Intervention meetings have resumed for the 2022/23 SY.

Administrators were trained and in turn trained their school staff.

Administrative staff receive updates from quarterly meetings with the Sheriff's Office.

**4. What educational gang awareness programs does your school provide to students, staff, and volunteers?**

The Office of School Security will coordinate professional development periodically to ensure that staff are aware of the prevalence, causes, and consequences of gang involvement and can use evidence-based positive behavior support in dealing with these situations.

Administrators collect, analyze, and use school-specific data regarding the number of incidents of gang or gang-related activities to guide school improvement efforts to ensure safe and nurturing environments and an “anti-gang culture.” Components of “anti-gang culture” include but are not limited to:

Behavioral expectations

A plan for teaching behavioral expectations.

An ongoing system for recognizing appropriate behaviors.

A process for responding to problem behaviors.

Collection and analysis of data to implement strategies for improving school climate.

Gang prevention education will be included in the elementary and secondary curriculum as developmentally appropriate.

Staff members will encourage students to be involved in activities which aim to create a general culture of peer support and mutual respect.

Pre- and Post-Program Surveys: Conduct surveys among students, teachers, and parents before and after the program to measure changes in awareness, attitudes, and behaviors regarding gang activity. Upon receipt of a report, the administrator/designee and the school security officer will initiate an immediate investigation within 24 hours and determine whether the suspected gang activity actually occurred. A gang report of a high level of security will initiate immediate notification of appropriate school system personnel within 24 hours. They will take steps to verify who committed the act and whether others played a role in perpetrating this act. Other related complaints, if any, will be reviewed in making this determination.

Administration will apply consequences and/or remedial actions consistent with the Student Code of Conduct, Policy 9200 Student Discipline, Policy 7030 Employee Conduct and Discipline, and the Procedures for the Threat Management Process.

Administrators will notify parents of both the offender and/or victim of the allegation.

The administrator/designee will create a record of the gang-related incident, which will include the Gang-Related Incident Investigation Form and any disciplinary actions taken, statements of the offender, the victim, and witnesses. Discussions with all parties will be documented.

The school principal will be responsible for creating a repository for the gang-related activity information and the reporting forms.

HCPSS will maintain a monitoring/tracking system to use as a database for evaluation purposes.

MCPS Regulation JHG-RA, *Gangs, Gang Activity, or Other Similar Destructive or Illegal Group Behavior Prevention*, was revised in September 2012 to incorporate information received from the Maryland State Department of Education. The major change by the state was that upon receipt of a Gang-Related Incident Report, the principal or designee, assistant principal, and the school security officer would initiate an investigation within 24 hours. Revisions were made again in July 2017 to establish reporting requirements that allow the district to follow and monitor the number of incidents, types of behaviors, and findings from school investigations. Related documents related to the MCPS gang regulation include:

- a) Montgomery County [Board of Education Policy COA, Student Well-being and School Safety](#), (June, 24, 2019) which builds upon the ongoing work of MCPS to promote student well-being and school safety. This policy also aligns with [Board Policy JPC, Wellness: Physical and Nutritional Health](#).
- b) MCPS work on the [Be Well 365: The Framework to Support the Physical, Social, and Psychological Well-being of All Students](#) as well as the MCPS Restorative Justice Initiatives. Specifically, Board Policy COA addresses safety from the Perspective of promoting a positive school climate, accountability for all, behavioral threat assessment, facilities, security staff, and technology, collaboration with county partners including health and law enforcement agencies, and emergency planning and preparedness.
- c) Revised [MCPS Regulation COA-RA, Behavior Threat Assessment](#), which addresses Maryland legislative mandates in the Maryland Safe to Learn Act of 2018, and the [Maryland's Model Policy for Behavior Threat Assessment](#) that sets forth mechanisms, best practices, procedures, policies, and guides for the establishment of an assessment team or teams in each Local education agency.

MCPS has maintained a proactive approach towards training staff members to recognize, document, report, and investigate any suspected gang-related signs or activities. As a result, we disseminate school climate surveys to our staff, students, and community. We have ongoing communication with our police partners and ongoing communication with our community partners and street outreach networks.

All MCPS staff are trained annually through asynchronous virtual "MCPS Compliance Training Modules".

**8. Do you feel the gang related issues and similar destructive or illegal behavior has increased, decreased, or remained the same as the previous school year?**

Gang activity has increased in MCPS, we believe due to the following factors:

Student Reassignments: Students involved in gang-related behaviors are often transferred from their home schools to an alternative school and then most likely to another school in the system, where unresolved community conflicts continue to persist, leading to the spread of gang-related issues across different campuses.

Younger Involvement: An increasing number of younger students are becoming involved in gang-related activities, and due to their age, they often face fewer consequences from law enforcement, allowing these behaviors to go unchecked.

Lack of Gang Emergence Prevention: Insufficient preventive programs targeting early signs of gang emergence in communities have allowed these activities to take root before effective intervention can be implemented.

Social Media Influence: The use of social media has amplified gang recruitment and communication, allowing students to be exposed to and influenced by gang culture more easily and frequently, both in and out of school.

School Administrators and Pupil Personnel Workers (PPWs) review *The Student Rights and Responsibility Handbook* with all students annually. The system-wide student dress code also prohibits the wearing of gang colors and/or gang paraphernalia.

Staff members receive awareness training annually at the beginning of the school year. PPWs receive an annual refresh on gang involvement and the implications for student truancy. Principals have had the School Resource Officers and staff members from the Department of Student Services conduct parent informational sessions on gangs and how to look vigilantly for signs that gangs may be recruiting their children. Schools also develop school-based interventions and programs that are germane to the needs of their buildings.

Additionally, Prince George's County Public Schools (PGCPS) has reached out to parents to provide awareness on gangs through the Department of Family and School Partnerships and Community Outreach (DFSPCO). This division also provided a session on "Warning Signs: Gangs/Drugs and At-Risk Behaviors" developed to illuminate adolescent behaviors indicative of gang involvement.

**5. In what ways do you feel your gang awareness programs were effective?**

The programs were effective in helping both staff and parents understand what signs to look for in children of gang related activities. These programs have increased gang awareness for adults.

**6. How were/are administrators and teachers trained to implement your gang policy/regulations?**

Over the years, school administrators received training on the implementation of the Administrative Procedure related to gangs and gang prevention. All security staff members have received training through local police entities. An internal Google site maintained by the Department of Security is a place where administrators can go for information. We currently provide a Gang Awareness Training module through the Safe-Schools portal that is available to all school staff on gangs and school safety.

The goal of this course is to provide school staff members with basic information about gang culture, ideology, and behavior. Knowledge gained through the 30-minute course will help school staff better understand gang activity and the role they play to build a safe school environment. Topics covered include gang facts, why young people join gangs, identifying gang members in school, and actions you can take to increase safety in your school.

**7. Is there a mechanism in place for community members to report gang activity involving school age youth to local schools? If so, please describe the procedure (data collection).**

PGCPS' Anti-Bullying website has a link which may be accessed to complete the Bullying, Harassment, or Intimidation Form. This form also provides an opportunity to report on gang-related or gang recruitment activity. The electronic report can be found at <http://stopbullying.pgcps.org/> and can be translated in English, Spanish and French.

Schools are required to investigate each reported incident. In every case, schools use the student information system to record gang information. The Department of Student Services and the Department of Security Services work collaboratively to record and review data to determine trends and action steps to reduce gang related incidents.

To make anonymous reporting easier for students, parents, and community onlookers, PGCPS has developed a new Bullying, Harassment, or Intimidation (BHI) app that will be released in January 2020. This platform can be used to report Gang-related activity. Videos for staff members to provide training on how to use the app as well as a BHI Parent Tutorial have been developed to provide guidance on how to use this new tool. We recognize this avenue provides all stakeholders with the power to report incidents without trepidation.

Additionally, PGCPS has collaborated with Crime Solvers in a program called "See Something Say Something". Community members are able to report incidents via a toll-free number.

**8. Do you feel that gang related issues and similar destructive or illegal behavior have increased, decreased, or remained the same as the previous school year?**

Gang related activity has remained flat from the prior year.

**9. Optional: Please share any other thoughts, questions, or comments regarding gang activity, regulation, policies, or awareness programs in your Local education agency.**

PGCPS realizes gang activity, involvement, and recruitment are not just community issues but involve those who enter our school doors. We have sought ways to address at-risk behaviors that students exhibit that are “warning signs” for gang involvement.

We have partnered with several community agencies that provide after school activities and family partnerships to include Latin American Youth Center, CASA Multicultural Center, Youth Services Bureau, and Community Conferencing to name a few. We have now hired a Restorative Practices Coordinator to usher in restorative circles aimed at connecting students and teachers that would facilitate an environment that is nurturing, positive, and fosters a sense of belonging for all our students. When we build opportunities for greater student engagement through academics, career academies, mentoring, and community services, we are hoping to build mechanisms for better student-school connectivity and self-fulfillment.

Lastly, through trauma informed approaches, we will be able to build bridges with students whose life changing traumatic experiences are often fertile ground for gang involvement or other at-risk behaviors.

Gang awareness information is included in the Student Handbook and is reviewed annually by students and staff. All staff receive training through an online training program.

**5. In what ways do you feel your gang awareness programs were effective?**

SMCPS has been transparent about emerging student involvement in reported gang-related activities and the increasingly destructive and disruptive actions taken by individuals identifying themselves as members of local community gangs. We have partnered with the Sheriff's office to coordinate messaging, information, and appropriate responses. Our efforts have made the administration, staff, students, and the community aware of the identification and reporting of gang-related activities.

**6. How were/are administrators and teachers trained to implement your gang policy/regulations?**

Administrators and teachers are trained annually as part of the required online training. Staff members are required to complete the training by mid-October of each school year.

**7. Is there a mechanism in place for community members to report gang activity involving school age youth to local schools? If so, please describe the procedure (data collection).**

There are options available for community members to report gang-related activity. First, the school system has a confidential tip line to report information. Information regarding the tip line is posted on the school system website. Second, the gang-related incident reporting form is available on the school system website.

**8. Do you feel that gang related issues and similar destructive or illegal behavior have increased, decreased, or remained the same as the previous school year?**

The number of gang-related incidents in St. Mary's County continues to increase. Gang activity is having a residual impact on the school environment. We continue to work with local and state law enforcement agencies to investigate reported gang activity. The number of students involved is isolated to a very small percentage of the total number of students. Disruptions in the school environment have occurred ranging from physical attack on students and staff as well as other illegal activities to including vandalism, drug possession, and weapons on campus. There has been an increase in the number of students involved in gun related crimes occurring in the community. This has resulted in outreach to law enforcement partners to investigate and potentially validate suspected gang activity and further coordination with the St. Mary's County State's Attorney's Office. Meetings are held on a weekly basis with law enforcement and school administrators to address any gang related concerns. The Department of Student Services is proactively engaged in intervention strategies to assist students who have been determined to be a significant risk to the school environment due to their declared gang affiliation and participation in crimes both on and off the school campus.

St. Mary's County Public Schools and law enforcement have a collaborative working relationship that is beneficial to the ongoing work in both the schools and community.

WCPS has a Supervisor and Coordinator of School Safety & Security who maintains close contact with local law enforcement and works closely with our school administrators. The Coordinator of School Safety & Security with WCPS is the regional director and a member of the Mid Atlantic Regional Gang Investigators Network (MARGIN). This representative meets with the school administrators, pupil personnel workers, counselors, and our county Gang & Safety Committee. Each middle and high school has a representative on the committee. Several elementary schools attend these meetings, but this committee is not required for elementary staff. The Hagerstown City Police and Washington County Sheriff’s Department also assist WCPS by providing updates to designated school administrators throughout the year.

**5. In what ways do you feel your gang awareness programs were effective?**

There is communication between the police, the school administration and students who identify as gang members. Communication has prevented problems in schools and the community.

**6. How were/are administrators and teachers trained to implement your gang policy/regulations?**

Secondary schools have school-based safety committees that meet regularly. These committees discuss issues and share information/updates with staff. The Coordinator of School

Safety & Security and the SROs participated with these school-based safety committees, but they do not educate or inform students. Students, parents, and staff have access to information on gangs and what constitutes gang activity. All parties are made aware of the procedures to report on gang activities. Staff are required to report suspected gang activity.
