The Residential Boarding Education Program for At-Risk Youth Act, Section §8-701 of the Education Article, established the Residential Boarding Education Program for At-Risk Youth. The program is operated by the Board of Trustees of the SEED School of Maryland. The Annotated Code of Maryland, Education Article §8-708, requires the Maryland State Department of Education to submit to the Governor and Maryland General Assembly on or before December 1st of each year, a report regarding enrollment and operations at the SEED School of Maryland. # Report to the Maryland General Assembly <u>The SEED School of Maryland</u>

Education Article Title 8, Special Programs for Exceptional Children: Subtitle 7 Residential Boarding Education Program for At-Risk Youth December 2016

#### Overview

Education Article §8-708 directs the Board of Trustees of the designated operator of the Maryland Residential Boarding Education Program for At-Risk Youth to report to the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) detailed information on the names and jurisdictions of students enrolled in the program in the current and preceding years. On or before December 1st of each year, the MSDE is required to report this information to the Governor and the Maryland General Assembly along with a recommendation regarding whether funds for the residential education program should be increased or decreased.

Education Article §8-701 establishes the Residential Boarding Education Program for At-risk Youth. The operator of the Maryland Residential Boarding Program for At-Risk Youth is the SEED School of Maryland. The SEED School is designed to provide a rigorous college preparatory education. The SEED School opened in August 2008 with a cohort of 80 sixth grade students. The school adds a new sixth-grade class each year. The first class of 28 students graduated from the SEED School in May 2015. As of September 30, 2016, the SEED School has 403 students enrolled in grades 6 to 12 from 12 local school systems.

The following information is included in this report: (1) student enrollment by name and by sending jurisdiction for the 2016-2017 school year for all 403 students in grades 6-12; (2) sending jurisdictions and names of students in grades 6-12 who attended the SEED School for the 2015-2016 school year; (3) actual expenditures for fiscal year 2016 and the projected budget for fiscal year 2017; and (4) whether funds appropriated under §8-708 should be increased or decreased. As per §8-702, the program is operated under the supervision of the MSDE. Ms. Carol Beck is the contract monitor and meets at least quarterly with the SEED School leadership team to review student progress, address program concerns, and identify areas where the MSDE can provide technical assistance to the school. Ms. Beck also facilitates informal meetings, structured visits, and other contact as appropriate. Ms. Beck is supported by key MSDE staff including Kristina Kyles-Smith, Assistant State Superintendent for Student, Family, and School Support, Tina McKnight, Director, Program Improvement and Family Support, Barbara Scherr, Program Specialist for Title I, and Kelly Coates, Section Chief, 21<sup>st</sup> Century Community Learning Centers.

#### **School Administration**

The Board of Trustees named Jon Tucker as Head of the School in the spring of 2015. Jessica Wilson joined the leadership team in 2015 as Director of Academics. Both Mr. Tucker and Ms. Wilson bring many years of experience from their administrative and classroom roles at the SEED School of Washington DC.

The Maryland State Department of Education facilitates communications between SEED School staff, local Directors of Student Support, and other school system staff members. The SEED School leadership team participates in a variety of statewide meetings conducted by MSDE staff. Staff at the SEED School with leadership roles in reading, mathematics, library/media, science, social studies, physical education, Title I, and special education receive content-related information from MSDE. SEED School staff members are also invited to attend statewide training and other MSDE-sponsored conferences that address issues relevant to school operations.

#### Performance

The SEED school has created a comprehensive data dashboard to review school-wide student achievement and student success indicators throughout the school year. The second class of students graduated from the Seed School of Maryland on May 1, 2016. Each of the graduates had a plan for continued education. The class received scholarship commitments totaling over two million dollars. As a Maryland public school, SEED School students participate in the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) testing. Staff at the SEED School continue to focus on the implementation of Maryland's College and Career-Ready Standards. To promote college readiness, all juniors and seniors at the SEED School were enrolled in at least one Advanced Placement course last year.

#### Enrollment<sup>1</sup>

As specified by legislation, the September 30<sup>th</sup> enrollment is the official count used to determine billing for enrollment for each local school system. Table 1 lists students by grade and local school system for the 2016-2017 school year. Table 2 lists students by grade and local school system for the 2015-2016 school year. Please refer to Exhibit 1 for 2016-2017 enrollment and Exhibit 2 for enrollment during the 2015-2016 school year.

#### Financing

In fiscal year 2016, the Governor and Maryland General Assembly appropriated \$10,146,460 to the SEED School and \$10,200,000 for fiscal year 2017. Exhibit 3 reports SEED school expenditures for the fiscal year 2015-2016 and the budget for the fiscal year 2016-2017. The SEED School reported operating expenditures for fiscal year 2016 as \$15,749,447 and the projected operating budget for fiscal year 2017 as \$14,995,182. Education Article § 8-708 (2) (ii) requires MSDE to determine "whether the funds appropriated under §8-710 of this subtitle should be increased or decreased." At this time there is no indication of a need to increase the amount of funds appropriated for the SEED School.
