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Maryland's Public Charter Schools Report to the Maryland General Assembly Under Education Article Title 9

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Background

The Maryland Public Charter School Program is governed by the Annotated Code of Maryland, § 9-101 *et seq.* of the Education Article (Md. Code § 9-101 of the Educ. Art.). The statute requires the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) to report annually to the Maryland General Assembly in accordance with § 2-1246 of the State Governing Article regarding any updates or amendments made to public charter school policies by local school systems, and implementation of Md. Code § 9-101 of the Education Article.

In addition to the requirements of the statute, this report provides the Governor and the Maryland General Assembly a general overview of Maryland's charter schools. The report includes:

- A summary of information about Maryland's Charter Schools, including enrollment, and demographics;
- A review of existing local policies as required by § 9-110(a) and § 9-110(c)(1), and the availability of those polices on local school system websites as required by § 9-110(a)(3);
- A summary of technical assistance provided by the Office of School Innovation in the Division of Student, Family and School Support; and
- An update on implementation of Education Article, Title 9.

1. Overview of Maryland's charter schools

History

The Maryland General Assembly enacted the Maryland Charter School Program in 2003, "to establish an alternative means within the existing public school system in order to provide innovative learning opportunities and creative educational approaches to improve the education of students." [§ 9-101 (b)].

The key provisions of the Maryland Charter School Law include:

- Local School Boards are the authorizers of public charter schools;
- Public Charter Schools comply with all State and local education laws and policies, unless waived:
- Employees of public charter schools are employees of the local school system;
- Charter schools receive an amount of public funding that is commensurate with the amount of funding expended on behalf of all public school students; and
- Charter schools are open to all students. Admission is by lottery.

In the 2015 session, the Maryland General Assembly added provisions that allow local school boards to approve proposals that would give greater weight in a lottery to disadvantaged students. In addition, under the revisions to the statute, the Maryland State Board of Education (MSBE) was directed to establish criteria by which the local school board will assess charter

schools to be eligible for additional operational autonomy. The MSBE approved guidance for this provision in December 2016.





Figure 2. Enrollment of Maryland local school systems and Maryland charter schools

In the 2016-2017 school year, 49 public charter schools served over 21,812 (2.4 percent) of Maryland public school students in five local school systems within Maryland. There are 33 public charter schools in Baltimore City, 10 public charter schools in Prince George's County, three in Frederick County, two in Anne Arundel County, and one in St. Mary's County. Figure 1 is the number of charter schools and charter school enrollment by year. Figure 2 shows the total number of students in public charter schools relative to the enrollment of Maryland's local school systems.

The number of students that sought enrollment in a charter school in 2017 totals 19,956. This represents the number of applicants seeking 4,109 available seats.

Note: Monocacy Valley Public Charter School was approved by the Frederick County School Board in 2001, before passage in 2004 of Maryland's Charter Law.

Renewal and Applications

During the 2016-2017 school year, six public charter schools completed a contract renewal review with their local board of education. All six schools were renewed as shown in Table 1.

In addition, Baltimore City reviewed six applications for new charter schools in the 2016-2017 school year. All six were declined. Prince George's County Schools received two applications. One was approved to open in 2018-2019 and one applicant withdrew. Baltimore County reports receiving one application. No further action has been taken as of August 2017.

Demographics

Maryland's public charter schools serve a diverse array of students. Table 2 provides the percentage of students attending public charter schools who are eligible for Free and Reduced Price Meals (FARMS) and the percentage of students with disabilities (SWD). Cumulatively, for each grade band, the percentage of students in public charter schools who are eligible for FARMS is greater than that of the State. In Baltimore City, the percent of students eligible for FARMS and the percent of SWD are comparable. Outside of Baltimore City, a lower percentage of students eligible for FARMS or who have disabilities attend charter schools than traditional schools in the local school system.

Additional data is provided in the appendix. Table A provides the percentage of students scoring 4 or 5 on the PARCC assessments for math, English/language arts, and Algebra 1. Data is provided for the All Students group and for students eligible for Free and Reduced Price Meals.

2. Review of existing local policies [9-110(a)] [9-110(c)(1)]

The State law requires that each local school system adopt a charter schools policy, post the policy to the local school system website, and provide the policy to the MSDE. In addition, each local school system is to name a charter school liaison.

After passage of the Maryland Charter Law in 2003, each local school system adopted a charter school policy. In a review of every local school system policy, the MSDE found that all had adapted the model policy. Each contains the key elements including a definition of a public charter school, eligibility requirements for operators of charter schools, an overview of the local school system process for evaluation of applications to operate charter schools, and the process for earning a renewal of the charter. In most cases, the initial term of a charter contract is five years and renewal terms are three or five years. In two counties, the initial terms are three and four years. To date, no initial contract terms are longer than five years.

Table 5 is a summary for each local school system and their adherence to the requirements of the law. The MSDE reviews websites annually.

3. Technical assistance provided [9-110(b)(2)(i)]

Maryland State Department of Education's Director for the Office of School Innovations meets with the local school system liaisons six times a year. Attendance includes representatives from local school systems with and without operating charter schools. The meetings provide a forum for collaborative review of aspects of the charter law and challenges that arise in overseeing charter schools. This stakeholder group has provided input into the development of standards by

which a local school board will determine a charter school "eligible" for additional operational flexibility, in accordance with § 9-104.1.

The Maryland State Department of Education regularly responds to requests for information and technical assistance from local school systems, charter school operators, and the public. Inquiries include questions from potential operators seeking guidance on the application process and parents seeking information about charter school enrollment.

Topics addressed with local school system representatives in the past year include the following:

- Application of the eligibility provision of § 9-104.1
- Implementation of a weighted lottery
- Review of per pupil calculations
- Guidance for potential charter school applicants

4. Implementation of the Maryland Charter Law

§ 9-104.1: Public charter schools--Eligible charter schools

The Maryland State Board of Education must determine measures by which a Maryland charter school meets "eligibility" to implement certain provisions of the Maryland Charter Law.

Section § 9-104 states that,

- (a) In this section, "eligible public charter school" means a public charter school that has been in existence for at least 5 years and demonstrates to the public chartering authority a history of:
 - (1) Sound fiscal management; and
 - (2) Student Achievement that exceeds the average in the local school system in which the public charter school is located on:
 - (i) Statewide assessments, and
 - (ii) Other measures developed by the State Board.

The MSBE appointed a workgroup which reviewed options for eligibility criteria. Members of the workgroup included stakeholders representing local school systems and charter school operators. Guidance on implementation of this provision was approved by the Maryland State Board of Education on December 5, 2016 and provided to the local school systems in January 2017.

To date, no public charter schools have requested to be deemed "eligible" by a local board of education.

§ 9-102.2: Lottery—Weighting and guaranteed placement

A 2015 amendment to the charter law allows for a weighted lottery under certain circumstances. A public charter school may give greater weight to the lottery status for students eligible for free and reduced price meals (FARMS), students with disabilities, students with limited English proficiency, or students eligible for homeless services. In addition, a charter school may propose to the local school board that the school provide a preference for a geographic attendance area, if the proposed area has a median income that is equal to, or less than, that of the county. The plan can offer a preference for up to 35 percent of available seats. In each case, the proposal of the public charter school must be approved by the local school board. In the 2015-2016 school year, three public charter schools sought to implement this provision. In the 2016-2017 school year, two charter schools requested waivers for a weighted lottery. One was approved.

2015-2016

Creative City Public Charter School, Baltimore City: Geographic preference for up to 20 percent of available seats.

Baltimore Montessori Public Charter School, Baltimore City: Geographic preference for up to 20 percent of available seats.

Chesapeake Public Charter School, St. Mary's County: Preference for low income families is provided for up to 35 percent of available seats. This preference is being phased in over several years.

2016-2017

Imagine Leeland, Prince George's County: Waiver request denied.

College Park Academy, Prince George's County: Geographic preference for up to 20 percent of available seats.

5. Collaboration of Maryland Public Charter Schools and Traditional Public Schools

One goal of the Maryland Charter School law is to foster collaboration and practice sharing between sectors. Several recent examples are:

- City Neighbors Learning Partners Initiative: Learning Partners are comprised of a cohort
 of teachers from different schools who agree to come together and chose an area of
 practice to dive into and explore together. The cohort conducts observations, implements
 new ideas, and shares best practices. Costs are mostly time and a modest fund for
 substitutes for school-to-school visits.
- Consultancy: The City Neighbors Foundation (operator of three schools in Baltimore City) has worked with the Anne Arundel County Public School System to provide

training to 40 teachers at Mary Moss at J. Albert Adams School (alternative middle school) on Project-Based Learning curriculum and implementation. City Neighbors also serves as a lab site for 25 teachers in the Triple E Program. This Anne Arundel County program infuses Project-Based Learning into county schools through the training of 25 teacher trainers.

- Professional Development available to all schools: The Children's Guild operates two
 charter schools, one in each of two school systems, Baltimore City and Anne Arundel
 County. The Guild hosts Project Based Learning workshops and offers spaces at no cost
 for traditional public school teachers in Anne Arundel County at the County's request.
 The Children's Guild also hosts a national conference of the National At-Risk Education
 Network (NAREN). The Guild makes space available at a reduced cost, or no cost, for
 additional teachers from charter and traditional schools.
- Progressive Education Summit, hosted annually by the City Neighbors Foundation: For this event, teachers and other staff provide the professional development activities to their colleagues. Both workshop leaders and participants represent public charter, traditional, and private schools. The Summit is now a staple of the Baltimore City education landscape. Over 600 educators attended the most recent summit in November 2016. The event featured over 40 workshops and three master classes.

6. Study of Funding Provided to Public Schools and Public Charter Schools in Maryland.

The Maryland General Assembly directed the MSDE to conduct a study of the amount of funding provided to all public charter schools and other public schools by all local school systems in the State. The primary purpose of the study is to "calculate the average operating expenditures by each local school system for students enrolled in a public school that is not a public charter school or stand-alone special education school, to be aggregated at the State level to serve as the baseline for determining commensurate funding for all public schools." (Education Article §§ 9-101 et seq.)

Working in collaboration with the Department of Legislative Services, the MSDE contracted with the American Institutes of Research (AIR) to conduct the study. Research included a review of operating expenditures made at the central office level, operating expenditures made on behalf of individual public schools by each local school system, all sources of revenue, the statutory and regulatory restrictions for each source, the amount of funding being provided to both public charter schools and other public schools by the local school system, and the value of services being provided to public schools by the central office of the local school system. In addition, the study reviewed funding provided by public charter schools to third parties, the availability of federal funding for public charter schools, and the potential for innovative financing for public charter schools for facilities. Finally, the study offered an assessment of whether there is a need to collect central office and school level expenditure data on an ongoing basis and what resources would be required to implement the recommendation.

The research team from AIR presented their final report to the State Board of Education in December 2015. The researchers briefed the Ways and Means Committee and Appropriations Committee of the Maryland House of Delegates and the Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee and the Committee on Budget and Taxation of the Maryland Senate during the 2017 Session of the Maryland General Assembly.
