Dear Governor Hogan:

The Maryland State Library Board is pleased to report on the support, condition, progress and needs of Maryland's libraries. The Maryland State Library Fiscal Year 2020 Annual Report and the Maryland Public Library Fiscal Year 2019 Statistics are attached.

The Maryland State Library (MSL) Agency continues to administer State and federal funds to support Maryland libraries in their mission to offer outstanding resources and programs, and to provide excellent customer service. MSL provides leadership to promote planning and innovation in the development of library programs, encourage the ongoing development of staff expertise through education and training and promote resource sharing among all types of libraries. Responsibilities include oversight of: the Maryland State Library for the Blind and Print Disabled, Maryland's Public Libraries, the State Library Resource Center, the three Regional Libraries, the Library Capital Grants Program, and the Maryland Deaf Culture Digital Library. We are proud to announce that in fiscal year 2020, the Maryland State Library distributed nearly \$2.2 million in federal grant awards to support Maryland public libraries, an increase of over 300% since the agency was established in 2017. The name of the Maryland State Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped was changed to the Maryland State Library for the Blind and Print Disabled (LBDP) by unanimous approval of the Maryland General Assembly during the 2020 session (SB 326 and HB 604) and passed into law effective October 1, 2020. This bill also added the requirement that one member of the Maryland State Library Board shall be a blind patron of the LBDP. MSL was able to provide continuous mail and phone service to blind and low vision customers during the pandemic thanks to the commitment of the LBDP staff.

MSL opened the [Maryland Deaf Culture Digital Library](#) website, issued the *Maryland Day By Day: Family Literacy Activity Calendar*, including an [interactive online version](#) and sponsored the One Maryland One Book selection *What the Eyes Don't See* by Mona Hanna-Attisha. In addition MSL hosted the fifth annual MD Tech Connect conference at UMD Shady Grove campus, featuring Maryland libraries' exciting technology projects and partnered with Maryland Census and the

Maryland Department of Planning to provide timely and accurate information to library systems about the 2020 Census. *Best Practices for Reopening Maryland Libraries* was developed to provide statewide guidance and recommendations on the phased reopening of Maryland public libraries during COVID-19 in addition to a web guide entitled [COVID-19 Resources for Maryland Libraries](#), a compendium of information and resources to assist decision-making about reopening. Finally, the *Laws of Maryland Relating to Public Libraries, 2019 Edition*, was issued and the MSL headquarters were relocated to 25 South Charles, Suite 1310, Baltimore, MD 21201.

As the State Library Agency for Maryland, MSL administers state and federal funds to support Maryland libraries in their mission to offer outstanding resources and programs, and to provide excellent customer service. MSL Headquarters and the Public Libraries and State Networking Branch funding includes a combination of State and federal funds. State funds support the Maryland State Library for the Blind and Print Disabled, the Maryland Deaf Culture Digital Library, Maryland's Public Libraries and the State Library Network (comprised of the State Library Resource Center (SLRC), the three Regional Libraries and two smaller programs to facilitate Interlibrary Loan and the Library Associate Training Institute). Also, the Enoch Pratt Free Library receives additional State funding for increased operating hours.

The State's County Library Capital Grant Program mandates that \$5 million dollars will be included in the State budget beginning in FY 2008 and every year thereafter. The grant program continues to meet the goal of geographic diversity in the distribution of awards. Fiscal Year 2020 was the thirteenth year that State assistance in the form of capital grants has been available to public libraries in Maryland. Since FY 2008, \$60,025,000 has been authorized which has generated an estimated \$350,000,000 dollars in local matching funds.

The grant program continues to meet the goal of geographic diversity in the distribution of awards; and 23 of the State's 24 library systems have received funds to renovate, expand or construct library facilities. This program has funded not only important renovations, but also contributed to the opening of an astounding 17 new libraries including two in FY2020, the new Leonardtown Library in St. Mary's County and the Michael E. Busch Library in Anne Arundel County. Four (4) new state of the art library facilities are currently underway in Anne Arundel, Calvert, Cecil, and Frederick Counties with support from the State.

The need for the State's investment continues. According to our most recent statewide facilities assessment conducted in November 2020, more than half of the 190 public library buildings in Maryland are over twenty five (25) years old. Consequences of this aging infrastructure are: 17 buildings need a new roof, 10 facilities require alterations for ADA compliance, 17 libraries have HVAC systems that are at the end of their useful life, 43 buildings require technological upgrades in order to provide 21st century library services, 55 existing facilities require general renovation at an estimated cost of \$77,000,000, and 8 buildings have been identified for replacement with a new structure at an estimated cost of \$65,000,000.

Funding has remained flat since the inception of this grant program while construction costs continue to escalate. It is not unusual for total requests to exceed the \$5 million dollars mandated for the program. In light of the increasing demand, we are very grateful that the State provided an increase of more than 40% for the FY 2021 County Public Library Capital Grant program, which will provide \$7,300,000 (an increase of \$2,300,000) for library building renovations and construction.

In FY 2020, the Public Libraries program issued \$38,932,865 in State Aid subgrants to the 24 public library systems. The State Library Network, along with two smaller grants to facilitate Interlibrary Loan and the Library Associate Training Institute, received \$18.4 million.

The allowance for the Deaf Culture Digital Library was \$235,000. The allowance for the Enoch Pratt Free Library was \$3 million to increase operating hours.

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, in compliance with State guidelines, most of the MSL staff continued to telework, providing reference and information services, patron services, assistive technology training, textbook conversion and IT and administrative support. More than 80 virtual programs and training were offered to library customers and library staff across the State.

The Public Libraries and State Networking Branch (PLSNB) provides technical assistance and direction to improve public library services across the state. PLSNB supports staff development activities and administers federal Library Services & Technology Act (LSTA) funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) to support programs and initiatives in public libraries statewide. In FY 2020, over \$2 million in federal LSTA funds were distributed to libraries to support staff development, early literacy initiatives, career readiness programming for teens, augmented reality Storywalks in public parks, loanable WiFi hotspots and WiFi-enabled laptops, strategic and facilities plans, and more. In addition, more than 80 staff development programs were held with over 2,700 attendees.

The Maryland State Library for the Blind and Print Disabled continued its core services even throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. A limited number of staff were on site daily to process delivery and circulation of books, periodicals and other information in formats such as Braille, large print, and recorded books to 8,745 new and existing library patrons, as well as manage the maintenance and safety of the facility and staff. All staff and any contractors coming to the building were verbally screened for COVID-19 according to DBM guidelines. All returned materials continued to be quarantined for between 4 and 7 days and masks, gloves and physical distancing continued to be part of daily requirements. Additionally, many of the events and programs scheduled for 2020 were moved from in-person to a teleconference format. Nearly 3,500 patrons, caregivers, stakeholders and potential patrons attended library hosted events/programs. This included innovative collaborative programs like Build a Better Book with the Baltimore-based makerspace Full Blast STEAM, tactile tours of the Goddard Space Flight Center and M&T Bank Stadium, and teleconferences focused on family, education, and healthy living in partnership with the Maryland Cooperative Extension. The Maryland Accessible Textbook program converted over 6,000 print chapters from textbooks to digital format for 47 print disabled Maryland college students.

In addition to budgeted State and federal funding, libraries and communities benefited from \$546,279 in CARES Act funding distributed by MSL for the purchase of PPE and supplies to encourage social distancing, WiFi hotspots and circulating devices, and staff training around pandemic response. Maryland libraries met the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic by quickly pivoting services and programs to new formats, and continuing to provide essential services to communities across the State. While branches were closed, libraries extended WiFi beyond their buildings, allowing residents to access vital internet connections from parking lots and community spaces. Library staff continued to engage customers by providing robust virtual programming, from story times to conversations on equity and justice. Libraries also continued to provide contactless services, including book pickup, remote printing and 3D printing services, and phone and virtual reference help. Maryland libraries

remain resilient and responsive to their communities' needs, and will continue to provide crucial library services to ensure that our communities are strong and well-positioned for a rapid recovery from the coronavirus pandemic.

According to the fiscal 2019 Maryland public library statistics, Maryland Public Libraries had over 3.3 million registered borrowers. 56% of Marylanders hold library cards and there were 25 million visits to the library with over 57 million items borrowed (both physical & electronic). Maryland libraries held more than 100,000 events, including over 57,000 programs for the youngest Marylanders, with over 1.7 million benefitting from early literacy and STEM activities, summer learning, Food in the Summer, and family programs for a total of 2.6 million program attendees.

Maryland libraries provided more than 5,400 computers and free WiFi at all 190 branches, and in the community via bookmobiles and mobile hotspots. Library staff answered 7.8 million questions. And, there were 91,000 meeting room uses for small business needs, homeschooling groups, and community conversations.

While total circulation is down slightly overall, there are several changes since last year that start to tell the story of how residents are using libraries differently than they have in the past. More people see the value of libraries and are registering for library cards. Maryland Libraries created more programming and purchased more eBooks, and the attendance at our programs and the use of eBooks has gone up accordingly. More people are using computers at the library, and WiFi use continues to increase. Investment in libraries is also growing. There was an overall increase in funding to libraries last year, and a large investment in new building projects and retrofitting library facilities. Staffing levels increased, and reflect the ongoing pursuit of bringing in highly trained new talent who reflect the communities they serve.

Maryland's libraries also played an essential role in helping their communities be counted in the 2020 Census which, for the first time in US history, was conducted primarily online. As trusted organizations and community hubs, Maryland public libraries were in a key position to distribute information about the Census, reach hard-to-count populations, and serve as points of access for the new digital format. Maryland's libraries supported a complete count with comprehensive programming and outreach, connecting with families through targeted outreach for undercounted birth - 5 populations, hosted or participated in job fairs for employment with the Census Bureau, and kept customers informed online and in their branches. Representatives from Maryland's public library systems provided leadership on Complete Count Committees across the state, connecting Census partners to local communities. Additionally, the Maryland State Library served as a member of the State Agency Complete Count Committee, working with Maryland Census to raise awareness and disseminate timely and accurate information to libraries statewide.

In response to a need to bring together library staff from all types of libraries throughout the state to discuss and share best practices and strategies for promoting and supporting diversity and inclusive practices throughout the state, MSL established the [Maryland Task Force for Diversity and Inclusion in Libraries](#). The mission of the task force is to promote and support diversity and inclusion in all Maryland libraries by:

- Encouraging affirmation, respect, inclusion, and understanding of all library patrons and staff
- Providing education to increase awareness of the different dimensions of diversity
- Sharing resources concerning best practices for creating inclusive environments

After two years of collecting and discussing information about the needs of various information professionals, it was decided that a repository of resources would be the best approach for gathering and sharing resources. This repository is maintained by the members of the taskforce as well as members of the Maryland Library Association's Diversity Interest Group. In addition, MSL introduced the statewide virtual study of the [Project Ready](#) curriculum: a multi-module, asynchronous study of a series of free, online professional development modules for school and public youth services librarians, library administrators, and others interested in improving their knowledge about race and racism, racial equity, and culturally sustaining pedagogy.

The majority of the funding for the Maryland State Library is received from the Institute of Museums and Libraries (IMLS) through the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA). After three years of vigorously defending the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and federal policies that impact public access to information, America's libraries have emerged with renewed energy, fortitude, and a measure of success. Funding for the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) was not only renewed but increased by \$21 million over the past three years, despite being targeted for elimination by the President in his proposed FFY 2018, FFY 2019 and FFY 2020 budgets.

This federal funding is integral to programming in Maryland libraries. In addition to ongoing statewide programs such as Statistics and Data Innovation, One Maryland One Book, the Library Associate Training Institute, and the Summer Reading Program, in the last year LSTA funding has allowed the State Library to distribute nearly \$2.2 million in federal grant awards to support Maryland public libraries, an increase of over 300% since the agency was established in 2017, to support Maryland Library systems for projects including:

- Collection development for Maryland's Prison Libraries
- State-Wide Public Opinion Poll on the use and value of Maryland's Public Libraries
- Tableau and PolicyMap training
- The make-IT Place STEM Repository was relaunched in its new home on the OERCommons platform
- Statewide Youth Service Committee (YSC) book study, *Becoming a Media Mentor: A Guide for Working with Children and Families*
- The 2020 summer reading program, "Imagine Your Story"
- Interactive trainings for library staff on the topics of: teen growth and development; connected learning; computational thinking; and critical facilitation, as part of the American Library Association's (ALA) Young Adult Library Services Association (YALSA) *Transforming Teen Services: A Train the Trainer Approach*
- MD Tech Connect 2019
- Apple Digital Literacy workshop
- The KnowBe4 Security Awareness platform for Maryland public libraries
- The SkillSoft training platform, including thousands of courses on soft skills like customer service, supervision, management, as well as technology
- Homelessness Training with Ryan Dowd via the Niche Academy platform (online) for Maryland public, academic, and school libraries, now including monthly live webinars in addition to the online course
- Access to [WebJunction](#), offering library-specific self-paced courses, webinar recordings and other great learning materials covering high-interest library topics presented by real-world practitioners and experts, and designing projects to connect public library service to community needs such as lifelong learning, health and wellness, and economic success.

Recently, MSL awarded approximately \$240,000 in LSTA funds through Competitive Grants that support infrastructure and innovation projects around the state. This funding supported projects ranging from technology plans, using online gaming to build communities, technology lending including laptop computers and WiFi hotspots, WiFi extenders to provide Internet access in rural “digital deserts”, feasibility studies, strategic and facilities master planning, Charles County’s Mobile Access van, Howard County Library’s Mathspllosion and programs on equality, diversity and inclusion.

The Maryland State Library continues to partner with the Maryland Library Association (MLA) to offer leadership development training including Executive University focusing on Strategic and Managerial leadership funded through an LSTA grant. Other leadership programs included an Outward Mindset workshop presented by the Arbinger Institute and Everyone Leads workshops. In 2020, MSL awarded more than \$250,000 in LSTA funds to staff to attend the MLA Conference. While this conference was postponed due to the pandemic, funds were carried over for the virtual conference in fall 2020. In addition, a partnership between the Citizens for Maryland Libraries, MLA and Maryland Humanities dedicated the Poe House as the first American Library Association Literary Landmark in Maryland.

Public libraries are a cornerstone of our democracy. Thank you for your support of Maryland Libraries efforts to serve the needs and interests of the community.

- Partnered with Maryland Census and the Maryland Department of Planning to provide timely and accurate information to library systems about the 2020 Census.
- Received an increase of more than 40% for the FY 2021 County Public Library Capital Grants program, which will provide \$7,300,000 (an increase of \$2.3 million) for library building renovations and construction. 

The grant program continues to meet the goal of geographic diversity in the distribution of awards; 23 of the state's 24 library systems received funds to renovate, expand or construct library facilities. FY2020 marks the thirteenth year that state assistance has been made available to public libraries in Maryland. Since FY2008, \$60,025,000 has been authorized, which has generated an estimated \$350,000,000 dollars in local matching funds. This program has funded not only important renovations but also opened an astounding 17 new libraries, two of which opened in FY2020.




