Dear Governor Moore:

The Maryland State Library Board is pleased to report on the support, condition, progress and needs of Maryland's libraries. The Maryland State Library Agency (MSLA) Fiscal Year 2022 Annual Report and the Maryland Public Library Fiscal Year 2021 Statistics are attached.

The Maryland State Library Agency continues to administer state and federal funds to support Maryland libraries in their mission to offer outstanding resources and programs and provide excellent customer service. MSLA provides strategic leadership to promote planning and innovation in the development of library programs, encourage the ongoing development of staff expertise through education and training and promote resource sharing among all types of libraries. Responsibilities include oversight of: the Maryland State Library for the Blind and Print Disabled, Maryland's Public Libraries, the State Library Resource Center, the three Regional Resource Centers, the Library Capital Grants Program, and the Maryland Deaf Culture Digital Library. The Maryland State Library Agency celebrated its fifth year as an independent agency. This level of autonomy has allowed the organization to be agile in supporting the Maryland library community to create shared strategies to navigate challenges while continuing to provide exceptional service. We are proud to report that in Fiscal Year 2022:

- The annual mandate for the **County Public Library Capital Grants Program** was increased from \$5 million to \$7.5 million during the 2021 session of the Maryland General Assembly.
- The formula for the **County Public Library Capital Grants Program** state share was adjusted so that counties such as Garrett can more fully participate in the program to support facility renovation and construction.
- Maryland continues to be a national leader on issues such as **legislation requiring publishers to make e-books and other digital literary content** available to consumers at a reasonable cost. While this landmark bill was ultimately struck down on appeal, Maryland libraries are at the head of

a growing chorus of voices around the country working to provide access to in-demand e-material while being good stewards of public funds.

- The Office of Statewide Broadband convened the **Maryland Broadband State Agency Collaboration Workgroup**, including representatives from Maryland's library community.
- Public library directors and their boards worked with consultants to produce a **Board Effectiveness Report**, which provides guidance on serving the needs and interests of the community to ensure that Maryland's libraries maintain their status as 21st-century libraries.
- Public libraries in Maryland can now make all computers, public and staff, accessible to those who are blind or have low vision through the purchase of **Fusion licenses**.
- The Library for the Blind and Print Disabled (LBPD) hosted the Office of the Inspector General for the United States Postal Service (USPS) to discuss service delays with the delivery of **Free Matter materials**. Inspectors visited LBPD and the central post office that serves the library to review their procedures for processing Free Matter and address concerns.
- MSLA, in partnership with the Maryland Department of Veterans Affairs, was awarded the **Abraham Lincoln Pillars of Excellence award for Serving Those Who Served** – a public library program to expand veteran outreach and library personnel education in Maryland.
- MSLA funded approximately \$2 million in **statewide Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grants** focusing on staff training and development, as well as key initiatives to support essential library services to communities.
- MSLA received approximately **\$3.2 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds** to support Maryland's libraries in providing services beyond the branches, reimagining library spaces, addressing digital equity, and more.
- MSLA continued its focus on **Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI)** through programs that highlighted racial equity and the development of an organizational culture in which everyone thrives.
- MSLA produced the second **Maryland Libraries Cultures Conference**, which focused on preparing staff for intellectual freedom challenges.
- The statewide programming initiative, **Maryland Libraries Together**, continues to leverage the collaborative nature of libraries in order to engage the communities that libraries serve in enriching educational experiences that advance an understanding of the issues of our time.
- Using funds from the Preschool Development Grant Birth through Five from the Maryland State Department of Education, MSLA is working with Mother Goose on the Loose to develop the **Hatchlings Program**, which provides resources to expectant and new parents to encourage a love of reading.
- MSLA continues to support **Summer Reading Programs** across the state. This year's theme is "Oceans of Possibilities," a perfect opportunity to welcome our new programming partners, the National Aquarium and the Maryland State Fair.

More information about many of these programs is included in the following pages of this report.

During fiscal year 2022, MSLA staff adopted a hybrid work schedule, working on site while continuing to telework as scheduled to provide reference and information services, patron services, assistive technology training, textbook conversion and IT and administrative support.

MSLA is funded through a combination of resources from the Institute of Museums and Library Services (IMLS) through the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) and state appropriations. Agency Headquarters and the Public Libraries and State Networking Branch funding includes a combination of state and federal funds. State funds support the Maryland State Library for the Blind

and Print Disabled, the Maryland Deaf Culture Digital Library, Maryland's Public Libraries and the State Library Network (comprised of the State Library Resource Center (SLRC), three regional resource centers (the Eastern Shore Regional Library, the Southern Maryland Regional Library Association, and the Western Maryland Regional Library), two smaller programs to facilitate interlibrary loan and the Library Associate Training Institute (LATI).

The Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2021 funding allowance for the "Grants to States" program from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) grant was \$3,147,403 (an increase of \$27,384 from FFY 2020). The IMLS Grants to States program is the largest source of federal funding for library services in the U.S. and issues grants to support the purposes and priorities of the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA). This funding is allocated between MSLA Headquarters and Aid to Education. MSLA issues approximately \$2 million in LSTA subgrants to Maryland libraries under the Public Libraries–Aid to Education program each year, ranging from statewide services for library patrons of all ages, to professional development support for library staff.

MSLA Headquarters and the Public Libraries and State Networking Branch are funded by State and/or federal funds. Beginning in fiscal year 2016 and in each fiscal year thereafter, the Library for the Blind and Print Disabled is to receive an amount equivalent to at least 25% of the amount received by the State Library Resource Center for the same fiscal year (Education Article, §23-205(e) of the Code of Maryland Regulations). In FY 2022, this amount totaled \$2,796,127. The FY 2022 allowance for the Deaf Culture Digital Library (DCDL) was \$235,000. MSLA issues a grant to Montgomery County Public Libraries to administer the DCDL. The allowance for the Enoch Pratt Free Library was \$3 million to maintain increased operating hours. (During the 2021 session of the General Assembly this amount was made permanent).

State funds also support the Public Libraries–Aid to Education program and the State Library Network–Aid to Education program through subgrants. The Public Libraries–Aid to Education program includes the 24 public library systems (Education Article, §23-505 of the Code of Maryland Regulations). The State Library Network (Education Article, §23-205 of the Code of Maryland Regulations) is comprised of the State Library Resource Center (SLRC) and the three Regional Libraries.

The Public Libraries Aid to Education program issued \$41,674,374 in State Aid grants to Maryland's 24 public library systems (an increase of \$0.6 million). Under the legislatively mandated formula, FY 2022 spending for the Public Library Aid Program increased from \$16.43 in fiscal 2021 to \$16.70 per capita in fiscal 2022.

The State Library Network received \$19.7 million (an increase of \$0.2 million). While the State Library Resource Center was flat funded at \$1.85 per state resident, funding for the three Regional Resource Centers increased from \$8.55 in fiscal 2021 to \$8.75 per capita in fiscal 2022.

Finally, the FY 2022 appropriation for the State Library Retirement Aid Program was \$20,157,312, including Montgomery County, an increase of \$278,604 based on demographic and salary changes for employees.

While Maryland's Public Library Capital Grants Program mandated that \$5 million be included in the state budget every year, in FY 2022 the state granted public libraries a total of \$7,500,000 (an

increase of \$2.5 million or 50%) for library building renovations and construction. In light of the increasing demand, libraries were very grateful for this increase. Effective in FY 2023, due to legislation passed during the 2021 session of the Maryland General Assembly, this funding will increase to \$7.5 million per year.

The capital grants program continues to meet the goal of geographic diversity in the distribution of awards through a wealth-based match formula to encourage local jurisdictions to fund urgent and necessary public library development across the state. Twenty-three of the state's 24 library systems received funds to renovate, expand or construct library facilities. FY 2022 marked the fifteenth year that state assistance was made available to public libraries in Maryland. Since the inception of the program in FY2008, \$82,325,000 has been authorized, leveraging more than \$374,500,000 in local matching funds, or nearly four and a half times the amount of the State's investment.

This program has funded not only important renovations but also opened an astounding 19 new libraries. During Fiscal Year 2022, three new state-of-the-art library facilities were underway in Anne Arundel (Riviera Beach), Calvert (Twin Beaches), and Frederick (Middletown) Counties with support from the state.

The need for the State's investment in capital funding continues. According to the most recent statewide facilities assessment conducted in December 2022, more than half of the 191 public library buildings in Maryland are over twenty five (25) years old. Consequences of this aging infrastructure are: 5 buildings need a new roof, 3 facilities require alterations for ADA compliance, 4 libraries have HVAC systems that are at the end of their useful life, 26 buildings require technological upgrades in order to provide 21<sup>st</sup> century library services, 23 existing facilities require general renovation at an estimated cost of \$19,353,926, and 6 buildings have been identified for replacement with a new structure at an estimated cost of \$31,208,156.

The Library for the Blind and Print Disabled (LBPD) continued to provide comprehensive library services to 7,112 eligible blind and print disabled residents of the state of Maryland. LBPD provided free access to books and magazines in audio, printed braille, electronic braille and large print formats. Monthly circulation consistently topped 22,000 as new formats such as multi-book cartridges and electronic braille expanded access. LBPD resumed in-person studio recording of Marylandia materials. 250 LBPD-produced books are available on the Braille and Audio Reading Download (BARD) service.

LBPD assisted college students in obtaining accessible college textbooks. In FY 2022, the Maryland Accessible Textbook program served 72 college and university students through the conversion of 3,570 textbook and Open Educational Resources chapters. Library staff also taught patrons how to use assistive technology, and hosted a variety of programs and events geared toward people with print disabilities. Since the implementation of Books on Demand (BoD), enabling patrons to get customized cartridges containing multiple books based on their preferences and requests, this service accounted for over half of LBPD's monthly circulation.

Events and programs continued to be held virtually rather than in-person. LBPD provided 144 virtual programs and events attended by 813 patrons, caregivers, stakeholders and potential patrons. This included innovative and collaborative programs such as the introduction of podcasts, including

blog posts and full-length topical programming and featured accessible astronomy activities for youth around the NASA Webb Space Telescope launch.

The Public Libraries and State Networking Branch (PLSNB) provided technical assistance and direction to improve public library services across the state. PLSNB supported staff development activities and administered federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) to support programs and initiatives in public libraries statewide. In FY 2022, MSLA funded over \$2 million in statewide Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grants focused on staff training and development, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) initiatives, technology and WiFi hotspot lending. Competitive grants supported projects ranging from a regional libraries conference, WiFi expansion, a statewide delivery study, library board effectiveness research, digital content modernization, enhanced web accessibility, an indigenous peoples app, the One Maryland One Book program, and strategic and facilities master planning.

MSLA used \$3.2 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to support initiatives that address the overarching goals of the program including addressing digital equity (increasing libraries' abilities to supply community WiFi, providing enhanced WiFi capacity for mobile units, providing additional mobile units (WiFi enabled bookmobiles) to systems in need, providing equipment to libraries for public programming, expanding media mentorship programs to build children's digital literacy skills and refreshing ADA workstations), facilitating workforce development efforts (funding workforce training spaces, such as Carroll County Public Library's Exploration Common and expanding workforce development mobile unit (bookmobiles) programs, microcertification and support to libraries to provide this service, statewide public programming for workforce development skills and marketing/promoting workforce development resources through media partners), assisting with social distancing/building configuration issues, providing equity, diversity, inclusion and anti-racism (EDIA) awareness training, and the support of public library collection budgets (physical and e-material).

The ARPA funding also helped address one of the biggest issues Maryland libraries face, digital equity. Prior to the pandemic, many residents relied on their library for access to computers and the Internet. According to a 2021 Abell Foundation report, 23% of Maryland households do not subscribe to broadband service 18% of Maryland households do not have a computer and more than 100,000 households with children do not have access to broadband. The ability of residents to access reliable and no-cost broadband internet was significantly impacted by library closures. Many of Maryland's already vulnerable residents lost a vital connection to work and school right when it was most needed. ARPA funding created a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for libraries to meet residents where they are, and to provide key services beyond the library's branches. Additionally, as libraries began to reimagine what it means to truly serve their communities, ARPA funding provided an opportunity to envision service models that were inclusive and centered communities beyond library buildings.

In order to meet customers' needs where they live, work, and play, more than \$1.7 million in ARPA funding (approximately 49% of the funding) was awarded to support the purchase or retrofit of 14 mobile library vehicles, including bookmobiles, specialized service vehicles for job seekers, and vans to provide neighborhood services. Additional support for these initiatives was provided through

local governments, and community and library foundations. These vehicles will provide, in addition to the distribution of books and other materials, enhanced WiFi capacity, public programming, and expanded workforce development opportunities throughout communities. Fourteen mobile units' means over 50% of Maryland's library systems received funding for a new or retrofit mobile services vehicle. Seven counties are getting mobile services for the first time, or, for the first time in many years. As a result, the state population served by mobile vehicles will increase dramatically.

According to the Fiscal Year 2021 Maryland public library statistics, Maryland Public Libraries had over 3.2 million registered borrowers and 54% of Marylanders hold library cards. Over 46 million items were borrowed and over 3 million questions were answered. In-person visits to library buildings topped 4 million and over 606,000 customers attended library programs.

Public Libraries provided 4,433 internet terminals for use by the public as well as free WiFi at all branches and in communities via bookmobiles and mobile hotspots. Wireless internet uses increased to a record 7.8 million. The use of e-resources increased dramatically. Circulation of e-books increased by 22% as customers continued to seek contactless ways to stay engaged and informed. Libraries increased e-material expenditures by 4% with libraries expanding e-book collections to meet customer demand for the provision of remote access to information for all Marylanders. Even when libraries reopened to the public, they continued to provide contactless services, including book pickup, remote printing and 3D printing services, and phone and virtual reference help. Although in-person visits to library buildings continued to be down from the years prior to the coronavirus pandemic, libraries provided close to 284,000 hours of contactless service for materials pickup, outdoor programming and WiFi use outside the branches. Curbside visits increased by 96%, with libraries seeing over 1.7 million customers take advantage of this essential service.

Library staff assisted Marylanders by answering almost 3 million questions, helping them gain important skills for lifelong learning and career readiness, both virtually and in the branches. Librarians provided virtual one-on-one instruction, resume and job search assistance, and homework help.

During the 2021 session of Maryland's General Assembly, ebook legislation was passed and enacted into law in May 2021, making Maryland the first state in the nation to ensure equal access to e-books for public libraries. The bill required "a publisher who offers to license an electronic literary product to the public to also offer to license the product to public libraries in the State on reasonable terms that would enable improved access to these products. The law was scheduled to take effect on January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022. However, in December 2021 the American Association of Publishers (AAP) filed suit against the Maryland Attorney General seeking to enjoin and overturn this law. A dedicated team of experts, including representatives of the Attorney General's (AG) Office, ALA staff and Maryland experts worked together to respond to the AAP lawsuit.

Unfortunately, Maryland did not prevail in the suit. On February 16, 2022, the U.S. District Court for the District of Maryland granted a preliminary injunction of Maryland's library digital book law in the case of AAP v. Brian Frosh. The Court ruling states that the Maryland law is preempted by federal copyright law. However, the judge agreed that the grant of a permanent injunction was not necessary. On August 10, 2022 we learned that the AAP filed a notice with the court indicating that, despite their initial and subsequent filings asking that Maryland pay their court costs, they decided not to proceed with their request for attorney's fees and costs in this case.

The decision, moving forward, is to work with information we've learned from this ruling and, working with other states, pursue this issue by revising the current legislation or introducing new legislation using a different focus to achieve our goal. I have discussed this with the other library stakeholders involved in this issue and they are supportive of this plan of action.

Libraries continue to be a cornerstone of our democracy. Thank you for your support of Maryland Libraries' efforts to serve the needs and interests of the community.

# Message from the State Librarian

The Maryland State Library Agency (MSLA) celebrated its fifth year as an independent agency! This milestone year has been a significant one for the agency and for Maryland libraries. Historic funding through the American Rescue Plan Act created opportunities for libraries to reimagine their services beyond the branches; the ability to come together in-person fostered connections and partnerships that benefit all Marylanders; and, as always, communities were at the center of our work.

## **We are proud to report that in Fiscal Year 2022:**

- The annual mandate for the **County Public Library Capital Grants Program** was increased from \$5 million to \$7.5 million during the 2021 session of the Maryland General Assembly.
- The formula for the **County Public Library Capital Grants Program** state share was adjusted so that counties such as Garrett can more fully participate in the program to support facility renovation and construction.
- Maryland continues to be a national leader on issues such as **legislation requiring publishers to make e-books and other digital literary content available to consumers at a reasonable cost**. While this landmark bill was ultimately struck down on appeal, Maryland libraries are at the head of a growing chorus of voices around the country working to provide access to in-demand e-material while being good stewards of public funds.
- The Office of Statewide Broadband has convened the **Maryland Broadband State Agency Collaboration Workgroup**, including representatives from Maryland's library community.
- Public library directors and their boards worked with consultants to produce a **Board Effectiveness Report**, which provides guidance on serving the needs and interests of the community to ensure that Maryland's libraries maintain their status as 21st-century libraries.
- Public libraries in Maryland can now make all computers, public and staff, accessible to those who are blind or have low vision through the purchase of **Fusion licenses**.


- The Library for the Blind and Print Disabled (LBPD) hosted the Office of the Inspector General for the United States Postal Service (USPS) to discuss service delays with the delivery of **Free Matter materials**. Inspectors visited LBPD and the central post office that serves the library to review their procedures for processing Free Matter and address concerns.
- MSLA, in partnership with MD Department of Veterans Affairs, was awarded the **Abraham Lincoln Pillars of Excellence award** for Serving Those Who Served – a public library program to expand veteran outreach and library personnel education in Maryland.
- MSLA funded approximately \$2 million in **statewide Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA)** grants focusing on staff training and development, as well as key initiatives to support essential library services to communities.
- MSLA received approximately \$3.2 million in **American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)** funds to support Maryland’s libraries in providing services beyond the branches, reimagining library spaces, addressing digital equity, and more.
- MSLA continued its focus on **Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI)** through programs that highlighted racial equity and the development of an organizational culture in which everyone thrives.
- MSLA produced the second **Maryland Libraries Cultures Conference**, which focused on preparing staff for intellectual freedom challenges.
- The statewide programming initiative, **Maryland Libraries Together**, continues to leverage the collaborative nature of libraries in order to engage the communities that libraries serve in enriching educational experiences that advance an understanding of the issues of our time.
- Using funds from the Preschool Development Grant Birth through Five from the Maryland State Department of Education, MSLA is working with Mother Goose on the Loose to develop the **Hatchlings** program, which provides resources to expectant and new parents to encourage a love of reading.
- MSLA continues to support **Summer Reading Programs** across the state. This year’s theme is “Oceans of Possibilities,” a perfect opportunity to welcome our new programming partners, the National Aquarium and the Maryland State Fair.

## MISSION

---

The mission of the Maryland State Library Agency (MSLA) is to provide leadership and consultation in technology, training, marketing, funding, resource sharing, research, and planning so that Maryland libraries can fulfill their missions now and in the future for the people of Maryland.

# MSL BUDGET 2022



The Maryland State Library Agency administers state and federal funds to support Maryland libraries in their mission to offer outstanding resources and programs and to provide excellent customer service. MSLA Headquarters and the Public Libraries and State Networking Branch funding includes a combination of state and federal funds. State funds support the Maryland State Library for the Blind and Print Disabled, the Maryland Deaf Culture Digital Library, Maryland's Public Libraries, and the State Library Network, composed of the State Library Resource Center (SLRC) and three regional libraries (the Eastern Shore Regional Library, the Southern Maryland Regional Library Association, and the Western Maryland Regional Library), as well as programs to facilitate interlibrary loan and the Library Associates Training Institute (LATI). In addition, the Enoch Pratt Free Library receives supplemental state funding for increased operating hours.




# CAPITAL GRANTS

Maryland's County Public Library Capital Grants Program mandates that \$7.5 million be included in the state budget every year for the renovation, expansion and construction of public library facilities. Goals of the program include geographic diversity in the distribution of awards and a wealth-based match formula to encourage local jurisdictions to fund urgent and necessary public library development across the state. Since FY 2008, \$74,825,000 have been authorized, which has generated an estimated \$365,000,000 in local matching funds. This program has funded not only important renovations but also opened an astounding 19 new libraries. Three new state-of-the-art library facilities are currently underway in Anne Arundel (Riviera Beach), Calvert (Twin Beaches), and Frederick (Middletown) Counties with support from the state.



# PUBLIC LIBRARIES AND STATE NETWORKING BRANCH

The Public Libraries and State Networking Branch (PLSNB) provides technical assistance and direction to improve public library services across the state. PLSNB supports staff development activities and administers federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funds to support programs and initiatives in libraries statewide.

# LIBRARY FOR THE BLIND AND PRINT DISABLED

The Library for the Blind and Print Disabled (LBPDP) serves eligible Marylanders with free access to books and magazines in audio, printed braille, electronic braille and large print formats. LBPDP also assists college students in obtaining accessible textbooks, teaches patrons to use assistive technology, and hosts programs and events.

# HIGHLIGHTING MARYLAND LIBRARIES

## ARPA Funding



\$3.2 million in ARPA funds were used to support the following initiatives:

- **Services Beyond the Library:** \$1.7 million to support the purchase or refurbishment of 14 mobile units across the state
- **Reimagining Library Spaces and Services:** \$620,000 to update library spaces in 7 library systems
- **Addressing Digital Equity:** \$400,000 to 5 library systems to address digital inequity
- **Equity, Diversity and Inclusion:** \$260,000 to 4 library systems to look at ways to improve and promote EDI
- **Infrastructure:** \$220,000 to support projects around the state to enhance infrastructure





## Spotlight on Vehicles

Much of the historic ARPA funding is being used to bring essential services to Marylanders through mobile library units. Ranging from classic outreach vans to book bikes to fully equipped STEAM labs that can serve many customers at once, these vehicles will not only deliver traditional library services beyond the branches but will also serve as key community connectors. Vehicles are meant to reach those who cannot access library branches, whether

due to transportation or other barriers, historically marginalized communities, rural communities of migrant workers, and children from vulnerable communities. Target audiences also include new and potential library customers – some of these vehicles are intended to operate via a “pop-up” model that engages residents where they are, whether at grocery stores, farmer’s markets, fairs, etc.

Almost all vehicles will serve as mobile WiFi access points in the community, with the goal of making this vital service available in places where it is lacking. Additionally, staffed vehicles will engage in programming in partnership with outside entities, such as health or social services departments, providing wrap-around services to residents who need them most. Many vehicles will also provide delivery of materials, technology for loan or use on-board, and a “library of things.” Uniquely, some vehicles will be used for technology and digital literacy education, citizenship classes, workforce development assistance, STEAM/Maker labs, and homework help for young customers.
