Re: Report required by Election Law Article § 1-303.2(e) (MSAR #13223)

Dear Senator Feldman and Delegate Atterbeary:

The purpose of this letter is to fulfill the reporting requirements of Chapter 734 (2021) (introduced as House Bill 222 and codified as Election Law Article, §1-303.2(e)), which requires that the State Board of Elections (SBE) "submit a report to the Senate Education, Energy, and Environmental Affairs Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee, in accordance with § 2-1257 of the State Government Article, that includes the following information, disaggregated by correctional facility:

- (1) the number of eligible voters who registered to vote, attempted to vote, and voted successfully by absentee ballot during the immediately preceding calendar year;
- (2) the number of times the State Board or a local board of elections visited each correctional facility during the immediately preceding calendar year, the duration of each visit, and a description of the work done at each correctional facility;
- (3) a description of any obstacles to implementing this section or § 2-501 of the Correctional Services Article; and
- (4) any recommendations for improving the implementation of this section or § 2-501 of the Correctional Services Article."

This report is for calendar year 2024 and is being submitted to the Senate Education, Energy, and the Environment (EEE) Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee.

In partnership with the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS), the local boards of elections, local detention and correctional facilities, and the Maryland Correctional Administrators' Association, we maintain a robust voting program at correctional facilities. This year, the program included the distribution of the voting information packets to eligible individuals in correctional facilities, in-person collection of voting materials, and voter education.

Ballot Drop Boxes

As required by [Chapter 646 \(2021\)](#) (introduced as Senate Bill 525 and codified as Election Law Article, §1301.1(d), Baltimore City provided their annual report¹ regarding the drop boxes and ballot collection information in their centers and is included in this report as Appendix 1.

Voting Information Packets

Voting Information Packets were distributed to eligible voters at all State correctional facilities and local detention centers statewide. The packets included a cover letter with important voting facts, such as deadlines and answers to common questions, a voter registration application with instructions, a mail-in ballot application with instructions, and a pre-paid return envelope to return both applications.² The English version of the cover letter for the general election has been included as Appendix 2.

Correctional facilities provided estimated quantities. For the 2024 Primary Election, SBE sent 6,305 packets to State correctional facilities and 13,805 packets to local correctional facilities for distribution to eligible individuals in those facilities. For the 2024 General Election, 3,890 packets were distributed to State facilities and 11,490 to local correctional facilities. After a competitive procurement, SBE contracted with a vendor to print and ship the packets to each facility. The vendor shipped the packets to each facility in mid-March and mid-September, respectively.

Prince George's County also conducted a Special Election (the General Election was conducted concurrently with the Presidential General Election) due to the resignation of an At-Large Councilmember. The Primary Election was held August 6th. We provided 940 voting packets for this election.

Voter Education and Assistance

Once the voting information packets were delivered to each facility and distributed to all eligible voters, the next step in the process was to educate voters on how and when to vote and assist voters who needed assistance in the process. To accomplish this, SBE provided all correctional facilities with four electronic versions of an 8.5" by 11" poster/handout/flyer that included important voting information and deadlines. The posters were available to all facilities in English and Spanish and in regular and large print. All facilities received all four versions of the posters. The local wardens and facility administrators printed the posters. Depending on the facility, case workers, social workers, and librarians were available to assist voters.

At DPSCS facilities where inmates have access to iPads for internal communications, individuals received reminders on their iPad as a voting deadline approached. Finally, SBE shared with all correctional facilities a video explaining voting rights for individuals currently or previously incarcerated and how to vote while incarcerated. This video was updated with each election's deadlines and played on communal televisions throughout facilities.³

In-Person Collection of Voting Materials

The last step in the process of voting at correctional facilities was to collect election-related mail. For local correctional facilities, the local boards and facilities personnel developed a process for picking up the mail. Some local boards picked up election mail from the facilities, while other facilities opted to use the regular outgoing mail process for election mail. For all election mail deposited in the drop boxes at State correctional facilities, the drop boxes were emptied in-person, on a weekly basis by representatives of either the local elections office or from SBE. For the two calendar weeks prior to election day, pickups increased to twice weekly (or more if needed) and on the day of the deadline (election day). Pickups will continue after the election on a monthly basis. Protocols for visits, identifying attire of pickup staff, and procedures for emptying the drop boxes were developed by SBE and DPSCS with input from many of the correctional facilities.

Additional Opportunities

In accordance with Chapter 734 (2021), DPSCS provides, as part of an exit packet, each individual with a voter registration application when that individual is released from the facility. Additionally, all eligible individuals are given a voter registration application and the opportunity to register to vote during orientation at a correctional facility, which can be when an individual is newly incarcerated or transferred to a different facility.

Chapter 734 (2021) Reporting Requirements

- (1) The first requirement requests the number of eligible voters who registered to vote, attempted to vote, and voted successfully by mail-in ballot during 2024. To determine the number of eligible voters who registered to vote, DPSCS provides SBE with a list of eligible individuals at any DPSCS facility at any point during the previous year.⁴

SBE must then cross-reference that list with the statewide voter registration database. For 2024, there were 10,566 eligible voters at DPSCS facilities. Of those, 4,177 registered to vote prior to 2024. In 2024, 597 eligible individuals registered to vote. Therefore, there was a total of 4,788 individuals under DPSCS supervision in 2024 who were registered to vote.

For the 2024 Primary Election, the local boards issued 200 ballots to voters at State correctional facilities, which is 4.18% of the registered voters at State correctional facilities. The local boards received 77 voted ballots from voters at these facilities, which represents 38.5% of requesting voters. Of the returned ballots, 75 ballots or 97.40%, were accepted. Of the two ballots that were rejected, both (100%) were rejected for being late.

For the 2024 General Election, the local boards issued 119 ballots to voters at State correctional facilities. This is 2.49% of the registered voters at State correctional facilities. The local boards received 49 voted ballots from voters at these facilities – this represents 41.18% of the requesting voters. Of the returned ballots, 49 ballots or 100%, were accepted.

The charts shown in Appendices 3 and 4 break down, by facility, the number of eligible individuals who registered to vote, attempted to vote, and voted successfully in the 2024 Primary and General Elections, as well as the number of ballots that were rejected and the reasons why those ballots were rejected.

Facility Visit

- (2) The second requirement requests the number of times the State Board or a local board of elections visited each correctional facility during the immediately preceding calendar year, the duration of each visit, and a description of the work done at each correctional facility.

The main purpose for visits to the correctional facilities was to empty the ballot drop boxes of election mail. All drop boxes were emptied on a weekly basis starting approximately the week after voting information packets arrived at each facility or a predetermined and agreed upon time determined by the local board and facility. Starting two weeks prior to each election, the drop boxes were emptied twice a week. The length of each visit depended on the number of drop boxes to empty and the distance to walk in between each drop box. The Allegany, Anne Arundel, and Washington Boards of Elections emptied the drop boxes at the State correctional facilities in their respective jurisdictions. Allegany Board of Elections hired an individual to empty the boxes at the State correctional facilities, and Anne Arundel Board of Elections used in-house staff to empty the drop boxes. For the drop boxes at the State correctional facilities in Baltimore City, Carroll, Howard, Somerset, and Washington Counties SBE used an existing vendor to empty the drop boxes.

Jared DeMarinis, the State Administrator of the State Board of Elections, visited the Ordnance Run Correctional Facility to attend an outreach event on October 8th. The event lasted approximately 4 hours. While the main purpose of the visit was to conduct voter outreach, Mr. DeMarinis was able to address misinformation that surrounds the eligibility requirements of voter registration and voting for people with convictions. During a noteworthy and meaningful experience, Mr. DeMarinis was able to assist in the registration of a 52 year old woman who had never voted or even registered to vote due to a past felony conviction and thought it was a lifetime ban. Since Mr. DeMarinis was able to explain the law, she was able to register. She expressed her excitement as she explained that she was going to vote for the first time in life this year. The event was considered to be a huge success by the staff. The re-entry coordinator, Ms. Marsha Brailey, shared that the population expressed how much they enjoyed and learned from it.

Implementation Obstacles

- (3) Several of the obstacles to implementing the requirements of HB222 remain the same as those reported in the past. As reported in previous reports, obtaining the information from each county's correctional facility remains an obstacle, because there is not a statewide database of detained and incarcerated individuals. There are 25 correctional facilities at the local level⁵ (not counting Baltimore City facilities which are under the purview of DPSCS), and each one uses its own system to track inmates and detainees. Requiring local facilities to provide the information required in this report and provide that information by a specific date would be helpful in acquiring the data necessary to prepare this report.

Recommendations for Improvement

- (4) As the Agency continues to improve, expand, and institutionalize practices required by HB222, it is clear that the implementation is an important, yet time consuming task. The production of written and video communications, procurement of a printing vendor, coordination of drop box pick ups, visits and communications with correctional institutions around the State is an immense

undertaking. These tasks draw on the same resources used by SBE to conduct all election preparation tasks during the same time period where other election preparation tasks are beginning. As such, limited staffing is not only a hurdle to implementation, but also a recommendation for improvement. An additional staff member responsible for administering this program and conducting voter outreach for incarcerated individuals would greatly assist with the maintenance and enhancement of these efforts.

As we prepare for the 2026 election cycle, we will continue to work with DPSCS and local correctional facilities to identify additional ways to educate eligible individuals in correctional facilities about the voting process and increase voter participation by eligible individuals. Dear Senators Guzzone and Feldman and Delegates Barnes and Atterbeary:

The purpose of this letter is to fulfill the reporting requirements of SB525 of 2021, which requires that "On or before January 1 each year, the local board of elections for Baltimore City shall submit a report to the Senate Education, Health & Environmental Affairs Committee, Senate Budget & Taxation Committee, the House Committee on Ways and Means, and the House Appropriations Committee, in accordance with §2-1257 of the State Government Article, on the following information submitted to the ballot drop box, disaggregated by each weekly collection from the ballot box and by the State Board or the local board that is the intended recipient of the election-related materials:

- (1) the number of absentee ballot applications received and accepted.
- (2) absentee ballots received and accepted; and
- (3) other election-related materials received."

SB525 required the installation of a ballot drop box at the Baltimore City centralized booking facility, known as the Baltimore City Central Booking and Intake Center (BCBIC). SBE worked with the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services (DPSCS) with regards to the production, placement, and installation. Because of the layout of the facility and due to security restrictions, there was not one location at BCBIC where all inmates would be able to access a single ballot drop box. Therefore, at the recommendation of DPSCS, a total of six ballot drop boxes were placed at BCBIC, one in each housing unit. In addition to the six ballot drop boxes at BCBIC, ballot drop boxes were installed at each DPSCS detention and correctional facility in the State, which includes three other detention facilities in Baltimore City (the

Hello Voter,

You have the right to vote! Under Maryland law:

- If you are awaiting trial for any charge, including a felony, you can vote.
- If you are serving time for a misdemeanor conviction, you can vote.

ATTENTION
Important Dates and Deadlines:
Register to vote by October 15
Request a mail-in ballot by October 29
Return your ballot by November 5

The only people who cannot vote are those currently serving time for a felony conviction. They will become eligible to vote again after they leave their correctional facility, even while they are on probation.

We encourage you to vote in the upcoming election and all elections to come. Voting by mail is easy and free, but you need to take action now!

How do I vote?

Because you are currently incarcerated, your only option is to vote by mail. Here's how:

1. Register to Vote. Use the form in this envelope.

You should use your home address, even if that's in a different city and county than where you are incarcerated. You can add a different mailing address on Line 8 if you want to receive mail somewhere else, such as at your jail. If you need help completing this or the other form, you can ask someone for help.



2. Request a Mail-in Ballot. Use the form in this envelope.

This form tells us where to mail your ballot. Your home address is the address you used to register to vote (the address you listed on Line 7 of the Voter Registration Application). On Line 5 of the Mail-in Ballot Request Form, write the address where you will be. This is where we will send your ballot.

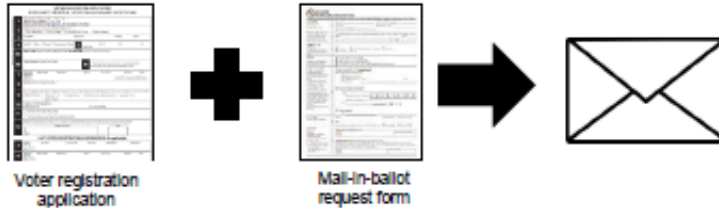

3. **Mail your Voter Registration and Mail-in Ballot applications as soon as possible** but at least 5 days before the deadline. Write the address for your county board of elections on the envelope. *Be sure to use the address of the board of elections for the county where you live, not the county where your correctional facility is located.* You can mail both at the same time in the same envelope, but they have different deadlines:
- October 15 - Deadline to Register to Vote
 - October 29 - Deadline to Request a Mail-in Ballot. *This request must be received by your county board of elections by this deadline, so make sure you mail it early.*



If your jail has a ballot drop box, you can drop your completed forms in the drop box. You still need to write the address for your county board of elections on the envelope, and you must drop them by the dates above. You can find the address of your county's board of elections at the bottom of this page.

4. **Complete your ballot.** When you receive your ballot, you can vote for President and other important elected positions listed below.

Who am I voting for? In this election, you can vote for President and Vice President, U.S. Senator, U.S. House Representative, judges of the Circuit Court, and delegates to the Democratic National Convention or Republican National Convention.

5. **Return your ballot as soon as you can.** Be sure to place your ballot in the provided envelope and sign the envelope. You can mail your envelope to your county's board of elections. *Be sure to mail it to the board of elections for the county where you live, not the county where your correctional facility is located.* The address of each county's board of elections is provided below. Your envelope must be postmarked by election day, November 5, 2024.
